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For the first time in history of the Swissair, one of their Air Liners, on the return journey from Johannesburg (S. Africa) landed at Accra (British West Africa).

The Swiss Colony, consisting of about 60 persons, headed by the Swiss Consul Knittel, gave the "DC-4" machine an enthusiastic reception.

After a stay of 1½ hours, the air liner continued its flight to Geneva.

The journey from Johannesburg to Geneva (4,700 kms.) took less than 14 hours. The machine was piloted by Flight-Captains Borner and Hans Kuhn. [A.T.S.]

The Union for Inland Navigation in northern Italy will hold a congress in Ferrara from May 20th to 22nd to study schemes for international waterways to link Switzerland with the Adriatic Sea and the development of inland traffic along the Po Valley.

The Congress will be attended by experts from all over Italy, as well as delegates from abroad.

Economics

A delegation of Swiss bankers and Government officials has left for Washington to discuss the U.S. Treasury plan to sequester as "enemy property" dollar holdings in U.S. banks of foreign nationals who do not declare them before June 1st. The appointment of the delegation announced by the Swiss Government followed strong protests by the Swiss press against the U.S. Treasury's plan which, it was said, "violated the principle of bank secrecy."

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The following Universities in Switzerland: Basle, Berne, Fribourg, Geneva, Lausanne, Neuchâtel and Zurich, which, at the beginning of this year were invited to send delegates to the 600th anniversary of the Karls University in Prague (Czechoslovakia), have now declined the invitation owing to the recent events which have taken place in that country. [A.T.S.]

The Swiss Colony in San Francisco has sent a donation of 6,000\$ to the Swiss Red Cross to be used for needy children in the countries which were at war. In appreciation of this gift one of the "Chalets" of the "Kinderhilfe" will bear the name "Chalet of the Swiss Colony San Francisco." [A.T.S.]

The Central Committee in Zurich of the Swiss National Day announced that the total result from the sale of 1st of August badges in 1947 amounted to 1,070,000.—frs.

The proceeds from the sales of those badges amongst Swiss citizens abroad produced the amount of 44,000.—frs.

The 1948 collection will be used for the fight against tuberculosis. This year's badge represents the Great Seal of the Confederation with the escutcheons of the Swiss cantons and has been struck on the occasion of the centenary of the Swiss Constitution.

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FAREWELL LUNCHEON TO THE SWISS MINISTER AND MADAME PAUL RUEGGER by the Council for the Study of Swiss Problems.

The above Council invited their members and guests to a Farewell Luncheon in honour of the Swiss Minister and Madame P. Ruegger on Monday, March 22nd, 1948, at Brown's Hotel, Dover Street, W.1.

Mr. E. Steiner, President of the Council, welcomed the Minister and Madame Ruegger and extended a special welcome to Monsieur M. Petitpierre, Swiss Foreign Minister, and Madame Petitpierre, who are on a private visit to this country.

Other guests included, Dr. A. Escher, Counsellor of Legation, Monsieur and Madame de Graffenried, Monsieur and Madame Hunziker, Monsieur and Madame Aubaret, and Mr. Stauffer, Editor of the Swiss Observer.

After a short *resumé* with regard to the work of the Council by the President, Mr. A. Renou, the energetic and vivacious Secretary of this Council, paid a high and moving tribute to Monsieur and Madame Ruegger for the devoted services they had rendered both to our country and to the Swiss Colony in Great Britain, not forgetting the Minister's collaborators at the Legation.

He expressed the regrets of the members to see our sympathetic Minister leaving a post, which he had held with such distinction and success, and wished both him and Madame Ruegger God speed and success in their new sphere of activity.

Mr. Renou, then referred to the presence of Monsieur and Madame Petitpierre, saying that the visit of a Federal Councillor amongst the members of the Council was highly appreciated and a great honour.
