Besides falling turn-overs the general trend was downwards too. The stock of well-known trust companies such as Elec-trobank lost almost 70 francs and is quoted at 375. Indelec dropped from 330 to 310, while Motor-Columbus probably in connection with the Italian markets registered a heavy fall of 40 Francs to 170. More friendly was the atmosphere with the South American electric shares and trad-ing kept well up. Hispano American showed an improvement from 900 up to 930 and cheapened to 910 later on, while Italo-Argentina was fluctu-ating between 120 and 110. ating between 120 and 110.

Much discussed was the case of the Banque Commerciale de Bâle, which owing to her de-creased liquidity was granted a postponement of all maturity-dates by 2 years. Although this news was accepted quietly, it certainly did not encour-age to buy bank-shares. A trifle weaker were Royal Dutch, while General Mining and Union Corporation, after a setback of a few frances im-round acting proved again.

Swiss industrials were mostly cheaper than a month ago, especially Aluminium declined from 1670 to 1630 and Nestlé were sold once at 795 to improve later on up to 818. Other entreprises such as Lonza, Brown Boveri, Sulzer, etc., were unable to maintain their top-prices of 72, resp. 65 and 260, while insurance-shares kept steady in ownell trading small trading.

OF INTEREST TO PARENTS.

"There is a tide in the affairs" of children as well as men, and no one is better aware of this than the modern parent. Such an interest will go far, later on, towards securing for their generation that international understanding and that peace which we all so ardently desire for them. them.

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
