## Monthly Meeting.

A large number of members and friends attended the last Monthly Meeting of the year at Swiss House on Wednesday, 11th December, with Mr. J. J. Boos presiding.

Two resignations were submitted, i.e. Miss O. Longeray and Mr. M. V. Platel, both of whom have returned to Switzerland where they intend to join the local sections of the S.K.V.

An amount of £37.15.6 has so far been subscribed to the "General Guisan Fund for Disabled Soldiers" by members of the Society and the President intimated that the list would shortly be closed so that the proceeds could be handed over before the end of the year. Any members still wishing to contribute are kindly requested to send their remittance at an early date.

Reporting on the activities of the College, Mr. W. Meier, Chairman of the Education Committee, stated that the second course has come to a close, 32 candidates having sat for the Diploma, most of them successfully. Mr. E. Steiner, Trustee, kindly acted as "Prüfungsexperte." The College will remain closed for repairs and renovations until January 20th, by which date it is hoped all essential repairs will have been carried out. Lady students will again be admitted as from that date, but the waiting list is so great that all vacancies have already been filled.

Following the meeting, our member, Mr. A. Tall, gave a very interesting talk on his recent *Mountain-caving Experiences*, illustrated with lantern slides from his own photographs. He dealt chiefly with two different parts of his native Grisons, the Bernina region and the mountains of the Bergell, two totally different groups in character and geology. Whilst most of us remembered Mr. Tall's pre-war lectures under the auspices of the Swiss Federal Railways, many of us did not realise that he is not only a ski-ing expert, but also a very keen and adept climber. For variety of colour and contours, the massive giants of the Grisons are singular in their exquisite beauty and peak after peak was mastered by the lecturer and his companions, with many exciting climbing feats on almost perpendicular granite walls and razor-edge ridges. The photographs, taken with a Swiss precision camera, were excellent throughout.

Mr. Tall was given an enthusiastic ovation at the end of his most interesting and entertaining address, a hearty vote of thanks being proposed by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. W. Burren.

There was a surprise in store for those present. Through the good offices of Mr. F. Streit, a member of the Council, we were able to hear an account of the epic rescue on the Rosenlaui glacier. He had brought along with him Mr. Max Amstutz, Manager of the Traffic Office (Verkehrsverein) Meiringen and District, who was over here on a flying visit. Mr. Amstutz was a member of the rescue party which first reached the marooned passengers of the Dakota and enabled the daring Swiss pilots to make their famous flights. Although these operations have been the subject of numerous press, wireless and film reports, it was most interesting to learn the Swiss version from one who had actually taken part. Mr. Amstutz also showed a number of excellent photographs connected with the rescue operations. He was given a vociferous ovation at the conclusion of his thrilling account.

This being the last meeting of the year, the President, on behalf of the Committee, extended best wishes to the members and their families for a Happy Christmas and a Bright New Year.

The next Monthly Meeting will be held at Swiss House on Wednesday, January 8th, at 7 p.m., and will be followed by a "Jassabend."
