
PRESIDENTS' ASSEMBLY.

The Assembly of Presidents of Swiss Societies in Britain has just held another meeting — the fourth since its constitution as the coordinating body in our Colony some 18 months ago. The rareness of these meetings makes rather crowded agenda unavoidable.

Chief among the matters discussed were: request for more support of the Swiss Club Schweizerbund; the failure of the negotiation on a Swiss Centre at No. 1, Gerrard Place; a plea for transfer facilities of current savings of long residents to Switzerland; the unsatisfactory position regarding Old Age Insurance premiums.

The rules of the Presidents' Assembly requiring annual election of the officers, who may not stay in the same office longer than one year. Dr. Egli was replaced by Mr. Sommer as Chairman; the latter's former position as Vice-Chairman was entrusted to Mr. Berti, President of the Unione Ticinese. Finally Mr. W. Meier is succeeded as Hon. Secretary by Mr. Streit, President of the Swiss Philatelic Society.

The Hon. President, Mr. Henry de Torrenté, our Minister, kindly offered the Presidents cocktails and refreshments before the meeting which was held at the Legation. M. de Graffenried, Dr. Bircher and M. Magnin were present at the meeting, at which of the provincial Swiss societies that of Dunfermline, Scotland, was represented on this occasion by Mr. Frick.



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
