SWISS LOAN.

SWISS LOAN. The Swiss Government has, on 1st April next, to provide funds for the maturity of its Four per Cent. Ten-Year bonds of 1922 to the amount of Frs. 200,000,000. The Government will further have to provide for the redemption on 30th June next of the Four and a-Half per Cent. Sixth Mobilisation Loan of 1917 to the amount of Frs. 100,000,000. It is felt that a single large conver-sion offer at the present juncture might perhaps prove too heavy a demand upon the resources of the market, and, in the meantime, it is proposed to issue a new loan to the amount of Frs. 150,000,000, which will be redeemable by 30 annual instalments. It will be of the Three and a-Half per Cent. type, issued at a price of 94 per cent., including Federal stamp duty. The loan will be of special interest in so far as it represents the first occasion upon which it has been found possible to issue a Three and a-Half per Cent, loan since 1910. It is understood that the Federal Government will be in a position to meet the balance of the matur-
