WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP IN FRANCE. SWITZERLAND ...... 1 GERMANY (after extra time.)

This first round proper match for the World Championship (you will remember how we beat Portugal by 2:1 at Milan in the preliminary round) was staged at the Parc des Princes, in Paris before 25,000 spectators. It aroused the greatest interest on the Continent, bringing into Paris before 25,000 spectators. It aroused the greatest interest on the Continent, bringing into opposition the German international team de-feated by England by 6 goals to 3 on May 14th, and our grand eleven, deserved victors over Eng-land's representatives by 2:1 on May 21st. This reminds me (by the way, of course) that Mr. S. F. Rous, Secretary of the F.A. and extremely well known on the Continent as a famous Referee, once said to one of our old internationals, that he had seen and refereed several games played by Switzerland, but he had never yet seen them win. I am happy to note that Mr. Rous was present at the Grasshopperclub-ground in Zurich, when at last he did see Switzerland win, and with a vengeance! But to get back to my job. The Germans fielded a team strengthened by the in-clusion of five old Austrian internationals, Raftl in goal, Schmaus at left back, Mock centre-haff, Hahmenann and Pesser at in- and outside left respectively. The Swiss team stood as against England in Zurich. Since that unforgettable match our players have had a strenuous time in order to finish the League championship. Our opponents proceeded on different lines.

But, they are tough and proved to all and sundry that their victories over the Czechs, Portugal and England were not accidental, but due to Swiss Football with a capital F! The game against Germany was a real hard fight, what we used to call a "cup-match," everyone going all out for victory and don't stand on ceremony. And in the 29th minute, Gauchel, the German centre-forward fastened on to a centre by Pesser and placed the ball into our net. Two minutes before half-time, a nice Swiss movement minutes before half-time, a nice Swiss movement sees the ball going to Bickel from Amado, thence back to Walacek who centres to Trello who nods the ball into the far corner of the net. Switzer-land has equalised.

Whereas in the first half Germany had rather whereas in the first han openhany had father more of the game, after the interval the Reds had the better of the argument. But neither side could penetrate equally sound defences. During the half-hour of extra-time the Swiss were almost at the end of their physical powers. The play deteriorated horribly and what had been a hard game before now become shell we say a faul deteriorated horribly and what had been a hard game before, now became, shall we say, a foul game. Pesser kicked Minelli and was sent off. But the referee should have shown his authority a good deal earlier on. Five minutes before half-time Walacek beats Raftl (a tip-top before half-time Walacek beats Raftl (a tip-top goalkeeper is he) and reduces the arrears to 1:2. Just then Aebi has to be carried off and on re-suming we have but 4 forwards. But we are at least holding our own. After a quarter of an hour, Aebi, heavily bandaged, resumes pluckily and our morale gets a fillip. Five minutes later Amado centres, Raftl misses the ball and Bickel beads through Switzgaland has made good a heads through. Switzerland has made good a deficit of two early goals! The game proceeds. Play flows backwards and forwards. Both goals have narrow escapes and then, ten minutes from the end, our Reds force a corner, beautifully taken by Amado and Trello's head does the rest.


#### Switzerland leads 3:2!

Three times Three Cheers for our national


