Domenica, 4 dicembre. Giorno improntato alla limpidezza del cristallo. Cielo puro, sfolgorante di sole, che lievemente temprava la crudele dicembrina.

Centododici giovani vite stroncate così, mentre generosamente prestavano servizio per la loro amata Svizzera. Olocausto doloroso ma infinitamente grande!

E tutto il Ticino è presente, in spirito, a questa commemorazione. Autorità religiose, civili e militari, giovani, vecchi... Tutti quanti uniti dal medesimo sentimento di riverente rispetto, di "amor patrio." Stretto intorno alla bandiera federale, alle cinque dei battaglioni ticinesi, venti anni dopo, il Ticino li ricorda, li esalta, oggi come allora, con una cerimonia degna del loro immenso sacrificio.

Già al mattino presto, alle 8.30, sul piazzale della Stazione, si formò il corteo imponente che poi si snoda lungo le vie della città, tra ali di numeroso pubblico. Prima sosta in Piazza Indipendenza per deporre una corona a quel monumento. Poi verso Piazza Governo, al giardinetto dove si erige il monumento che ricorda l'olocausto delle centododici vite, oggi amorosamente accarezzato dai lembi di un grande vessillo federale. Le dolci, troppo dolci, note della marcia funebre di Chopin salutano quel marmo-ricordo, circondato ora da tutte le bandiere. Momento solenne. Incancellabile. Il cap. don Alberti, cappellano d'armata, e che durante tutta la mobilitazione prestò le sue cure spirituali con infaticabile slancio, che vegliò su quelle vite divelte e ne raccolse l'ultimo respiro, benedicendole, ad una ad una le chiama e le saluta.

"Per la loro morte fa, misericordiosi Signore, che il flagello sia risparmiato ai figli, e nel loro nome e nel nome dei milioni di giovani, di tutte le nazioni e di tutte le stirpi, stroncati dalla maledizione della guerra noi ti preghiamo: Disperdi, o Signore, disperdi tutti coloro che vogliono la guerra!" — Frase significativa in significativa cerimonia...

La commozione è intensa. Il col. Waldis con brevi parole depone la corona davanti al monumento. Le note dell'Inno Patrio eseguito dalla musica degli sotto ufficiali, si elevano nel silenzio profondo. Parla poi il Presidente del Consiglio di Stato, on. Forni, che pure legge un telegramma dell'on. Motta, impossibilitato a presenziare.

Chiude questa parte della cerimonia il Salmo Svizzero... "E dolce o Elvezia morir per te" ...

Il corteo si ricomponne, si dirige verso la stupenda Collegiata, ove mons. Vescovo porta il suo saluto ai fedeli soldati seduti e li benedice e celebra poi la Santa Messa.

La navata, alta, solenne, ricca di marmi pregevoli, di stucchi, risuona di dolce musica, mistica che acciuffa la mestizia del momento. Beati Morti!

Tripudio di sole, di luce, di splendore. Come pieno di sole, di luce, di splendore il sacrificio compiuto da chi è morto per Te, o Patria nostra, terra diletta...
