HOME NEWS

FEDERAL.

SWISS NATIONAL BANK.

On June 6th, 1936, the gold reserve and gold values of the Swiss National Bank amounted to 1,407 million Swiss francs; exchange engagements and advances on securities stood at 201.4 million. The covering, by gold and gold values, of the fiduciary circulation (1,242 million) and of other liabilities at sight (342 million) reached 88.83%.

ITALO-SWISS PACT SIGNED.

Count Ciano, the Italian Foreign Minister, and Herr Paul Ruegger, the Swiss Minister in Rome, signed agreements of a commercial character between Italy and Switzerland.

SWISS EMIGRATION.

The number of persons who have left Switzerland for oversea countries in the month of May amount to 133. (1935: 115). Since the 1st of January, 721 Swiss have emigrated or 255 more than during the same period in 1935.

SUBSIDY FOR TOURIST INDUSTRY.

The States Council has voted a credit amounting to 500,000 frs. for propaganda purposes in connection with the tourist Industry.

CONSUL GUSTAVE PITOT +.

M. Gustave Pitot, Belgian Consul in Basle, has died at the age of 70; the deceased officiated since 1918 as Consul in Basle.

SWISS PROFESSORS HONOURED.

SWISS PROFESSORS HONOURED.

On the occasion of the 300th Anniversary of the Harvard University (U.S.A.) the following Swiss scholars have received the degree of doctor honoris causa: Charles, Gustav Jung, Professor at the Technical University in Zurich; Hans Kelsen, Professor of International law at the "Institut Universitaire" Geneva; Jean Piaget, Professor at the University in Geneva; William, Emanuel Rappard, rector of the University of Geneva; Leopold Ruzicka, Professor of Chemistry at the Federal Technical University in Zurich. in Zurich.

SWISS BAN ON LABOUR DELEGATE.

The Swiss Federal Government has prohibited M. Jouhaux, the French workers' delegate at the present International Labour Conference, from speaking at a meeting of the Geneva Trade Unions.

M. Jouhaux, says the Government, and other foreigners who come to Switzerland for the International Labour Conference can claim immunity at the international tribunal. But it is not for them to intervene in Swiss Trade Union meetings, and on Swiss soil to call in question the social policy of any foreign Government, even their own Government.

SKIING PARTY'S NIGHT ON MONT BLANC.

A party of five Geneva skiers who attempted to cross Mont Blanc from the Requin Hut recently were caught in a snow-storm on the Brenva Pass and lost their way. At nightfall they decided to bivouae at a height of about 12,000ft. They dng a hole in the snow, made a roof with their skis, covering it with a thick layer of snow, and passed the night, warming themselves with a small alcohol lamp. The temperature ontside was more than 20 degrees below zero Fahrenheit. The skiers did not suffer much from the cold, and the next morning descended to Chamonix in good health.

SWISS DELEGATION FOR LEAGUE OF NATION'S MEETING.

The Federal Council has appointed the fol-The Federal Council has appointed the following delegation to represent Switzerland at the September meeting of the League of Nations in Geneva: Federal Councillor Motta, Minister Stucki, Professor Rappard, National-Councillor Schneller and States-Councillor Kloeti.

LOCAL.

Dr. Hermann Kienzle, Director of the "Gewerbeschule" in Basle, has celebrated his 60th birthday anniversary. Dr. Kienzle has, since 1916, been connected with the "Gewerbeschule."

M. R. Gysin-Knoepff, for many years Manager of the "Aktienbrauerei Basle" has celebrated his 80th birthday anniversary.

BASIE-COUNTRY.

The "Bezirksschule" Therwil has celebrated the 100th anniversary of its existence, in the presence of many former pupils. Dr. H. Gschwind, who represented the cantonal government was the official speaker.

BERNE.

M. A. W. Glogg, a member of the Editorial Staff of the "Neuen Zürcher Zeitung" has been elected Director of the Swiss Broadcasting Company, in succession to M. Rambert, who is retiring on having reached the age limit.

During the Swiss Air Force Manaeuvres, Lieutenant Jäggi, from Bellinzona, crashed with his machine at the Aerodrome in Bienne. The machine caught fire, but the pilot got clear, receiving only slight burns.

Dr. Surbeck, Federal Inspector of Fisheries since 1909, has tendered his resignation; same has been accepted by the Federal Council, who has warmly thanked Dr. Surbeck for the great services he has rendered.

The death is reported from Berne, of Colonel Gottfried Immenhauser, late "Sektionschef" of the General Staff office, at the age of 73. Colonel Immenhauser, who rendered great service to our army, retired from his post in 1929.

ZURICH.

The accounts for 1935 of the canton of Zurich close with a deficit of $5{,}293{,}525~{\rm Frs}.$

A seventeen year old girl was fined at the Police Court in Zurich, for having called a police-man a "Tschugger;" the Magistrate held that this name was an insult.

GENEVA.

Dr. Marcel Raymond, Professor of French literature at the University of Basle, has been nominated to the chair of French language and literature at the University of Geneva, in succession to the late Professor Thibaudet.

VAUD.

M. Emile Golay, Professor of theology at the University of Lausanne has been elected rector of the University for 1936-1938.

M. Henri Bersier, Manager of the Cantonal Bank, is shortly retiring from his post, which he has held for the last twelve years. M. Bersier was for many years a member of the Grand Council, and sat from 1917-1924 in the National Council; previously he was Manager of the Insurance Co., "Mutuelle Vaudoise."

The death has occurred at Morges of M. Alfred Jaton, a former National Councillor, at the age of 75. The deceased, was at one time a well-known personality in Swiss political circles, being one of the leaders of the radical party.

In 1893, M. Jaton entered the Grand Council, over which he presided in 1908; he sat in Parliament (National Council) from 1912-1925. In the army he reached the rank of a major in the artillery.

M. Emile Greber from la Tour-de Peilz was transporting a swarm of bees from one beehive to another when he was stung on the arm. He to another when he was stung on the arm. M. Paul Ringier, Proprietor and head of the Publishing Firm Ringier and Co. A.G., in Zofingen, has celebrated his 60th birthday anniversary.

M. Ringier took over the management of the firm, which his father founded in 1833, in 1898, at the age of 22. The business was then on rather a small scale; under the management of M. Paul Ringier the firm extended from year to year, and to-day enjoys the reputation of being one of the leading houses in the Trade, thanks to the initiative and tenacity of M. Paul Ringier.

St. GALL.

The death is reported from Gossau of National Councillor, Dr. E. Mäder, head of the cantonal government, at the age of 61.

Dr. Mäder, who was by profession a veterin.

Dr.Mäder, who was by profession a veterinary surgeon, was born in 1875, and studied at the University of Zurich; for many years he practised at Gossau. In 1915, he entered the Grand Council, and five years later he was elected a member of the cantonal government.

In 1923, Dr. Mäder entered Parliament (National Council), where he enjoyed the reputa-tion of a shrewd parliamentarian; he was men-tioned on the retirement of Federal Councillor Musy, as one of the prospective successors

NIDWALDEN.

In Stansstad died, at the age of 83, Gottlieb Ackermann-Kaiser, a former fisherman.

M. Ackermann has during his life time saved no less than 22 persons from being drowned.

SOLOTHURN.

Two children, Verena Schnider, (1½ years old) and her brother (3 years old) from Ammansegg were run over by a motor lorry near Biberist, and killed outright. The driver of the lorry did not stop, but he was later on arrested by the police.

LUCERNE.

The chapel which is built near Küssnacht, on the spot where the late Queen of the Belgians was killed, will be innovated on Saturday (June 28th). FRIBOURG.

The eleven years old Henry Volery, from Granges-de-Vesin (Broye) was playing with a pistol, when a shot went off, killing him instantaneously.
