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SWISS SPORTS & GARDEN PARTY

at

HERNE HILL on SATURDAY, JUNE 3rd.

Whoever handles the weather Department in those regions beyond our vision, deserves the hearty thanks of all those who found it worth while to attend the Swiss Sports and Garden Party at Herne Hill.

Although the attendance might be called, in an unpretentious way, satisfactory, there would have been ample accommodation for about double the number.

Certainly the weather could not be blamed this time, and as more people attended last year at the Duke of Yorks Headquarter's at Chelsea, when the weather was much less favourable, I have come to the conclusion that Herne Hill is too far away for a large number of would-be visitors.

It is a pity all the same, and I am convinced that with a little bit of goodwill and a little more understanding for those who arrange this yearly Sports Festival, a better "mustering of the Clans" might have been registered.

I believe that last year was the first time that the words "Garden Party" were added to the title, and this was done principally because of the side shows. In my report some twelve months ago I mentioned that these shows were not placed in a very favourable position, but you should have seen them this year, it was as if the Committee had gone especially out of its way to hide these stands, and ensure that no one should detect them, with the unavoidable result that the financial result of the side shows has proved to be a fiasco. This should, however, not reflect on the various stall holders, amongst them Messrs. J. J. Schneider, A. C. Stahelin and J. J. Pfander, who nearly shouted themselves hoarse in trying to attract "customers," if no better accommodation can be found in future, I suggest that each of these Gentlemen should be supplied with an "Alphorn." I saw my good friend Mr. J. J. Schneider packing up his stall, with heavy tears trickling down into his beard, which conveyed to me, more than words could have done that business has been bad.

This time again the Committee reverted to the former practice of gramophone music by using an Amplifier, I understand that this was done for reasons of economy, as the engagement of a band becomes too expensive; it is a pity though because a band is so much nicer, than what a friend of mine called "this tinned music," but, of course, the expenses have to be studied too. I felt very sorry of the Gentleman in charge of this "Department," it is no joke to "feed" this machine for about five hours in an almost tropical heat, not even a sunshade was forthcoming.

Yodles, marches, folk and patriotic songs followed each other continuously and the providers, Messrs. Newman deserve the thanks for this musical fare.

Punctuality has always been a virtue at the Swiss Sports and at 2.45 p.m. sharp the 1st event was run. As the results of the various competitions will be given at the end of this report, I will, with a few exceptions, desist from commenting on the achievements of some of the individual performers.

The 110 yds Flat Handicap and the 120 yds. Veterans' Walking Handicap deserve special mentioning, in the former, the winner Mr. Schildknecht (Swiss Bank) put up a very good performance, although no previous established records were beaten. The race practically ended in a dead heat. The 120 yds. Veterans' Flat Handicap was quite a good race, and the performance of Mr. Baehler (Swiss Federal Railways) who won on scratch, deserves special mentioning.

The 440 yds. Veterans' Walking Handicap (40 years and over) again was one of the chief attractions in the programme.

An impressive number of gallant veterans, none of them "bearded," but all of them with a grim determination written on their faces, lined up, and when a shot rang out they started to walk as if they had the last train to catch. They were "all smiles" — at the beginning — but after they had walked about half the distance, the faces of some of the competitors changed, and a pain-

ful expression became visible, and at the finish some of them looked ghastly. It is, of course, not surprising, as a good many have reached the so-called "age of discretion," and their waist line has become a thing of the past. Somehow or other this group of men, who a few minutes before had looked a picture of health, and now on passing me, looked haggard and distressed, made me feel as if Sport is not altogether such an enjoyable pastime as it is made out to be, but "Jedem Tierchen, sein Pläsierchen." Mr. E. Weber (Swiss Bank) won and as he is married, his wife will no doubt make good use of his running capacities, in cases when tradesmen deliver the orders incomplete.

An announcement over the microphone, which by the way was very efficiently handled by Mr. J. C. Mayes, was then made that the Tag-o'-War was to take place, an event which always creates much interest. Before I describe this item I shall repeat what I wrote in my last year's report.

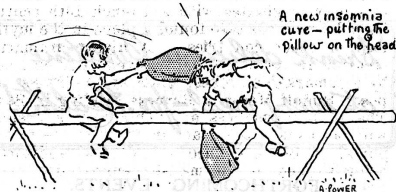
"In former years the teams used to come on the track in single file amidst the cheering of the crowd, whilst the band played some martial tune, which used to be most impressive; this year this harmless bit of showmanship was omitted, it is a pity, it always somehow reminded me of the entry of the gladiators into the arena in Rome, they need, of course, not have shouted, "Ave, Caesar, morituri te salutant!" —

So next year I hope that from the four corners of the track the teams headed by their respective captains will proudly march to the scene of their battle, whilst the band plays a lively march tune. —

The biggest surprise in that event was, that youth was completely knocked out by age; by youth I mean such teams as the Swiss Mercantile Society and the Swiss Federal Railways teams, and by age such valiant teams as the Union Helvetia and Cercle Valaisan, the latter two teams were in the Final and the Cercle Valaisan, captained by M. Delaloye, were declared the winners, it was a well-deserved and popular victory, and it goes to prove that there is plenty of life in our "Valaisans" who, no doubt, have been brought up on "Fendant" and "Johannisberger," what a splendid testimonial for these vintages.

Amongst the classical races the Relay Race, which was won outright (three years in succession) by the Swiss Mercantile Society "A" Team, was a pleasure to watch, there was some really fine sprinting to be seen. Runners-up were the Swiss Bank team.

A further attraction proved to be again the Pillow Fight, which was judged, as for many years past, by Mr. P. F. Boehringer.



I was greatly tempted to try my luck on the "pole," but when I saw the mighty array of those who seemed to be only too eager to give my face a good and hearty smack, in satisfying some grievance they might have against me, I thought better of it; because after all it has happened before, that a brick has found its way into one of the pillows, and a black eye is not exactly an ornament.

The outstanding performance in this event, was the fight between Mr. E. A. Nussle and Mr. Ch. Strubin, jun., both inflicting and taking heavy punishment in turn, for what seemed to me an eternity, in the end Mr. Nussle, who, I believe has been brought up on beer, was declared the winner, which again proves that "beer is best." What an eye-opener this must be to all teetotalers.

Fine results were obtained at the High Jump, although, they never came near to last year's per-

formance, where really amazing results were registered. This year there was a very small margin between the first three prize winners.

The same might be said about the Long Jump.

The 100 yds. Handicap races for Ladies, the 60 yds. for Girls and 80 yds. for Boys were enjoyable to watch.

Again, as last year, a beauty Parade for Ladies was held; unfortunately I missed this item, but I am told that they all looked very lovely and I sincerely hope that some of the bachelors present, have now decided to marry forthwith some of the beauties "on show." Miss Pauline Dupraz was declared the winner.

The "Georges Dimier Challenge Cup" for scoring the highest aggregate number of points was awarded to the Swiss Bank team scoring 27 points, runners-up were the Swiss Mercantile Society with 12 points.

There were, of course, various races for little girls and boys, and such fancy events as the Cigarette, Hoop, Skipping, Egg-and-Spoon races caused great hilarity.

Later in the afternoon the Swiss Minister, Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, accompanied by his two daughters arrived, they were received by M. de Cintra, President of the Swiss Sports Committee, whilst the Swiss Hymn was played.

I am somehow at a loss to grasp why a Hymn should great the official representative of our country, what is wrong with our National Anthem?

The other day I had an argument at a Meeting, when much to my amazement I was told that our National Anthem (Rufst du mein Vaterland) was not anymore popular — well, well — for a good many years now, our fathers and forefathers have, on patriotic occasions sung our National Anthem, and what is good enough for them should be good enough for us Swiss here. Admitted that for some time now there has been an agitation at home to find a new National Anthem, and if I am not wrong, a competition has been arranged and a prize has been allotted, but so far nobody in Switzerland has taken the slightest notice of it, let alone sung it, and until we are officially informed that a new National Anthem has been adopted, we should stick to our old one, even if it has the same tune as the English one; I might repeat, what is good enough for the English is good enough for the Swiss. To greet the Minister with a Hymn, late in the afternoon, whose verses run "Trittst im Morgenrot daher," seems to me stupid. I have nothing against the Swiss Hymn, both words and music are beautiful although 80 per cent, when singing it, come a cropper over the last line, but it is a Hymn (Psalm) and therefore should be sung or played at an appropriate moment. —

This has, of course, nothing to do with the Sports, but I thought it advisable to point out that whilst we have a National Anthem, we should not neglect it.

Previous to the presentation of the prizes, M. de Cintra, President of the Swiss Sports Committee addressed the gathering and expressed the satisfaction that the Swiss Minister was able to put in an appearance.

Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, who received a hearty ovation, when coming to the microphone, apologised for his late appearance, having had to attend the Tiremen's Display at Hyde Park.

The presentation of the prizes then took place by Mlle. Livia Paravicini, who was presented with a beautiful bouquet of flowers in the national colours.

In summing up I must heartily congratulate the members of the Sports Committee for their unselfish efforts to make this annual Sports Rally again a great success.

Although I do not like to single out names, I feel, that at least some of the members deserve to get special appreciation, first of all the three Directors of Sports, Messrs. R. Dupraz, H. Senn and P. Hiliker, who worked very hard. Entitled to praise for their great efforts are: Messrs. De



Maria, Secretary of the Sports Committee, J. J. Schneider, E. Ritzmann, W. Burren, C. Mayr, and, of course, M. R. de Cintra, the popular President of the Swiss Sports Committee.

The "Swiss Sports" seem to become, slowly but surely, popular again amongst the Colony and it is hoped that next year a still larger attendance can be registered.
