ITALY EXPELS SWISS JOURNALISTS.

M. Paul Gentizon, since 1927 Rome correspondent of the French paper "Le Temps," has been ordered to leave Italy before March 5th. M. Gentizon was consistently friendly to the Fascist regime, but in spite of his political sympathies he ranked as the best informed of the French "Temps" were an extremely valuable source of information.

The ideal foreign correspondent in Rome, according to the Italian Government, is ap-parently a person who provides neither views nor news, but only transmits communiqués. M. news, but only transmits communiqués. M. Gentizon had a different conception of the func-tions of a journalist, and that apparently has been enough to cause his expulsion.

M. Gentizon is of Swiss nationality. A. Gentzion is of Swiss hardonarity. Two other Swiss journalists, both of whom have lived nearly all their lives in Italy, have been ordered to leave. They are Dr. Hodel, the distinguished correspondent of the "Neue Zürcher Zeitung," and M. Pedrazzini, correspondent of various Swiss papers. A SWISS GOVERNMENT INQUIRY.

A SWISS COVERNMENT INQUIRY. M. Motta, Chief of the Political Depart-ment, informed the Federal Council of a pre-liminary report received from the Swiss Minister in Rome. According to this, the Italian authori-ties declare that the measure does not imply dis-approval of the attitude of Switzerland or of the Swiss Press, but is based on personal motives. As a matter of fact, however, the three jour nalists have always been considered in Switzer-land as very favourable to the Fascist régime.

The Federal Council, therefore, did not consider the reply satisfactory and instructed the Swiss Minister to inquire of Count Ciano on his return to Rome the real reasons for the Italian decision. M. Motta will discuss the matter with the Italian Minister in Berne.

WILLIAM TELL OPEN-AIR PERFORMANCES.

Open-air performances of the William Tell drama will again be a feature of Interlaken, on Sunday afternoons, from July 9th-September 10th. For the convenience of spectators the auditorium is covered. The program will, as usual, start at 1:30 p.m. with fees of admission ranging, as heretofore, from 3.30 Swiss Frances to 12 Swiss Francs each, including ticket tax.

At Altdorf, fondly described as William Tell's home town, the Tell drama will be pre-sented during the same period in summer, also on Sunday afternoons, in the William Tell Playhouse

TOSCANINI TO CONDUCT IN SWITZERLAND. Toscanini, the great maestro, who directed the special Wagner Festival concert in Tribschen Park near Lucerne last August has definitely con-sented to direct several symphony concerts, also Verdi's "Requien" with choir, soloists and orchestra. Negotiations are also being made with several eminent concerts and soloists.

BERNE. The death is reported from Berne of National Councillor Gottlieb Gnägi at the age of 60. The deceased was born in Schwadernau (Ct. Berne). In the year of 1907, he was elected a member of the Grand Council over which he presided during 1926-27. M. Gnägi was a member of Parliament (National Council) since 1919, where he repre-sented the Peasant Party, he was also on the Board of the National Bank, and for many years he presided over the Peasant Party of the canton of Berne.

The seat in the National Council, which has become vacant through the death of M. Gnägi, will be occupied by M. Werner Hadorn, who was already a member of Parliament from 1928-1935. He is a member of the Grand Council of the canton of Berne since 1920.

The death has occurred in Bienne of M. Hans Lanz, until recently Manager of the Swiss Bank Corporation in Bienne, at the age of 74. The deceased played an important part in the

commercial sphere of our country; he was one of the founders of the "Verbandes Schweizerischer Verkehrsvereine." In the army he reached the rank of colonel of Infantry.
