ST. MORITZ CHOSEN FOR OLYMPIC WINTER **GAMES 1940.**

St .Moritz has been chosen as scene of the Olympic Winter Games 1940! This good news was broadcast all over the world after the international Olympic Committee, at a recent meeting in Brussels, made this all important decision. The fascinating Swiss wintersport capital was hostess to the Olympic winter games 1928, with its lofty, yet convenient location and its excellent organization for such an event as deciding factors. Nowadays, with still more improved connections, St. Moritz can be reached within 24 hours by train from any European capital, or hours by train from any European capital, or within six hours by air, Europe's loftiest airport being as Samaden-near-St. Moritz.

Many big events have been planned for the 1938-39 season in this sparkling resort. Skijumping contests on the famed Olympia Leap are to be held on December 26th, January 15th and 28th, and February 12th. The annual International Horse Races on the frozen lake are scheduled for January 29th, February 2nd and 5th. The Boblet Grand Prix is set for February 4th-5th and the Boblet World Championship for February 8th-9th. Among a bewildering multimule of other sports attractions will be Ice Hockey Tournaments; Ice Festivals; Races on the breath-taking Cresta Run; Ski Races, etc.

U.S.A. AIRPLANES FOR SWITZERLAND.

A Swiss commission consisting of five specialist members of the Air Force has left for the U.S.A. to study the progress of American aviation, and to prepare for the purchase of aircraft for the Swiss Army.

SWISS CONSTITUTIONAL HISTORY.

New stamps of the denominations of 3f., 5f. and 10f. have just been placed on sale in Switzerland. The 3f. depicts the scene at the making of the first federal pact in 1291. The 5f. shows the monk, Nicholas von der Flüe, intervening at the Diet of Stans in 1481 to preserve the Swiss Federation from disruption. The 10f. brings the story of the Swiss Constitution up to the present day with a picture of Swiss citizens quietly recording their votes.

FEDERAL SHOOTING COMPETITION IN LUCERNE.

The Federal Shooting Festival which will be The Federal Shooting resultan when will be held at Lucerne from June 16th July 3rd, 1939, will, for the first time in its history, be combined with an international shooting match. Aside from the Swiss National Exposition at Zurich, from May 6th-October 29th, 1939, this will be one of the outerlanding Swiss summer season events. of the outstanding Swiss summer season events.

Rifle shooting is a national sport in Switzer Rifle shooting is a national sport in Switzer-land, with Inter-communal, Cantonal and Federal matches tending to keep up a high stan-dard in marksmanship. The first Federal Shoot-ing Match dates back to 1824 and since then the festival has steadily gained in importance. It is held in a different place every five years, all nota-ble cities in the Confederation having been the scene of this event at one time or another, some of them more than once. This movable nature of the gathering tends to give spirit to the fête, each hostess viewing with her predecessor in the heartiness and splendour of her welcome to competitors and visitors.

NAZI AGENTS IN SWISS VILLAGES.

A National Socialist propaganda organisa-tion of dangerous proportions has been dis-covered by Swiss Police in Eastern Switzerland.

Towns and villages near St. Gall have been deluged with Nazi propaganda, and many thousands of copies of two newspapers, called "Schweizervolk" — "Swiss People" — and "Der Schweizer Degen" — "The Swiss Dagger — which openly proclaim a policy of fidelity to "National Socialist World Outlook," have been distributed free.

At Nesslau four Nazi agents were found dis tributing the newspapers from a motor-car. One thousand copies were seized and the four occupants arrested. They threatened at the prison to go on hunger strike.

WINNER OF THE 1938 GORDON-BENNETT BALLOON RACE.

It is officially stated that this year's Gordon-Bennett Balloon race, was won by the Polish balloon "L.O.P.P." piloted by Messrs. Janmusz and Janik. They covered 1,692 km. in 37 hours and 47 minutes.

Poland thus wins this competition for the fourth time in succession and the cup becomes the perpetual property of the Aero Club of Polaud, in addition the winning pilots receive a sum of 25,000 frs.

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SWISS DEFENCE SCHEME.

The Central Committee of the Swiss Radical Party has addressed an appeal to the other parties to introduce a common motion at the next parliamentary session, requesting the Government to put forward, as soon as possible, an extensive scheme for the improvement of national defence.

To finance the scheme a 1 per cent. tax on all monetary property is proposed.

The principal suggestions are that the period of military service shall be extended, and that fortifications and aviation shall be developed.

SWISS ARREST NAZI SPIES.

There have been many arrests in the past few days of Swiss and Germans accused of espionage for Germany.

One that has caused a particular sensation involves Dr. Eugen Wildi, a well-known lawyer, of Zofingen, who has been taken into custody together with his wife and two agents, one of whom is a German.

SWISS EXHIBITORS' MOVE TO RESTRICT CINEMA BUILDING.

Swiss statistics show that the number of cinema seats compared with the population is greater than that of other countries.

In Geneva there are 10,000 places for a population of 120,000 as compared with 15 places for 1,000 in Paris, respectively 12 and 66 people

The various cinematographic associations throughout the country have requested the newly constituted Film Chamber to appeal to the Federal Government to refuse permission for the construction of additional cinemas. At the same time the three renting associations have decided that films will only be rented to present members of the Directors' Association. of the Directors' Association.

DUTCH-SWISS CREDIT TO ARGENTINA.

The Dutch-Swiss bankers' credit to Argentina, granted on 6th May in the form of Three and a-Half per Cent. three months Treasury bills, will be extended until 6th February

The credit granted to the Argentine Government amounted to about £3,209,000, the Dutch portion being £1,389,000 and the Swiss share £1,820,000. As previously announced, the bills may be renewed seven times.

SWISS PASSES CLOSED BY SNOW.

Snow has fallen in abundance on the mountains above the 4,000ft. level, and the roads over the passes are closed to vehicles. Small snowfalls are reported from La Chaux de Fonds and Fribourg at the height, respectively, of 3,200ft. and 2,400ft.

NEW YORK EXHIBITION AND SWITZERLAND.

The Federal Council is making a proposal to the Federal Chambers to take part at the Exhibition in New York in 1939. A credit of 1,500,000 frs. will be asked for this purpose.

NEW "KREISPOST-DIREKTOREN."

Having reached the age limit, the following "Kreis-Post Direktoren" are retiring at the end of the current year: Rudolf Luder in Berne, Eugen Maire in Geneva, Jakob Riniker in Aarau and Jakob Graf in Chur.

THE MAERJELEN LAKE BECOMES NATIONAL RESERVATION.

The Märjelen lake at the foot of the Great Aletsch Glacier in the Valais has been set aside as a national reservation. The lake has somewhat the shape of a triangle and is situated 7,710 feet a/s. The base of the triangle is barred by an ice wall, 183 feet long and 160 feet deep, formed by the Aletsch Glacier. The natural outlet is to the west through the Aletsch Glacier, but when the water exceeds a certain level it has at its east end, the apex of the triangle an additional out. the water exceeds a certain level it has at its east end, the apex of the triangle, an additional outflow to the Fiescher Glacier. Thus the lake has two outlets in opposite directions, but in order to prevent an overflow upon the pastures near the Fiescher Glacier, a tunnel, 700 yards long, is provided by which the surplus water is discharged on the Fiescher Glacier itself.

Striking peculiarity of the Märjelen Lake is that it empties itself at irregular intervals, the same varying from three to seven years, and within the space of a few hours. The bulk of the receding water flows through the Aletsch Glacier to the Massa torrent, a tributary of the river Rhone, at the time often causing floods in the water Black Value of the results o upper Rhone Valley.

In the days before telephones and telegraphs the peasants who first arrived in the Rhone Valley with the news that the lake had disappeared was given a pair of new shoes.

Scientists are of the opinion that the Aletsch Glacier itself is responsible for the lake's actions. Little by little the melting ice raises the level of the lake until at the end of a few years the the lake until at the end of a lew years the accumulated water exerts such an enormous pressure upon the sides and bottom of the lake that the basin gradually becomes as porous as a sponge. At some point or other the water begins to escape; then it flows more rapidly, until it pours through the fissures on every side.

To the average tourist the Märjelen lake is principally known for its unique location, its deep-green colour and its floating blocks of ice which shows marvellops colour effects in the sun-

ZURICH.

LUCERNE.

The death is reported from Lucerne, of M. Joseph Troxler, "Stiftsprobst" in Beromünster. The deceased was for a great number of years Headmaster at the "Mittelschule" in Beromünster. He reached the age of 63.

FRIBOURG.

The government of the canton of Fribourg has acquired the historic castle of Gruyères from the family Balland of Geneva for a sum of 150,000

Dr. Gustav Schoch has been elected a member of the cantonal government.

ST. GALL.

The government of the cauton of St. Gall has elected Dr. Bruno Pfister a member of the National Council. Dr. Pfister, who is 49 years of age, sat in Parliament before. (1925-1935.) He was until recently Vice-President of the "Kaufmännischen Direktoriums" in St. Gall, at present he holds the post of General Secretary of the Swiss Millers Association.

Dr. Arnold Saxer, who has recently been appointed Director of the Federal Insurance Office, has resigned from the cantonal government, he has also vacated his seats in the National Council and the Grand Council.

GRISONS.

Recent excavations on the plateau of Crestaulta, in the Grisons valley of Lugnez, have established that this district was inhabited in established that this district was financial in the 11th or 10th century before Christ and that descendants of these primitive settlers occupied these parts for approximately four centuries, when their homes became the prey of invaders or fire.

Among the prehistoric finds unearthed at Crestaulta are bronzes and many remarkable ceramics. The latter are considered exceptional for their size and adornments. Traces of barley wheat and beans have also been discovered and bones dug out reveal that bears, ibex, deer, chamois, wildcats and marmots formed the wild bearts group, while shear, groups gover and view. beasts group, while sheep, goats, cows and pigs were the domestic animals. The homes, it has been found, were a forerunner of the present alpine huts, and no special shelters were provided for the livestock.

AARGAU.

M. J. Bisang, for over twenty years a member of the Municipal Council of Baden and the Grand Council, has died in Baden at the age of 53.

TICINO.

The "Istituto Elvetico" in Lugano, formerly known as the "Landriani" has celebrated the 100th anniversary of its foundation. States Councillor Celio, Mayor of Lugano, and a large number of former students attended the festivities held in Lugano.

The death has occurred in Lausanne of M. Constant Butticaz, from 1888-1896 Manager of the Municipal Electricity Works in Geneva, at the age of 80. M. Butticaz built the Chèvres Works as well as the Coulonvenière bridge.
