The death has been reported from Catania (Italy) of Mr. Carlo Caffish, Swiss Consul, at the age of 60.

M. Boeue, Rumanian Minister in Switzerland since November, 1946, has resigned. He has been a member of the Social Democratic party in his country for 30 years and is unwilling to serve a Government which denies his party's right to existence.

The Federal Council has asked the Federal Chambers for a credit of 3.1 million francs for the purchase of one building at 10, Grosvenor Square and the adjoining building at 86, Duke Street, W.1. (Former Japanese Embassy), for the new home of the Swiss Legation. The costs for structural alterations are estimated to be in the neighbourhood of two million Swiss francs.

Mlle. Elsa Cymbalisky, Secretary of the Swiss Consulate in Jerusalem was killed during recent acts of terrorism.

Ernst Suter, Swiss Consul in Stuttgart since 1919 has retired from his post.

André Petitmermet, Swiss Consul in Tunis, has been appointed Consul at Marseilles.

Petitmermet is a citizen of Yvorne (Vaud) and was born in 1890 at Athens. He entered the Consular Service in 1925 as chancellor of the Swiss Consulate at Athens. In 1939, he was transferred to the Consulate in Tunis.

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NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

Monsieur Maximilian Jaeger, Swiss Minister in Portugal, has tendered his resignation to the Federal Council, for reasons of health.

Dr. M. Jaeger, was born at Baden in 1884, and hails from Herznach (Ct. Aargau). He studied law at the Universities of Zurich, Paris, Rome, Vienna and Berlin. After having obtained his academic status as *doctor juris utriusque* from the University of Zurich, he entered the Swiss Foreign Office in Berne in 1909.

After having served in the capacity of Attaché and Secretary of Legation at the Legations in Rome, Berlin, Paris and Madrid, he was promoted, in 1919 to the rank of Counsellor of Legation.

In 1922, Dr. Jaeger was appointed General Consul in Athens and two years later (1924) he was sent as Minister to Austria, which post he occupied until 1938 when he was transferred to Budapest where he remained until 1944. In 1945 he was nominated Minister at Lisbon.

The Federal Council has appointed Monsieur Alfred Brunner, at present Swiss Minister in Egypt, as Minister to Portugal in succession to Dr. M. Jaeger.

Minister Brunner was born in 1890, and is a citizen of Berne. He entered the Diplomatic Service in 1916, and after having served at the Legations in Vienna, Rome, Tokio, Constantinople and Bucarest, he was promoted in 1935 to the rank of Counsellor of Legation. In the same year, he was sent to Cairo as Chargé d'Affaires, and ten years later (1945) was promoted to Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary to the Egyptian Government.

Counsellor of Legation, Monsieur Julien Rossat, has been appointed Head of the Administration Department at the Federal Political Dept. in Berne, in succession to Monsieur A. Daeniker, who has recently been appointed Minister in India.

Monsieur J. Rossat, born in 1901, a citizen of Granges-Marnad (Vaud) entered the Diplomatic Ser-

Besides, being Director of the "Conservatoire" in Lausanne, he held the post as President of the "Eidg. Sängervereins." [A.T.S.]

The 100th anniversary of the Neuchâtel revolution was celebrated throughout the canton. The church bells were rung for a quarter of an hour. In all the churches religious services were held.

Monsieur Petitpierre, Swiss Foreign Minister and a Neuchâtelois himself, made an important speech in the cantonal capital, and the Grand Council held a solemn Meeting. All papers issued illustrated special editions. [A.T.S.]

The population of the canton of Neuchâtel at the end of 1947 numbered 126,858 persons. [A.T.S.]

Ernest Ansermet, the well-known conductor, has returned to Geneva after a successful concert tour in the U.S.A. [A.T.S.]

A committee headed by States-Councillor Albert Malche, has been formed at Geneva, in order to study the project of the erection of a monument in memory of Henri Dunant, the founder of the Red Cross. [A.T.S.]

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Army

The military tribunal of the 4th Division has sentenced a former policeman of Basle, Otto Dreiser, to fifteen years penal servitude, and expulsion from the army, for espionage during the last war. [A.T.S.]

Lieutenant-Colonel Albert von Tschärner has died at Aubonne at the age of 73.

The deceased reached the rank of major (General Staff) in the Swiss army, where he was a member of the Instruction Corps (Cavalry). In 1916, he joined the French Foreign Legion where he reached the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. [A.T.S.]

During practice on the shooting ground at Grandvillard (Ct. Fribourg) a gun barrel burst, severely injuring a gunner, Ernst Geissler, from Utzenstorf. P. Lieutenant Hans Urech, from Aarau, had his leg fractured. [A.T.S.]

A mechanic, Walter Arn (1914), employed by the military aerodrome of Payerne, was hit by a propeller and killed. [A.T.S.]

The death is reported from Thun of Colonel Georg Bluntschli, a former member of the Instruction Corps (artillery), at the age of 70. [A.T.S.]

Traffic

The Appenzell Railway, which owns and works the 21-mile metre-gauge electric railway connecting Appenzell, via Urnäsch and Herisau, with Gossau (on the Zürich — St. Gall main line) is to be amalgamated with the Appenzell-Wasserauen Railway, owning and working

the 4.3-mile metre-gauge electric line linking Appenzell, via Weissbad, to Wasserauen. The amalgamation is to take place in the near future, and will be made effective from January 1st this year.

The cross-channel service for Paris and Switzerland via Folkestone and Calais will be resumed on Sunday, May 9th. The service will operate daily, and will leave London (Victoria) at 14.30, Folkestone harbour at 16.50 and Calais Maritime at 18.49, arriving at Paris (Nord) at 22.50. In the inward direction the service will depart from Paris (Nord) at 08.05, Calais Maritime at 12.30 and Folkestone harbour at 14.40, arriving at London (Victoria) at 16.20. The Anglo-Swiss Express train will run from Calais to Switzerland daily in both directions to connect with the cross-Channel service.

A new series of four stamps has been placed on sale by the Swiss postal administration.

It includes a five centime stamp commemorating the Treaty of Westphalia of 1648 which recognised Swiss independence.

The Swiss Football Federation has decided not to enter a team for the Olympic Games tournament in London this year, it is announced in Zurich.

Customs officers at Northolt Airport rubbed their eyes in amazement when the party of Swiss motor agents bound for the Standard Company's factory disembarked from the big four-engined Constellation aircraft in which they had flown from Geneva. It wasn't the fact that the party of over 40 motor agents was such a large one which caused the customs officers to blink. It was what the agents appeared to have brought with them, what appeared to be a tyre big enough to fit one of the Constellation's giant under-carriage wheels.

Instead it was an enormous Swiss cheese, weighing almost a hundredweight, and it was being brought over as a gift to the Standard Company, in whose canteen it is now being put to very good use.

National-Councillor Bringolf, chairman of the Parliamentary section of the Swiss Social-Democrat party, yesterday sent a telegram to M. Gottwald, Communist Prime Minister of Czechoslovakia, protesting against the persecution of non-Communists, reported Berne radio. He said:

"I appeal to you to discontinue the persecution of people who hold views differing from yours. Democracy and Socialism are inseparably linked and their realisation and consolidation imply the guarantee for personal freedom and the rights of the people."
