NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

Monsieur M. Petitpierre, President of the Swiss Confederation has sent a telegram of condolence to the new King

of Sweden, Gustav VI, on the occasion of the death of his father.

The King and Queen of Thailand were the guests of the Federal Council at a dinner at the "Wattenwyl Haus" in Berne.

Monsieur Francisco d'Alama Lonsada has been appointed Minister of the Republic of Brazil, in Berne. *

During the month of September, 1950, the Swiss Federal Railways have carried 16.64 million passengers, or 1.51 million less than in September, 1949. The receipts are given as 23.46 millions francs (Sept. 1949: 25.54 million francs).

Goods traffic has increased by 377,000 tons and totalled 1.79 millions tons, receipts of which are returned as 30.31 million francs or 4.27 million francs more than in September, 1949.

The Federal Council has appointed Lieutenant-Colonel Ludovic de Bremond of Grattavache and Progens (Ct. Fribourg), a member of the Federal Instructors Corps, to the post of Military Attaché in Washington and Canada, in succession to Colonel Waibel, who is relinquishing his post.

The International Wheat Council has accepted the invitation of the Swiss Government to hold its fourth session at Geneva; the opening plenary meeting was held on October 24th.

The Swiss Finance Minister has announced in Parliament that the question of a renewal of gold sales to the public was being considered within the framework of comprehensive measures to combat inflation.

Cantonal

The Cantonal Bank of Lucerne has celebrated the 100th anniversary of its foundation, on this occasion the Board

has given an amount of 380,000.—frs. for various charitable purposes. [A.T.S.]

A sports machine, which took off at Grenchen, crashed near Altwis (Ct. Lucerne), on trying to effect a landing. The machine was destroyed but both pilot and passenger escaped injuries. [A.T.S.]

Professor Tadeus Reichstein, Professor Chemistry at the University of Basle, has, jointly with two Americans, been awarded the 1950 Nobel Prize for Medicine, his work on the hormone cortisone has given relief to millions of sufferers from arthritis.

Professor Reichstein has been, until 1938, a lecturer of Chemistry at the Federal Institute of Technology (ETH) in Zurich, and since 1938, Professor of Chemistry at the University of Basle. [A.T.S.]

The late Dr. Joh, Knüsi, a medical practitioner of Speicher (Appenzell a. Rh.), has left an amount of 57,910.—frs. for educational purposes to the commune of Speicher. His widow has bequeathed an amount of 36,000.-frs. to the Home for old people in Speicher. [A.T.S.]

According to figures published, 143 Traffic accidents during the month of September, 1950, have occurred in the canton of Aargau. Eight people were killed and 94 injured. [A.T.S.]

The Rockefeller Foundation of New York has just announced that it has granted a certain number of gifts for research work. The lists contains in particular a gift of 4,500 dollars to the Federal Polytechnical School at Zurich. This gift has been made in respect of research work carried out regarding the treatment of polluted water and the further use of waste products at the Federal Institute for the treatment, cleansing and protection of water, whose investigations have given interesting and promising results.

Dr. Max Thoma, of Basle, the successor of Dr. Raymond Gafner, of Lausanne, as the new President of the Swiss Ice Hockey League, has just given the press some interesting information regarding the season which will open at the end of October. The eight clubs in the national league are split up into two groups: Davos, CP Zurich, Berne and Basle in group I, and Lausanne, Arosa, the Young Sprinters of Neuchâtel

and the Zurich Grasshoppers in group II. Championship matches will start on the 3rd December.

Several tournaments will be organised, on the 19th November at Basle, on the 16th and 17th December at Lausanne (The Devred Cup in which teams from Davos, Zurich, Milan and Lausanne will take part) and from the 28th to the 31st December at Davos when the Spengler Cup will be contested by two German teams and a Swedish team, and teams from Lausanne and Davos.

The international season will rapidly get under weigh. Two matches will be played against Sweden, on the 10th November at Zurich and on the 12th November at Basle. The Basle rink will be available in good time in order to ensure training for the national team from the 27th to the 29th October. In particular, all players who this year obtained the title of European champion in London will be invited to this training course.

Another important event in the international season will be the visit of a Swiss team to England. The players of the national team will constitute the backbone of the team for several younger players will be accompanying them. The party will include fifteen players who will be engaged in the following matches: 20th November at Streatham, 21st November at Brighton, 23rd November at Wembley, 24th November at the Empress Hall, the 25th November at Harringay and the 27th November at Nottingham.

Matches against the Swedish team are arranged for the 8th and 10th December at Stockholm. The British Federation will be sending to Switzerland a national professional team which will play two matches on the 12th and 14th January at Zurich and Basle. This tour, however, has to be specially authorised by the International League. The United States team will play in Switzerland on the 2nd and 4th March and the culminating point of the season will be the two Switzerland-Canada matches which will be contested on the 20th and 22nd March at the Zurich Hallen Stadium. The British and Americans will also be the guests of the Arosa, Zurich, Lausanne and Basle clubs.

The players selected for the world championships which will take place in Paris from the 9th to the 18th March will report for training at the beginning of March. The national B team will also be busy. On the 8th and 10th December, they will be playing at Lausanne and Berne against France and at the beginning of 1951 against Finland. The juniors have not been forgotten, and will participate in regional selection games, the best being selected to go to Davos in January.

The scheme for opening an artificial rink at Geneva will probably not be put into effect this winter. The

There will be a new stand for more than 700 spectators, an essential thing having regard to the considerable popularity of ice hockey throughout the entire country.

Official statistics inform us that 154,080 motor vehicles entered Switzerland in August as compared with 113,266 last year. For the period from January to August, the total amounts to 525,496 as compared with 387,342 in 1949, 21,346 more than the total for the whole of the previous year.

France leads for the month of August with 88,558, followed by Italy with 25,956, Belgium and Luxembourg with 13,744, Great-Britain with 9,085, Germany with 5,032, Holland with 5,022, after which comes Africa with 1,704, the three Scandinavian countries with 1,117 and North, Central and South America with 1,010.

We have already given the majority of the most important dates in the Swiss ski-ing calendar. In the meantime certain further information has come to hand and the following is a complete and final list: 6th-7th January, Mont-Lachaux Trophy, Crans-Montana; 13th-14th January, Lauberhorn Races at Wengen and the Women's International Races at Grindelwald; 17th-30th January, Swiss International Jumping Week; 26th-28th January, the Four Track Trophy at Villars; 3rd-4th February, Wasserngrat Derby and the Air France Cup at Gstaad; 16th-17th February, the St. Moritz White Ribbon; 1st March, Dorftaeli Race at Davos; 4th March, the Parsenn Derby at Davos; 17th-18th March, the Gornergrat Derby at Zermatt; at the end of April, the Great Titlis Slalom at Engelberg—and the 20th May, the Gross-glockner Races.

A few days ago, a ceremony took place on the occasion of the transfer of the remains of 22 officers, N.C.O.s and other ranks of the Belgian Army who died in hospital. Their bodies were conveyed by motor-lorries from Leysin to Belgium. The Belgian Government was represented by General Deronsard, President of the Belgian Red Cross, accompanied by various officers, and the Federal Military Department (was represented by Major Greppin, Chief of the medical section of the Military Health Services, and orations were given in their presence. Leysin has still in hospital there some 250 Belgian patients, both military and political deportees of the last war.
