NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

Federal Councillor Dr. Walter Stampfli has tendered his resignation to the President of the Swiss Con-

federation, for reasons of health.

Dr. Stampfli was born in 1884 in Büren (Solothurn) and studied law at the Universities of Zurich and Göttingen. In 1906 he obtained the degree of *Doctor rer. pol.* After a short activity in the insurance world he took over the editorship of the "Oltener Tagblattes" in 1908, this position he occupied for ten years.

In 1918 Dr. Stampfli was elected Secretary of the "Solothurn Chamber of Commerce," and three years later entered into the services of the v. Roll'schen Eisenwerke.

At the early age of 28 he was elected a member of the "Kantonsrat" of Solothurn to which he belonged until 1937. He entered Parliament (National Council) as a Liberal in 1931. In 1940, Dr. Stampfli was elected a member of the Federal Government in succession to the late Dr. H. Obrecht.

Federal Councillor Dr. W. Stampfli has rendered the Confederation great services, especially as one of the promoters of the Old Age and Survivors' Insurance Act, and his leaving the Federal Government is universally regretted.

The funeral of Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, late Swiss Minister in London, took place in Berne, on Saturday, November 18th.

Amongst the numerous congregation were the Swiss Foreign Minister, Monsieur Petitpierre, and members of the Diplomatic Corps and the Swiss Foreign Office.

The service was conducted by Pasteur Morgenthaler (Oberhofen). Monsieur de Rham and Monsieur Preiswerk, former colleagues of the late Minister, spoke on behalf of his friends and the Swiss Colony in Great Britain

The Austrian Government has decided to open a Consulate General in Zurich, and has appointed M. W. Peinsipp as Consul General.

Revenue of the Swiss Confederation during 1948 is estimated at Frs.1,794,800,000, while expenditure is expected to amount to Frs.1,800,700,000, leaving an adverse balance of only Frs.5,900,000. The current year's budgeted deficit amounts to Frs.97,000,000.

On 31st October Swiss notes in circulation reached the record figure of Frs.4,192,000,000, an increase over the previous week of Frs.138,300,000. The latest weekly return of the Swiss National Bank ascribes this increase to end-month requirements. The gold reserve remained almost unchanged at Frs.5,374,000,000, so that the alleged recent gold transfers from England to Zurich and Geneva, reported by an English news agency to have amounted to many million pounds sterling, could not have been for the account of the Swiss National Bank.

Drastic electricity economy measures have been ordered by the Swiss Government. This is the result of the drought — the worst for 100 years in Switzerland — which has affected the output of hydro-electric plants. As from November 1st electric heating in private homes is forbidden, factories must reduce consumption of electricity by 70 to 80 per cent., and the consumption of electricity in hotels, restaurants, shops and places of entertainment must be cut by one-third.

Imports of cars into Switzerland which registered a decrease in the month of August increased again substantially in September, when 2,261 cars with a custom value of 17,500,000 Swiss francs arrived in the country against 1,110 in September, 1946. The United Kingdom heads the list of suppliers of small and medium sized cars, whereas the U.S. supplies chiefly heavy and large cars.

Swiss foreign trade figures for the first nine months of this year show imports from the United Kingdom valued at Frs.223,900,000 (£12,900,000), as

compared with Frs.134,600,000 (£7,800,000) in the cor-Exports to the United responding period of 1946. Kingdom rose from Frs.35,500,000 (£2,050,000) to Frs.82,500,000 (£4,750,000). There is every indication that this country is going to play an important role in Britain's export drive.

Total Swiss imports from January to September, 1947, amounted to Frs. 3,383,200,000 (£195,000,000),

exports being Frs.2,369,400,000 (£137,000,000).

The Swiss index of wholesale prices, at the end of October, was another 5.2 points up at 213.9 (August, 1939, equals 100) over the September figure.

The late Mme Pauline Huber-Uster, from Küsnacht (Zurich), has left an amount of 20,000.—frs. to the community of Küsnacht for charitable purposes.

Dr. Hans Flück, of Zurich, has been awarded the gold medal given in memory of Daniel Hanbury, for original drug research, by the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain.

The late Xaver Jten, from Unterägeri (Zug) has left an amount of 30,000.—frs. to the community towards the errection of an orphanage. [A.T.S.]

Edmund Dähler, a former "Stadtammann" and member of the cantonal government of Appenzell J.-Rh., has died at Appenzell at the age of 74. The deceased was a Member of Parliament (National Council) from 1926-1935. [A.T.S.]

J. Eisenhut-Schaefer, well-known in the embroidery industry, has died in Gais (Appenzell A.-Rh.) at the age of 92. The deceased was a member of the "Kantonsrat" of the canton Appenzell A.-Rh. and sat in Parliament (National Council) from 1911-1931. [A.T.S.]

A motor-car collided at a level crossing near Notkersegg with a railway engine, causing the death of J. Boppart, a commercial traveller from St. Gall. [A.T.S.]

Pastor Albert Rothenberger, who was for a great number of years Pastor at the protestant Linsenbühlkirche in St. Gall, has celebrated his 80th birthday anniversary. He was for 38 years President of the "Gemeinnützigen Gesellschaft" of the town of St. Gall. [A.T.S.]

From Altstätten (St. Gall) comes the news of the death of Hans Hongler, President of the Board of the "Rheintalischen Kreditanstalt," at the age of 62.

Two passers-by were killed in Flawil (St. Gall) by a motorist Walther Grubenmann, from Wattwil, who, after the accident, failed to stop. On the point of being arrested, he committed suicide. [A.T.S.]

The oldest inhabitant of Bremgarten (Aargau), J. Huber, a master gardener, has died at the age of 101. A.T.S.

H. Businger, Manufacturer, in Aarau, has given an amount of 10,000.—frs. to the community of Wittnau for school excursions. [A.T.S.]

Walter Siegfried, a native of Zofingen, and a writer of many well-known novels, has died in Patenkirchen, at the age of 90. [A.T.S.]

The town of Aarau is the beneficiary to an amount of nearly 100,000.—frs. left by the late Sophie Wagner, of Aarau. The money is to be used for needy old people.

States Councillor Dr. Altwegg has tendered his resignation as a member of the government of the canton of Thurgau. [A.T.S.]

Despite the failure of a recent Three and a quarter per cent. loan of the canton Basle-City at par plus 0.6 per cent. tax, the canton of Ticino is inviting subscriptions to a Frs.15,000,000.— loan, also at par, but including tax. As 34 per cent. is no longer considered a sufficient rate of interest for long term loans, the offer is generally regarded as a "test case" for future loans. [A.T.S.]

On the occasion of the dies academicus of the University of Lausanne, the following new Professors have been installed: Paul Chapuis (Theology); F. Culès (Law); M. Jacot (Medicine); P. Gillard (Philosophy); H. Girardet (Pharmacology); P. Hauduroy (Medicine); J. Bolomey (Philosophy); A. Dumas (Philosophy); M. Favez (Philosophy); and H. Zwahlen (Law). [A.T.s.]

Jean Peytréquin, who has recently been elected as a member of the National Council, has been unable to take up his seat as a member of the National Council, owing to the constitution not allowing more than two members of a cantonal government to occupy a seat in Parliament, he has been replaced by U. Peclard, who sat in the last Parliament. [A.T.S.]

Etienne Cuénod, a notary in Morges, has been arrested for embezzlement. [A.T.S.]

René Gerber, from Peseux, has been elected Director of the Conservatory of Neuchâtel. [A.T.S.]

The "Kinderhilfe" of the Swiss Red Cross has organised further transports of children. On the

20th of this month 500 children from Austria have arrived in Switzerland, another batch from Italy is expected to arrive shortly in our country. They will stay for three months and will be distributed amongst Swiss families. [A.T.S.]

The Annual Seismological Report concerning Swiss earthquakes during 1945 has been compiled by Dr. E. Wanner, of Zurich. Seismographs are installed at the Swiss Observatories of Zurich, Chur, Neuchâtel, Basel and Brig, and during the year 85 near earthquakes and 189 strong distant earthquakes were registered. There were ten earth tremors with epicentres in Switzerland which were felt by people during the year. None of these had a greater intensity than V on the Rossi-Forel Scale, so that none reached destructive intensity. The greatest three tremors were (1) May 13th at Freiburg,
