NOUVELLE SOCIETE HELVETIQUE. (London Group.)

It is a thousand pities that the arrangements made to receive Dr. A. Latt, the President of the "Swiss Abroad," fell on a Saturday. It is a most inconvenient day, as many of our countrymen have acclimatised themselves to the English week end habit, and the result was, that the attendance was a very poor one.

This is very much to be regretted, because Dr. Latt would have deserved a hundred per cent. attendance, not only on account of the splendid exposé of Swiss affairs which he gave us, but also

for the untiring and unselfish services which he renders to the "Auslandschweizer" work. —

renders to the "Auslandschweizer" work. —
I do not think that we Swiss abroad have a more capable or more earnest champion at home for the manifold problems with which we are confronted, than our old friend Dr. Latt. His enthusiasm and his untiring labours simply baffle me: I met him some twenty years ago, when he rendered such valuable services in the capacity of Secretary to the Nouvelle Société Helvétique. His undiminished ardour and his keenness to work in the interest for the Swiss abroad has not relayed since his departure from London 17 years work in the interest for the Swiss agroad has not relaxed since his departure from London 17 years ago; he is still fighting with the same tenacity for our interests, and if the "Auslandschweizer" have been by now recognised as an important unit in our national life, Dr. Latt can rightly claim a big share in this achievement.

On this occasion I also might mention, that Dr. Latt has been the first Editor of our paper, which was founded in 1921, and I am proud that we are still able to carry on the good work for which he laid such an excellent foundation.

I am glad to report that Dr. Latt had a wonderful success at the Students Congress at Cambridge, which has just come to an end, where he fought very bravely for a cause, which, alas, is more than often called a "lost cause," namely the existence of the League of Nations. In spite of all the bitter criticism with which this institution meets from almost all quarters, I still maintain, that if the obligations, which the members had undertaken to carry out at the time, would be faithfully observed, the world would be a better and safer place to live in.—

Dr. Latt intimated that he had no wish to give a lecture, and his remarks about News and Personalities from home were given as a sort of "causerie." It goes without saying, that we Swiss abroad are at all times interested to hear about the men, who are directing the destiny of our homeland. The speaker gave us a few short biographical glimpses about the work and the personality of the men who are at the helm of the Swiss Confederation.

He paid a great tribute to M. Motta, the President of the Swiss Confederation, whom he termed as one of the greatest statesmen Switzerland has ever possessed. A no less flattering tri-

Fresheld of the Swiss Confederation, whom he termed as one of the greatest statesmen Switzerland has ever possessed. A no less flattering tribute he paid to Federal-Councillor R. Minger, head of the Federal Military Dept., who occupies one of the most important offices in the Government, namely the one to keep our Army up to the scratch against all eventualities.

In turn, he acquainted the company with the work of the other members of the Federal Council, viz. M. Obrecht, who has to tackle many of the viz. M. Obrecht, who has to tackle many of the most difficult economic problems with which our country is confronted with. Dr. Meyer, the Finance Minister, who after a great struggle, and not a little against his own conviction, agreed to the devaluation of the franc. M. Pilet-Golaz, who has the almost impossible and least pleasant task to put our State Railways on a sound foundation. M. Baumann, Minister of Justice, who is responsible to maintain law and order, and M. Etter, who as "Kultur." Minister is indirectly closely connected with the "Auslandschweizer" work.

Dr. Latt also named two of our countrymen, Dr. Latt also named, two of our countrymen, namely Dr. Scherrer from St. Gall and M. Musso. President of the "Pro Ticino" for their great efforts for getting the Federal authorities to allott the 1st of 'August' Brindesfeier' collection in 1938 for the "Auslandschweizer" work. A special tribute was also paid, to Dr. H. P. Zschokke, Central President of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique in Switzerland, who recently becaused in Lordon.

Suter, President, thanked Dr. Latt for his very interesting exposé assuring him of the faithfull collaboration of the London Group of the N. S.H., he also thanked M. de Jenner for having attended the gathering, which he considered had fulfilled a most useful purpose.

DAS WILDKIRCHLI.

How many thousand generations separate us from the men who with primitive weapons hunted the powerful cave bear on the Ebenalp and the Gartenalp and dismembered him in the cave of the Wildkirchli? Dr. Baechler makes a guess and comes to the conclusion it might be 50,000 years ago since these caves were occupied but this is minimortant. unimportant.

What is important is the scientific classification based on the type of stone and bone implements found and on this evidence Wildkirchli man belongs to the older stoneage or more precisely to a pre-Mousterian culture. Wildkirchli man existed in the last interglacial period previous to the last great advance of the Alpine glaciers. What happened to him? Probably the arctic climate which followed the milder conditions of the interglacial period drove him from his mountain fastnessess along with the game he pursued. The next culture of early man we have in Switzerland is of a higher type and is found in the caves of the Jura, between Bâle and Schaffhausen and while he too was a hunter, his instruments were better and he practised a surprisingly life-like art. He belongs to the later palaeolithic age and the animals he hunted were the Mammoth, Reindeer, etc., and the type of climate was cold like that of the tundra. The Ice age, however, was coming to an end.

A still further advance in development is

A still further advance in development is marked by the Lake dwellers which belong to the newer stoneage, the Neolithic, who produced handsome stone axes which they polished. They also managed to domesticate some of the animals of their fauna such as the dog, goat, sheep, cattle, etc. Dr. Baechler out of the fullness of his knowledge has written a most interesting book dealing with his excavations and its many problems and it is made readable by a limpid style, which mirrors his experiences as the Seealpsee mirrors the scenery of the Säntis.

To those of us who know the Appenzell, the

To those of us who know the Appenzell, the book is a gift and moreover a charming gift from our colleagues of the Section St. Gallen of the S.A.C., who have undertaken the risk of publishing and selling it at a reasonable price.

The aim of the S.A.C., is to foster the love of our mountains. This can be done in many ways but none is more noble than to produce such a scientific work.

Ekkehard also is not forgotten and a chapter is devoted to J.V. Scheffel. I will conclude with one of his poems, it refers to the Wildkirchli;

"Yes. But Zurich is the only city that still celebrates this festival. Otherwise it is observed only in the more rural communities. The organized pageant parades here have been in existence for over one hundred years."

There were floats depicting scenes in the Tessin, with girls dressed in gay costumes and baskets full of flowers on their backs; floats with chalets and cottages surrounded with hyacinths and budding saplings. One of the youths belonging to the bakers' Guild threw freshly baked rolls into the crowd, and the bathers strutted by in high hats and flowing tailthrew freshly baked rolls into the crowd, and the barbers strutted by in high hats and flowing tailcoats. One of them had an immense pair of wooden scissors, and one time he reached into the crowd and picked off the hat of a startled, Brissago-smoking countryman. There was dancing and music and laughter.

Toward six o'clock the crowd started surging to Bellevne-platz. Roman holiday! Old Boegg, on top of a huge pyre, had the centre of the field all to himself. Then bells pealed loud and gay all through the city, and the sonorous chimes echoed in the surrounding hills. The bonfire was lit, and the horsemen started galloping around the leaping flames. You're gone now, Boegg! Can't get away! Flames licked higher and higher. Pop! Off went one of Boegg's arms. His pipe drooped in his mouth, and the broom fell from his hand. Off with his head, off with his head! There he goes! Boegg exploded and blew himself to tatters. So-long, old boy, you won't be back for a long time! The crowd cheered and the children jumped up and down, laughing and yelling. Shadows fell long over the field, and as if in mocking salute, the glowing red orb of the sun flung last beams across the lake, then dipped out of sight beyond the green rolling hills.
