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Swiss Sports at Herne Hill,

Faithful to traditions, Swiss Sports day, started with a steady downpour, and in more than one Swiss Home there must have been disappointment, when father authoratively declared that a trip to Herne Hill was "taboo."—

In fairness to the weather authorities, how-In fairness to the weather authorities, however, it must be said, that not one drop of rain or one gust of wind interferred with the Sports arrangements, and half way through the afternoon the sun appeared and smiled beneignly on the sporting community; but I am afraid the damage was done, and the attendance undoubtedly suffered from the whimsical way with which the weather had seen fit to tease us.

The attendance at Herne Hill was about the same as last year, i.e. about 300, which is insufficient, and goes to prove once more, that this sporting event has lost its pull. I am sure many of my readers will remember how not so many years ago, an attendance of 600 to 800 could be registered.

Many excuses have since been mentioned, why the attendance has dwindled year by year; the weather has had to take principal blame; then the slowness in arranging the various events, the out-of-the-way position of the ground, and the fact that no new Swiss are arriving here, etc., etc.

Some of the above reasons might have contributed in one way or another to reduce attendances, but I maintain that the chief factor of the ances, but I maintain that the chief factor of the poor meeting, is simply that the majority of members of the Swiss Colony have lost interest in an event ,which used to be at one time, apart from the sports side a social affair. There are still enough Swiss residing in London, to fill the scating accommodation at Herne Hill. If one considers that every year over a thousand Swiss attend the "Fête Suisse," at Westminster Hall, surely to muster at least half that number for the Swiss Sports should not be very difficult. There were many faces missing last Saturday, who ought to have been there, and that so many were absent, confirms my belief that the Swiss Sports, in its present form, is not anymore wanted, and in its present form, is not anymore wanted, and before long the Committee will have to seriously consider a total reorganisation of this event.

It would be a great pity if the "Swiss Sports" should have to be discontinued; because those who have watched the children and saw with what eagerness and delight they entered for the various events, and with what joy they received their prizes, would not have the heart to deprive them of their little pleasures.

Unless the Colony as a whole shows a greater interest, the Swiss Sports are doomed to die a natural death; as it is to-day, the result can be in no way justified with the heavy expenses and the hard work which is entailed.

This is plain speaking, and I quite expect that I shall be called over the coals for it, and that my appointment as "Official Press Reporter" will be terminated forthwith; but the Press has a privilege to critisize and I am taking full advantage of it.

It is, of course, not a bit of good only to grumble and critisize, and I heartily invite the readers of the Swiss Observer to come forward with suggestions as to how the Swiss Sports should be conducted in the future; the columns of this paper will be at the disposal of anyone who can furnish ideas to bring the Sports back to their forward properties. their former popularity. I am convinced that the Committee will study these with an open mind.

Now having relieved my mind, I will try to discribe the Sports events, mentioning that on the whole it was a successful afternoon.

The first event started punctually at 2.45 p.m. and consisted of a 100 yds. Flat Handicap for Boys; as the results of the various events will be given at the end of this report, I will, with a few exceptions, desist from commenting on the achievements of each individual performer. A very attractive event was the 100 yds. Scratch Race for Ladies although the entries were rather poor. The Ladies in their sports costumes looked very smart but oh my! what would our grandmothers have said about the scantiness of their attire. —

As in former years, a musical programme was provided by an Ampligram; this instrument consumed a great number of fine gramophone records which were supplied by our compatriot, Mr. Newman; some of the hearty yodels and popular Swiss folk songs must have inspired both competitors and anlookers allike. competitors and onlookers alike

During the afternoon, the Swiss Minister, accompanied by his daughter. Mademoiselle Livia Paravicini arrived. The arrival of the head of our Colony was made known by the announcer through the microphone, and much to the surprise of the Community the Ampligram gave forth a tune which nobody seemed to know. Some of my friends told me that the tune played was the new Swiss Anthem, but I had my doubts, and afterwards found out that it was called "Prière Patriotique;" by an oversight the wrong side of the record was inserted, the other side being the National Anthem. The prayer, which thus greeted the Minister, was answered by the celestial authorities, because later on Monsieur Paravicini actually won one of the events, but about this later.

Once again that fine sportsman, Mr. H. H. Baumann, (S.M.S.) won the 120 yds Veterans' Handicap, in fine style.


They were far from mouldy, as when the shot rang out, they started to walk like heroes, some were even so keen to get to the post that they indulged in little spurts of "running," which resulted in being asked by some of the judges to "step out."
