Judging from the foregoing reasoning, one comes to the conclusion that Military action under the best of conditions is but a necessary evil which in the long run is bound to fail.

I view of the terrible struggle of humanity, I view of the terrible struggle of humanity, to come even to a partial disarmament agreement at Geneva, I thought the time for showing army-films very inappropriate, and while I perfectly agree to bind and unite all Swiss Citizens, whether at home or abroad with the bond of love into a God — and country loving people, — I cannot see, that this class of film will add any-thing to the thought of unity and Brotherhood.

We are very apt to forget that material dis-armament will make slow progress, while we still forget to disarm mentally as this would be much like to putting the cart before the horse. It is rather sad to contemplate how backward humanity is in the research of the mental realm, and its possibilities toward the bettering of con-ditions which to-day have taken rather an inter-national, than a national aspect, and therefore need to be looked upon from the former point of view.
