FEDERAL.

SWISS LOAN.

The Swiss Government has, on 1st April next, to provide funds for the maturity of its Four per Cent. Ten-Year bonds of 1922 to the amount of Frs. 200,000,000. The Government will further have to provide for the redemption on 30th June next of the Four and a-Half per Cent. Sixth Mobilisation Loan of 1917 to the amount of Frs. 100,000,000. It is felt that a single large conversion offer at the present juncture might perhaps prove too heavy a demand upon the resources of the market, and, in the meantime, it is proposed to issue a new loan to the amount of Frs. 150,000,000, which will be redeemable by 30 annual instalments.

It will be of the Three and a-Half per Cent. type, issued at a price of 94 per cent., including Federal stamp duty. The loan will be of special interest in so far as it represents the first occasion upon which it has been found possible to issue a Three and a-Half per Cent. loan since 1910. It is understood that the Federal Government will be in a position to meet the balance of the maturing loan out of current funds.

SWISS BANK REPORTS.

(1930 — 7%); Hypothekarbank in Winterthur — 6½ per cent. (1930 — 6½%); Allg. Aargauische Ersparniskasse in Aarau — 6 per cent. (1930 — 6%); Gewerbekasse Baden — 7 per cent. (1930 — 7%); Volksbank Interlaken A.G. — 5 per cent. (1930 — 6%); Bank in Menziken — 7 per cent. (1930 — 7%).

LOTSCHBERG RAILWAY IN DIFFICULTY.

The Board of the Lütschberg Railway has circularised their shareholders acquainting them with the fact, that they are unable to pay any interest on their various issues, amounting to 57 million francs. This announcement has caused a great sensation amongst investors throughout Switzerland.

SWISS COMMERCIAL EMISSARIES IN PARIS.

M. Louis Rollin, French Minister of Commerce, has received M. Dumant, Swiss Minister in Paris and M. Stucki, chief of the Federal Economy Dept. in Berne, in special audience. The question of commercial treaties between France and Switzerland were discussed.

SWISS UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR HONOURED IN JAPAN.

On the occasion of the 25th Jubilee of Dr. Bürgi, Professor of Medicine at the University of Berne, a number of Japanese doctors, who studied under Professor Bürgi, sent an amount of 3,500f. towards the Bürgi Foundation of the University, as an appreciation to their former teacher.

LOCAL.

ZURICH.

A part of the lake of Zurich is frozen over. The greater part of the Obersee as well as the Harbour and Bay at Rapperswil are also frozen. W. Mächler, a school boy, broke through the ice and was drowned.

BERNE.

M. C. Stettler, a former notary has died at the age of 96. M. Stettler was the oldest inhabitant of the town.

LUCERNE.

A man, wearing a mask entered the ticket office at the Station Building in Lucerne, brandishing a revolver, and asking the cashier to hand over the contents of the till. The alarm was at once raised by the clerk, when the intruder took to his heels.

URI.

The Budget of the canton of Uri for 1931 closes with a surplus of 37,588f. instead of an anticipated deficit of 21,147f.

SCHWYZ.

M. Martin Oehsner, State Councillor, has celebrated his 70th birthday at Einsiedeln.

BASEL.

Dr. Felix Speiser, Professor of Ethnology at the University of Basle, has been made an Honorary Member of the Royal Anthropological Institute of Great Britain and Ireland.

GENEVA.

Burglars entered the private residence of M. Picot, head of the Finance Dept. of the canton of Geneva, and got away with an amount of 300f. in notes.

FRIBOURG.

The inauguration of the new bridge at Corbières took place last Saturday. The bridge is 123 m. long, 8.8 m. in width, and 40 m. high. The cost amounted to 500,000f.

AARGAU.

The house of M. Basler, veterinary surgeon at Frick, was completely destroyed by fire.

ST. GALLEN.

The couple Konstantin Thurnherr-Ruckstuhl have celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

VALAIS.

M. Métry, a former Member of the Grand Council has succeeded M. Escher as Member of Parliament. (National Council).

VAUD.

The "Conseil communal" in Lausanne has voted an amount of 560,000f. for the acquirement of the Valency Estate, which will be transformed into a public park.

TICINO.

Mme. Quadri, has celebrated her 100th birthday at Agno near Lugano; the whole population of this little village took part in the birthday festivities.

INTERNATIONAL MATCH

in Naples: Italy v Switzerland 3—0

An excellent running commentary relayed from Beromünster gave any listener an interesting hour and a half on Sunday 14th inst., Switzerland lined up as follows: Séchahay, Minelli, Beuchat; Hintermann, Gilardoni, Imhof; Kramer, Syret, Trelo Abegglen, Ducommun, Jaech. An enthusiastic crowd witnessed the match honoured by the presence of Prince Umberto. There is little to be said of the game. From the broadcast it was quite evident that Italy were vastly superior to our Eleven, of whom Minelli, as usual played a wonderful game. But the fact remains, proved by the uninterrupted failures of our National team, that there is something rotten in the present state of Swiss Football. Whether the introduction of foreign pros. into our League teams is a contributory factor or not, it would be difficult to determine. One could argue either way. And whilst it would be too early to judge finally these recent experiments, precious little benefit to anybody, least of all to Swiss football, has so far become apparent. Signs of trouble brewing are not wanting. I shall refer to these when the storm has broken. In the meantime, we are smarting under one defeat more!

NATIONAL LEAGUE.

One match only took place, when F. C. Bern lost to F. C. Basel 3—4. Success in the Cup is a wonderful tonic to any team and it looks as if Basel were determined to make a fight for their place in the National League.

In the FIRST LEAGUE Stade Lausanne registered win No. 2 by beating Cantonal 2—1. In Gruppe 2, the leaders Concordia were defeated by Locarno 2—3 in Basel, Locarno thus turning the tables and taking sweet revenge for their own home-defeat by the same score earlier in the Season. Concordia still leads with 16 points from 11 matches followed by Locarno, played 9, 13 points, goals 20—9 and Brühl, played 9, 13 points, goals 20—10. There will be a tough fight between these three clubs for the one vacancy in the National League. As both Concordia and Locarno have yet to visit Brühl, the latter appear on paper to have the best chance! But whoever makes a slip will rue the day.
