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NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

The Federal Council has appointed Monsieur August Ochsenbein, at present Counsellor of Legation in Madrid,

to the post of Consul General in Barcelona.

M. Ochsenbein, was born in 1901 in Solothurn and received the degree of doctor of political science at the University of Berne. He entered the Diplomatic service in 1925, and has held various posts in Manchester, Danzig, Breslau and Berlin. He was promoted to the rank of Counsellor of Legation in 1941. In the year 1946, he held the post of Chargé d'Affaires in Vienna. Since 1948, he has been 1st Counsellor of Legation at the Swiss Legation in Madrid.

Monsieur William Warnock, Minister of the Republic of Eire, has presented his credentials to Monsieur Max Petitpierre, President of the Swiss Confederation. He formerly represented his country in Stockholm.

Minister Warnock is the first Minister of Eire in Switzerland, as this country was hitherto represented by a Chargé d'Affaires.

General Mohammed Omar Khan, the newly appointed Minister of Afghanistan, has presented his credentials to M. Max Petitpierre, President of the Swiss Confederation. He was until recently Minister of War in Kabul.

Devadas Ghandi, son of the late Mahatma Ghandi was received in Berne by the President of the Swiss Confederation, and entertained at an official reception. Mr. Ghandi, is the Editor-in-Chief of the "Hindustan Times" and President of the Association of Indian Editors.

Professor Erhard, Minister of Economy for Western Germany, at present in Switzerland, has paid a courtesy visit to the President of the Swiss Confederation.

Customs receipts during the month of January, 1950, totalled 33.6 million francs, or 0.9 million francs less than in January, 1949.

In a referendum, the Swiss electorate rejected by 386,172 votes to 333,223 a law which had been accepted by Parliament granting subsidies to firms for housing programmes.

Cantonal

The Government of the canton of Uri has officially received the recently appointed Army-Corps Commander

Dr. Bolla was elected a Federal Judge in 1925, as successor to Mr. Garbani-Nerini. Previous to his appointment to the Federal Tribunal, Dr. Bolla practised as a lawyer in the canton of Ticino, and at one time he occupied the post of Professor of law at the University of Pavia. [A.T.S.]

The government of the canton of Vaud has passed a law prohibiting the entrance of children under seven years of age to the cinemas whether they are accompanied by their parents or not. [A.T.S.]

Burglars entered the premises of a Watch Manufacturing firm in Neuchâtel and got away with 1,500 watches representing a value of 20,000.—frs. [A.T.S.]

Army

Switzerland is to bring about 30 high Army officers and civilian contractors before a military tribunal shortly.

The decision follows an inquiry which is alleged to have revealed grave defects in several Alpine gun positions.

Col. Jakob Eugster, Chief of the Army Legal Department, said at a Press conference that one-third of the pill-boxes examined in a certain defence area were found to be defective.

Col. Eugster said some of those concerned in constructing the sites had made considerable profits. As a result of the defects Switzerland's whole fortification system was checked, he added.

Economics

The following Swiss Banks have declared their dividends for the year 1949: Schweizerischer Bankverein:

6 per cent. (1948:6%); Swiss National Bank, Berne: 6 per cent; Schweizerische Kredit-Anstalt, Zurich: 6 per cent. (1948: 6%); Aktiengesellschaft Leu & Co., Zurich: 5 per cent. (1948: 5%); Hypothekar Kasse des Kanton Fribourg; 5 per cent. 1948: 5%); Schweizerische Volksbank, Berne: 4½ per cent. (1948: 4½%).

The South African Minister of Finance said the recently announced Swiss loan to the Union was repayable two years after the date of signing the agreement or three years after that date, at the option of the

Government, by delivery of 7,500 kilogrammes of fine gold to the lending banks.

From April 1st next, Switzerland will be recognised by Canada as a non-scheduled country, and from July 1st. Canada will lift the import prohibition on a number of Swiss goods. This will benefit, in particular, the Swiss textile industry.

Swiss imports from Canada last year amounted to Frs.154m., while exports were valued at only Frs.47m.

A previous arrangement provided for the increase of annual travel allowances from \$150 to \$2,500 per head.

Gold stocks of the Swiss National Bank during the first week of February dropped by Frs.9.7m. to Frs. 6,245m. A decline of Frs.3.2m. had been recorded for the previous week. Foreign exchange holdings on February 7th were Frs. 1.8m. lower at Frs.268m.


From the National Bank's report for the past year it can be seen that out of a total gold reserve of Frs. 6,240m. at end-December as much as Frs. 4,334m. was

deposited abroad.

The effects of the National Bank's attitude in curtailing gold dealings in recent years are clearly reflected by the profit and loss account, which shows revenue from gold and foreign exchange dealings in 1949 at Frs.7.7m., against Frs.16.7m. in 1946. Gold sales to individuals are still suspended.

Notes in circulation at end-December, 1949, were covered by gold to the extend of 136 per cent. This is usually high, seeing that the gold cover prescribed

by law is only 40 per cent.

and German.

Hans Stoffel, co-founder of the "Plombenfabrik, Stoffel & Sohn" of Horn, in Arbon at the age of 76.

Dr. Paul Murisier, formerly Professor of Zoology. at the University of Lausanne and Conservator of the Zoological museum of the University, in Vevey at the

Dr. Robert von Ernst, well-known gynacologist, and President of the Medical Association of the canton

of Geneva, at the age of 67.

From Switzerland comes the story of potted news on tap to telephone subscribers by simple dialling as we do for TIM. In Berne and Basle it is now possible to so receive a three-minute summary of news in either

German or French. Later Italian is to be added and the service extended to other areas. The bulletins are prepared by the Swiss Telegraph Agency and are independent of radio bulletins. They are kept up to date by six revisions between 6 a.m. and 9.30 p.m. development was inevitable, some place, some time. It cuts out the waste of time waiting for regular bulletins. It won't hurt newspapers. It will help them. Anybody so news conscious as all that will want all the background information several good newspapers can give them.

Von unserm Londoner O Korrespondenten.

Erschienen in "Baster Nachrichten".

Es gehört wohl nicht zum Alltäglichen, dass ein Zeitungsmann einem andern ein Kränzchen windet. Nichtsdestoweniger ist es vielleicht in der Heimat zu wenig bekannt, dass in London unter dem Titel "The Swiss Observer" alle vierzehn Tage ein Kolonieorgan herauskommt, das von einem Basler, Paul F. Boehringer, gegründet worden ist. Sein Sohn führt seit dem Ableben seines Vaters den Betrieb, der gleichzeitig eine Druckerie umfasst, weiter, während ein gemütlicher Berner, A. Stauffer, für die Redaktion des S.O. — so wird die Zeitung in der Kolonie genannt — verantwortlich zeichnet.

Der Zweck eines solchen Kolonieorgans ist ein mehrfacher. Einmal verbindet es seine Leser dadurch mit der Heimat und den dortigen Vorkommnissen, dass die ersten paar Seiten einem eigentlichen Nachrichtendienst aus der Schweiz gewidmet sind. Rubriken "Eidgenössisches", "Kantonales", "Wirtschaftliches" "Verkehr" "Armee" wird den in England ansässigen Schweizern — und andern, die den S.O. lesen mögen — alle vierzehn Tage eine Auslese der am meisten interessierenden Nachrichten aus der Schweiz geboten. Wer sich eine schweizerische Tageszeitung hält, wird diesen Nachrichtendienst rascher überfliegen, als derjenige, der aus irgendwelchen Gründen, vielleicht auch finanziellen, darauf verzichten muss. Bis vor etwa zwei oder drei Jahren war der Redaktor des Swiss Observer für die Zusammenstellung seines Nachrichtendienstes aus der Heimat auf zwei oder drei schweizerische Tageszeitungen angewiesen, die sich seiner erbarmten und ihm ein tägliches Gratisexemplar zustellten. Seit einiger Zeit aber erhält er den ganzen schweizerischen Nachrichtendienst der Schweizerischen Depeschenagentur zugestellt, was ihm selbstverständlich seine Arbeit wesentlich erleichtert.

Sodann verbindet der S.O. die Schweizer in London mit denjenigen in den Provinzen, endlich die Englandschweizer mit der Heimat — nicht nur die Heimat
