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FEDERAL.

SWITZERLAND PAYS HOMAGE TO DEAD KING.

M. Pilet-Golaz, President of the Swiss Confederation has sent the following telegram to Queen Maria of Yugoslavia:

Profondément indigné à la nouvelle de l'odieux attentat perpetré contre le Roi Alexandre nous présentons à V.M. les condoléances émues du Conseil Fédéral et du peuple Suisse.

En nous associant de tout cœur à votre deuil de Reine, d'épouse et de mère, nous tenons à assurer V.M. de la part très vive que nous prenons à la perte irréparable qui frappe le peuple Yugoslave en son chef glorieux.

At the same time, the President of the Confederation has addressed the following telegram, to M. Lebrun, President of the French Republic:

Vivement émus à la nouvelle du deuil tragique qui vient de frapper la France et son gouvernement nous vous présentons, au nom du Conseil Fédéral et du peuple Suisse, l'expression de notre plus profonde sympathie.

M. Motta, head of the Federal political Dept. has sent the following telegram to M. Doumergue, President of the French cabinet:

Permettez-moi de m'associer de grand cœur au deuil qui atteint la France et son gouvernement et laissez-moi envoyer la pensée de mon souvenir à M. Barthou, votre Ministre des Affaires Etrangères, tragiquement tombé dans l'accomplissement de son devoir.

SWISS AND THE SAAR.

The Swiss Federal Council decided to provide 350 Swiss nationals to act as ballot officers in the January plebiscite which will decide whether the Saar Territory is to become German or French or to remain under the control of the League of Nations.

THE POPE'S CONGRATULATION TO M. MOTTA.

The Pope has congratulated M. Motta, the Swiss Foreign Minister, on his speech at the League Assembly opposing the admission of Russia to the League on the ground of her alleged persecution of religion.

DIPLOMATIC NEWS.

The Dutch Minister in Berne, M. Doude van Troostwijk, will retire from his post this month, which he has held since 1924.

Count Clauzel, the French Ambassador in Berne, was injured when his car collided with another car near Berne. Although he was taken to a clinic, his injuries are not considered to be serious.

NEW HEAD OF THE SWISS CLEARING OFFICE.

The Federal Council has appointed M. Steiger, Manager of the National Bank in Zurich Head of the newly founded Clearing Office.

BILLS BY WEIGHT.

Swiss hotel-keepers have invented a new device to attract visitors.

Each new arrival is politely asked to step on a weighing-machine.

If at the end of a week visitors can guess their weight exactly before a second weighing, the proprietor offers a 10 per cent. reduction of the bill.

The hotel-keepers have such faith in the fattening powers of their chefs that few visitors succeed in guessing right.

SWISS-ITALIAN FRONTIER INCIDENT.

A Swiss-Italian frontier incident with serious possibilities is reported from Bosco-Gurin, in the Val Maggia.

A young man and a boy in search of lost sheep were stopped and questioned by Italian guards 100yds. from the frontier on Swiss territory. They were told to clear out and not be seen in that neighbourhood again.

The Swiss frontier post at Bosco was informed, and on Wednesday Swiss guards surprised two Italian frontier guards on Swiss territory. They arrested them and took them to Bosco.

INTERNATIONAL WALKING RECORD BEATEN BY SWISS.

A world's walking record held by Great Britain for sixty-four years — T. Griffith's 2h. 47m. 52s. for twenty miles — has been broken by Arthur Schwab, of Switzerland. He covered the distance in 2h. 42m. 13s.

Schwab also established a new world record for thirty kilometres, his time being 2h. 29m. 37.6-10s.

SWISS ELECTRIC EXTENSIONS.

Since April last the following lines of the Swiss Federal Railways have been opened to electric traction: Biel-Sonceboz, 15 km.; Rorschach-St. Margrethen, 11 km.; Sonceboz-La Chaux de Fonds, 29 km.; and Berne-Lucerne, 84 km. All these lines are operated on the standard single-phase 15 kV. system. The electrified lines of the Swiss Federal Railways now amount to 2,031 route km., or 1,260 route miles.

FRESCOES IN AN ENGADINE CHURCH.

Wall paintings in the Alpine village church of Santa Maria in the Engadine which were discovered in 1912 have been restored after 20 years' work by the Belgian artist M. Charles Lefebvre.

There are three frescoes. The oldest consisting of plain brown squares, dates from the foundation of the church (A.D. 1000). Over these a romanesque fresco was found, of which only five portions were uncovered so as to leave the third fresco as complete as possible. Of the romanesque portions two are decorative designs, while the others represent a Nativity, two Saints (unidentified), and a warrior carrying a two-handed sword of a type used only at the time of Frederick Barbarossa. The weapon makes it possible to fix the date of the fresco towards the end of the twelfth century.

The third fresco (fifteenth century) has 19 uncovered paintings representing the legend of Mary of Magdala and the Princes of Marseilles, taken from the "Légende Dorée" of Jacques de Voragine (1260).

SOLOTHURN.

M. H. Heer, founder of the firm of H. Heer and Co., tin plate manufacturers, in Solothurn, has died at the age of 61. M. Heer reached the grade of colonel of Infantry and during the Frontier occupation was in charge of the South Front at the Gotthard Fortress.

GENEVA.

Geneva's oldest inhabitant, Mme. Luquien, née Vautrin has died at the age of 99 and 11 months.

M. Frank Grandjean, Professor of Philosophy at the University of Geneva, has died at the age of 55.

AARAU.

The death is reported from Aarau of M. H. Kern-von Arand, senior partner of the well-known firm of Kern and Co., manufacturers of mathematical instruments at the age of 78.

ST. GALLEN.

Dr. Bürke, Professor of law at the Commercial University of Basle, has died in St. Gall at the age of 55. Professor Bürke was one of the leading personalities in the Liberal Party of the canton St. Gall.

VAUD.

Colonel Ernst Krähnäbühl, Sub-Manager of the Montreux-Oberland Railway has retired after 32 years service with the company.

The death is reported from Avenches, of M. Ferdinand Blane, the deceased was from 1880-1885 member of the Grand Council. M. Blane was a noted advocate; in the army he reached the rank of colonel, he was at one time Chief of Staff of the 1st division.

TICINO.

A new clinic was opened last week at Sorengo near Lugano, called the St. Anne's Clinic, which contains 100 beds. The opening ceremony was attended by members of the cantonal government.
