Annual General Meeting.

In terminating his report, Mr. de Cintra thanked his colleagues on the committee and the members for their helpful and loyal collaboration.

It was proposed and accepted that Monsieur Paul Ruegger, formerly Swiss Minister in London, should be elected an Honorary Vice-President of the City Swiss Club.

Mr. F. G. Sommer was proposed and elected as President *pro tem* during the elections of a new committee; on behalf of the members he paid tribute to the President and his colleagues for their services rendered to the Club.

In relinquishing his temporary office, Mr. F. G. Sommer, speaking on behalf of the members, congratulated Mr. de Cintra on his election as president, wishing him and his colleagues on the committee, a successful year of office.

Mr. de Cintra, taking the Chair, thanked Mr. Sommer for the able way in which he had conducted the meeting during the elections, and gave expression of his gratitude to the members for having charged him and his colleagues, with the guidance of the Club.

And the cattle return to their lowly byre.


