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
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NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

Dr. Paul Ruegger, President of the International Red Cross in Geneva, has returned from his trip to the Near East

where he had studied conditions in connection with the Palesting events on the spot. At a Press Conference he gave news relating to the safety of the personel of the International Red Cross.

The customs receipts during the month of May amounted to 41.6 million francs.

During the first five months of the current year altogether 168 million francs were collected by the Federal Customs Office, or 30.3 million more than during the same period in 1947.

Monsieur Albert Posse Rivaz, the newly appointed Minister of Venezuela, has presented his credentials as Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary to the President of the Swiss Confederation.

It has been announced from Prague, that Dr. Jaromir Lang, a former Professor at the pedagogical faculty of the University of Prague has been appointed Czecho-Slovakian Minister in Berne. [A.T.S.]

The Hungarian Minister in Berne, Monsieur Jmre Oltvanye, has expressed to the Committee of the "Schweizerspende" the thanks of his country for the help they had given, he made, at the same time, a presentation to the Committee of an object of art.

Economics

The "Financial Times" in their issue of the 12th, of June, 1948, writes the following about the

"Swiss Industrial Outlook":

"Most of the main Swiss industrial companies have now published their reports for 1947. The chief fact that emerges is that satisfactory profits have only been achieved by increased outputs to offset rising costs.

Generally the accounts show a much more satisfactory situation than that described in the managers' reports. This is due largely to the fact that statistics refer to the past and comments to the future.

With only a few exceptions net profits have been higher than those of previous years, but this was only made possible by a still higher output, in order to compensate for increasing costs. This point has been given special consideration by all the Boards.

Whereas it was still possible for leading industries (such as chemistry, steel, machine-tools and aluminium) to step up their output and sales to a higher level during the past year, doubts have been expressed fairly generally on the prospects of continuing such increases in the future.


The position has been aggravated by exceptional circumstances which have on the one hand created and accumulated demands for Swiss products, and on the other hand have diverted to Switzerland orders that would have normally gone elsewhere.

Swiss industrialists tried to meet this demand for quantity without giving up quality and therefore had to comply with legitimate demands of workers from whom a great deal is required. But such demands are particularly important for a manufacturing industry since they add, in determining prices, a new element which varies from one country to another, but which is independent from the world market of raw materials.

Although, in most cases, industry is sure of full employment for more than two years, the prospective difficulties are serious.

The gigantic efforts of many countries to export, the currency softness of some of the usual customers, the development of European reconstruction which involves the rebuilding of competing industries and the progressive meeting of accumulated needs, are among international factors which must be taken into account.

As far as the technical and financial situation of Swiss industries is concerned, it is quite sound in comparison with that prevailing after the first World War.



This cautious policy, however, has its compensations in the stability and strength it will give to Swiss industries in adverse circumstances, though it has entailed some restriction in profits which could have been made during the boom period.

Humanitarian

Through the intervention of our compatriot Christian Kunzle, of Birmingham, who has put his

property at the disposal of the British Government, a batch of twenty-five children in poor health have arrived at Davos Dorf (Switzerland) for an extended stay.

Sixty war-wounded officers and men from all branches of the three services left Northolt Airport in three specially chartered skyways aircraft for Zurich.

They are going for five weeks convalescence in Switzerland organised by the British and Swiss Red Cross under the Swiss hospitality scheme.

According to statistics published by the Federal Statistical Office in Berne, there were 1,64 million bicycles registered in Switzerland during 1947, or 85,000 more than in 1946. This means that every 3rd Swiss uses a bicycle.

A Swiss soccer team will meet an English team on December the 1st at Highbury.

PETITES CHOSES QUI FONT PLAISIR. ("Semaine Suisse") Service de Presse.

Le porte-parole du parti socialiste autrichien propose de créer une armée dès le départ des troupes d'occupation. Elle ne devrait pas être formée de mercenaries n'avant que la guerre en tête, mais bien de citoyens-soldats, comme en Suisse.

Deux savants suisses viennent d'être honorés à l'étranger : le professeur M. Lugeon, le célèbre géologue de l'Université de Lausanne, a reçu à Rabat les insignes

de grand-officier de l'ordre du Quassiam Alaouite et le Dr. Linus Birchler, qui enseigne l'histoire l'art à l'EPZ, a été fait commandeur de l'ordre de St. Grégoire par SS Pie XII.

M. Carl Burckhardt, Ministre de Suisse en France, a été nommé citoyen d'honneur de Lille et docteur h.c. de l'Université de cette ville.

Au village Pestalozzi, à Trogen, il y a maintenant des enfants de 7 nations différentes; 18 petits Finlandais viennent d'y arriver. Des enfants parmi les plus nécessiteux de Hambourg feront aussi un séjour en Suisse, ainsi que des gosses de Vienne, de Salzburg, de Berlin et de Hongrie.

Les usines Louis de Roll, de Gerlafingen, viennent de fêter leur 125ème anniversaire. Les ouvriers et employés ont reçu à cette occasion des cadeaux se montant, au total, à 1½ million de francs.

Une délégation birmane se trouve actuellement en Suisse pour visiter l'Ecole polytechnique et des établissements industriels.

La S.A. Radio-Suisse pour la télégraphie et la téléphonie sans fil a instruit plus d'une centaine de jeunes gens pour le service de transmission commerciale et de sécurité de l'aviation. Cette société est en liaison directe, par radio, avec 24 pays européens et d'Outremer. Pour étendre son réseau, elle doit acquérir un certain nombre de nouveaux appareils des plus modernes.

Devant la commission du budget du Sénat américain, l'attaché commercial des U.S.A. à Berne s'est déclaré heureux d'avoir à faire rapport sur un pays qui n'a pas besoin d'aide mais qui, au contraire, a porté secours à ses voisins. Le "Journal of commerce" a consacré un numéro de 120 pages à la Suisse. Le Dr. Cottier, de Berne, a été nommé Président du comité du trafic pour le plan Marshall.

Tenant compte de l'importance de la tâche de l'institut suisse d'étude du climat de haute montagne et de la tuberculose, à Davos, le directeur de son service médical, le professeur Berblinger, a décliné les offres qui lui ont été faites par les universités d'Jena, de Hambourg et d'Erlangen.

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
