Theodor Simon Becker, born at St. Gall in 1873 received his education there, served his apprenticeship in the Embroidery Trade, and after spending some years in Nottingham and Paris, established himself as a Swiss Textile Agent in London.

With the decline in the fashion for Embroideries and Laces, however, he sought other outlets for his energy and enterprise and found ample scope in the Hide, Skin and Fur Trade, in the interests of which he undertook extensive travels.

Apart from his business activities, Theo Becker had a number of vastly diversified interests and hobbies. He was a keen gardener and a great lover and connoisseur of dogs, breeding French Bull Terriers and acting as Judge at Cruft's. His greatest recreation, however, was Music and coming from a musical family he was himself very proficient on the 'Cello, which instrument it will be remembered by many, he used to play in the Orchestra of the Swiss Institute.

His end was peaceful and his remains were cremated at Golders Green, on the 18th instant, the uplifting funeral service being taken by the Rev. M. Pradervand, in the presence of a number of friends, who had known and esteemed Theo Becker over a long-period of years.
