ELECTION OF NEW BISHOP. M. Franz v. Streng, priest at the St. Clara church of Basle has been elected Bishop of Basle and Lugano, in succession to the late Dr. Ambühl.

Bishop von Streng was born at Sirnach on the 24th of February, 1884, the son of a former National Councillor. He was ordained at Sirnach (Thurgau)in 1908, for nearly 11 years he officiated as vicar in Berne; in 1919 he was transferred to Basle. (St. Clara church).

SWISS ANXIETIES.

SWISS ANXIETIES. Germany's sudden repudiation of the Rhine River Navigation Act of 1931 causes great anxiety in Swiss shipping interests, mainly at Basle, where large sums of money have been invested within the last 25 years in building piers and docks. Two new docks were started only a few days ago in expectation of increased traffic on the onen Rhine. The old Treaty of Mannheim of days ago in expectation of increased traffic on the open Rhine. The old Treaty of Mannheim of 1868, confirmed by the Treaty of Versailles, guaranteed free international navigation from Switzerland to the sea. Switzerland hopes to negotiate a new treaty, as Germany intends to extend the Rhine navigation through Swiss terri-tory to Lake Constance.

JOURNALIST'S ARREST.

JOURNALIST'S ARREST. The Zurich correspondent of the "Basler National Zeitung" has been imprisoned by the Swiss authorities for refusing to divulge the source of certain information which he telephoned to his newspaper. The message, which was pub-lished, dealt with the arrest of several Com-munists.

It is alleged by the authorities that the journalist obtained the information "from an indiscreet official." Every effort was made by the court to discover the identity of this official. The journalist is now charged with contempt of the judicial authorities.

LOCAL. BERNE.

In Berne died at the age of 77, M. Fritz Haller-Born. The deceased was the proprietor of the "Hallerschen Buchdruckerei" and Publisher of the "Berner Intelligenzblatt." In the army Mr. Haller reached the rank of Colonel.

NESTLE COMPANY'S PROPOSALS. In consequence of the policy of decentraliza-tion followed in recent years the Nestlé and Anglo-Swiss Condensed Milk Company's direct trading activities are small compared with its interests in allied companies. Outside the Swiss market the manufacturing and selling branches retained by the company are now of relatively minor importance. The directors propose to complete the conversion of the company into a holding company by transferring those industrial and commercial activities that are still retained to a new affiliated company in Switzerland to be and commercial activities that are still retained to a new affiliated company in Switzerland to be called Nestlé and Anglo-Swiss Condensed Milk Company and having a capital of 5,000,000 Swiss francs. At the same time the title of the present company will be changed to Nestlé and Anglo-Swiss Holding Company.

As forecast at the annual meeting in April last a company has been formed by various assolast a company has been formed by farious asso-ciated companies abroad to develop new lines of food specialities more particularly intended for the American and oversea markets. This new the American and oversea markets. This new company is registered in the Panama with the title of Unilac Inc., and has a capital of \$7,500,000, of which \$540,000 is in Founders shares carrying sole voting rights, and \$6,960,000 in Common shares, being 579,550 \$12 shares and 9,000 60 cent shares. These Common shares are held by the Nestlé Company and it is proposed to distribute them to shareholders of that company in the proportion of one Unilac \$12 share for every Nestlé 200f. share and one Unilac 60c. share for every Nestlé 10f. share. The Unilac shares will have the same distinctive numbers as the Nestlé shares and will be transferable only with the corresponding Nestlé share. To cover shareholders' liability to Federal

To cover shareholders' liability to Federal coupon tax of 6 per cent. and other fiscal charges involved in this free share distribution the directors propose to pay a bonus which will equal about 5f. on each 200f. share and about 25c. on each 10f. share.

A meeting to consider the proposals will be held on November 27th at Cham.

The Swiss Federal Council has decided to form a company of volunteers for the permanent manning of the new fortifications built along the northern frontier. If the attempt is successful more companies will be formed before the end of the new? the year.

ANTI-NAZI BOOKS IN SWITZERLAND.

ANTI-NAZI BOOKS IN SWITZERLAND. A firm of publishers in Zurich had arranged to publish a book by Dr. Helmut Klotz, a former German naval officer, in which information is given about the plans of the German General Staff for invading Switzerland and Holland in the event of war between Germany and France. The Federal Government has prohibited the printing and publishing of this book in Switzerland on the ground that it might "disturb the good inter-national relations" of the country. The Federal Government has also prohibited

national relations " of the country. The Federal Government has also prohibited the further sale in Switzerland of a book on the assassination at Davos of Gustloff, the leader of the Nazi organisation in Switzerland, by Herr Emile Ludwig, who is of Swiss nationality. At the same time it is alleged that the sale in Swit-zerland of another book on the same subject by a German Nazi called Dierwege is to be allowed.

INCREASED TELEPHONE CHARGES.

The Swiss Government is to increase all tele-phone trunk call charges from Switzerland to places abroad by 20 per cent. as from this month. UNEMPLOYMENT IN SWITZERLAND.

The unemployment figures just published, show that at the end of October, 86,866 unem-ployed were registered, or 3,904 more than at the same period in October 1935.
