NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

The Federal Council has elected Dr. Viktor Kühne, to the post of Vice-Director of the Federal Alcohol Administration in Berne.

Dr. Kühne, who is an advocate, was born in 1912 in Rieden (St. Gall), he entered the administration in 1938.

The Swiss Minister in Nanking has informed the Federal Political Department in Berne, that all Swiss Nationals are safe.

Dr. Azcarate and his staff have arrived in Switzerland to prepare for the discussions between Israel and the Arab States under the United Nations conciliation commission. The Swiss Federal Government has agreed that the meeting shall take place at Ouchy.

The Swiss cost-of-living index declined by 0.4 per cent. from the February level of 222 at the end of March in the series based on June 1914 equalling 100, and to 161.8 in that based on August 1939=100. These figures compare with 22.9 and 162.5 respectively in March 1948.

A Latin American Chamber of Commerce, with its seat in Basle, has been established in Berne. Seventeen Latin American countries are taking part, whilst the remaining three countries are expected to join the Chamber shortly. The new Chamber is to serve as an information centre on finance, commerce and industry, with the aim of furthering the trade relations between the Latin Americas and Switzerland.

The gold stocks of the Swiss National Bank, which during the first two weeks of April had only shown an insignificant rise, advanced by Frs.32.7m. to Frs.5,947m. during the week to April 23rd. This increase is attributed to transfers from foreign central banks under payments agreements. Foreign exchange holdings rose by Frs.31m. to Frs.363m. Notes in circulation show a substantial decline of Frs.42m. to Frs.4,186m.

Two thousand five hundred voters attended the "Landsgemeinde" of the canton of Obwalden, which took place in Sarnen on the 24th of last month. Arnold Ming, (Lungern) was elected "Landammann." [A.T.S.]

John Finnerty, the 16 years old Mayor of the childrens' village in Dobbs Ferry (U.S.A.) has paid a courtesy visit to the Mayor of the town of Zurich, he later on visited the "Pestalozzi Dorf" in Trogen. [A.T.S.]

The traditional "Sechseläuten" took place in Zurich on Sunday, April 25th. The procession of the various guilds was witnessed by a large number of spectators. [A.T.S.]

is resigning his seat shortly. Dr. Wahlen, who rendered eminent services to our country during the last war, when he was in charge of food provisioning, has been offered a leading position in the administration of an agricultural concern in the United States of America. [A.T.S.]

According to figures published by the "Finanzamt" of the town of Zurich for the year 1948, 404 (1947:385) persons have paid taxes on fortunes exceeding 1 million francs and 664 (1947:641) on exceeding half a million francs. [A.T.S.]

States-Councillor Melchior Hefti in Hätzingen (Ct. Glarus), has celebrated his 70th birthday anniversary. Hefti was, from 1920-1947 a member of the government of the canton of Glarus, and from 1932-1938 held the post of "Landammann." He entered Parliament (States-Council) in 1938. [A.T.S.]

A serious accident, costing the lives of four persons, occurred at a level crossing between the railway stations Wynigen and Rietwil (Ct. Berne), when a passenger train ran into a motor-car. It is stated, that the guard at the level-crossing omitted to close the barrier.

The names of the dead are: Will Aeschlimann (born 1916), architect in Zurich; Miss Mini Zahnd (born 1924), Zurich, fiancée of Aeschlimann, Roger Martin (born 1918), Retoucheur, Zurich; and Marguerite Martin, wife of the former. [A.T.S.]

The following deaths are reported from Switzerland:

Josef Zueger, since 1937, Manager of the Zurich municipal tramways, in Zurich at the age of 59. The deceased was also Manager of the "Zürcher Dampfboot Gesellschaft" and the "SernftalBahn."

Albert Wyss, for many years a member of the District Court Zurich, and a member of the "Kantonsrat" in Zurich, aged 72.

Adolf Manz, well-known Swiss actor, who for many years played leading parts at theatres in Frankfurt, Stuttgart, Cologne and Berlin. He returned to Switzerland in 1941, and has since played in a number of Swiss films. He died in Zurich at the age of 64.

Paul A. Mayer, for many years head of a large Swiss commercial concern in Manila, in Lucerne, at the age of 75. He was born in Bütschwil (Toggenburg), and educated at St. Gall. The deceased, was nominated eight times to the post of President of the American-Phillipine Chamber of Commerce.

August Durrer-Rothlin, from 1914-1939 Manager of the Stanserhorn railway at Stans, aged 72.

Paul Tribolet-Wächter, President of the "Verbands-Molkerei Berne" in Berne, at the age of 63.

Colonel Walo Gerber, in Zurich, aged 69, for many years President of the Swiss Aero Club. He was a well-known aeronaut having taken part in three Gordon-Bennett balloon races.

Dr. Théodore Delachaux, Professor of Philosophy at the University of Neuchâtel, in Neuchâtel, at the age of 70.

Alexandre Jaques, during 27 years a missionary and head of the teacher's seminary in Louis-Trichard (Transvaal) in Lausanne, aged 54.

Professor, Dr. Wilhelm Ehrenzeller, a former teacher at the "Kantonschule" St. Gall, and at one time a member of the Grand Council, in St. Gall, at the age of 62.

The monks of St. Bernard from the Swiss Alps — they are Canons of St. Augustine — are building a hostel for travellers on a trade route that crosses the Eastern Himalayas near the China-Burma border.

The hostel is rising on the 12,500ft. high Mount Latsa, between the Mekong and Salween rivers.

Idea of the hostel came from Archbishop de Guebriant, former general of the Paris Foreign Missions.

On his missionary tours among the mountains he saw the perils and rigours endured by the travelling merchants and their workers.

“Porters, in endless files, climb through the mountain range under crushing burdens and over snow-covered trails,” he reported.

“After exhausting days they have only a crude lean-to, open to the icy wind, for their night’s rest.”

Fr. Peter Coquoz, a St. Bernard monk, prospected the hostel’s site last winter.

The monks — all expert skiers and trained rescue workers — staff a mission district in the Himalaya area.

A contract to build a £9 million machine-tool factory in India has gone to a Swiss firm.
