NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

Monsieur v. Steiger, President of the Swiss Confederation, and M. Petit-pierre, Foreign Minister, have received the following diplomats accredited to the Confederation who were presenting their credentials.

Monsieur Ake Henrik Gartz, Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary of the republic of Finland. The newly appointed Minister was from 1944-1946 a member of the cabinet, where he held the post of Minister of Commerce; in 1950, he was appointed Foreign Minister.

Monsieur Pal Korbacsics, Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary of the republic of Hungary.

Monsieur Stanislaw Trojanowski, Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary of the republic of Poland. Monsieur Trojanowski was until recently a Secretary of State in the Polish Ministry of Education.

Monsieur Theodor Heuss, President of the Federal republic of Western Germany, has arrived at Locarno for a three weeks stay. He was greeted on his arrival by a delegation of the government of the canton of Ticino, headed by M. Lepori.

The Federal Council has appointed M. Charles, Edouard Rosset to the post of Swiss Consul in Alexandria. M. Rosset was born in 1898 at Bougy-Villars (Ct. Vaud), he entered into the service of the Political Department in 1925. After a stay at the Swiss Legation in London he was transferred to the Swiss Consulate General in New York.

Customs receipts for the month of September 1951 totalled 46.3 million francs, or 10.9 million francs less than in September, 1950.

The receipts for the first nine months of the current year are returned as 458.9 million francs, which exceeds by 38.9 million francs the receipts for the same period in 1950.

Cantonal

The Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of London, Sir Denys Lowson and Lady Lowson, accompanied by the Sheriffs Messrs. Denis H. Truscott and C. J. Harman, the City Marshal, Colonel J. Hulme Taylor and the City Sword Bearer, Mr. William T. Boston, arrived in Zurich on the 5th of this month in a Swissair machine, making a three days return visit to the Mayor and Mayoress of Zurich, who were entertained at the Mansion House last summer.

On descending from the plane at Kloten, they were greeted by the Mayor of Zurich, Dr. E. Landolt, "Stadtschreiber" Dr. W. Bosshard and Mr. Marrioth, British Consul General in Zurich.

A short reception was held at the office of the Mayor where town councillor Baumann, Vice-President of the Municipal Council of Zurich, welcomed the distinguished visitors; during the reception the town band gave a concert outside the town hall.

On the following morning the Lord Mayor and his party paid a visit to the "Zürcher Altstadt", dwelling houses, schools, hospitals and the "Hallenbad". In the afternoon, a Press conference was held at the town hall, followed in the evening by an official reception at the "Muraltengut" which was attended by a number of high officials of the Municipality of Zurich.

Dr. E. Landolt, in his welcoming address stressed the friendly relations which had always existed between London and Zurich which were based on historical events. As a *souvenir* of their stay in Zurich, he presented the English guests with illustrated books of the old town of Zurich.

The Lord Mayor, Sir Denys Lowson, in his address, expressed his pleasure and thanks for the warm reception he and his colleagues had received in Zurich; he too referred to the friendly relations, which had always existed not only between the two cities




Emanuel Gyger, well-known photographer of mountain and flower subjects, in Adelboden, aged 65.

Charles Pilicier, the oldest lawyer in the canton of Vaud, in Yverdon, at the age of 89. The deceased was from 1916-1918, President of the cantonal Chamber of advocates.

Henry Chappaz, a former editor of the "Tribune de Lausanne" and for 28 years editor of the "Feuille d'Avis", in Lausanne, at the age of 55.

Canon Leone Boschetti, a former rector of the seminary Lugano, in Faido.

Arturo Salvioni, Publisher of the "Dovere" the official organ of the Liberal-radical party of the canton of Ticino, in Bellinzona.

Dr. phil. Emil Künzli, for nearly 50 years Professor of Geography at the "Kantonsschule" Solothurn, of which school he was Vice-Director from 1933-1941, in Solothurn at the age of 78.

Otto Landolt, a well-known landscape painter, and for many years a prominent member of the "Kunstgesellschaft" Lucerne, in Lucerne aged 63.

Pater Bonifaz Graf, at the cloister Einsiedeln, at the age of 83. The deceased was for many years Professor at the "Stiftsgymnasium" and afterwards a priest in Trachseln and Euthal; from 1930-1944, he was

"Spiritual" at the "Frauenkloster" Seedorf. He enjoyed a great reputation as a writer and composer of church music.



Swiss Church leaders are demanding that the Bible be exempted from purchase tax.

Lucerne branch of the Swiss Red Cross says the "Swiss Action for British War Wounded" has come to an end after giving 513 British war veterans four weeks of rest and care in Switzerland.

Already arrangements have been completed for the opening and for the racing season of the Cresta Run at St. Moritz. Unique in the world, dating back to 1884, to ride the Cresta demands perfection of nerve and body and ranks as a thrill with the Grand National.

Only the devotion of men whose names are closely associated with it — and will be as long as it exists — made reopening of it after the war possible. Under the presidency of Lord Brabazon of Tara, the committee, as strong as that in any sport, set about the job and, with the close collaboration of the Swiss authorities, the famous run is now flourishing once more. The Cresta will be open from "Stream" on December 21st, and from "Junction" on January 5th, and the Curzon Cup will be held at the end of the season in mid-February.

But expenses have increased enormously. By comparison with pre-war days they are double. The main

source of income is the annual Cresta Ball, to be held this year at the Dorchester on Wednesday, December 19th, when it is expected that sportsmen from the whole world will attend, for the Cresta, with its tradition, demands no passport and knows of no frontiers. It has one requisite only — fine sportsmanship.

Swiss interests in Rumania.

An agreement was concluded in December, 1950, providing for compensation to Swiss owners of assets in Rumania which had been nationalized or confiscated. It now appears that a similar arrangement is indicated in respect of Swiss-owned property that is *not nationalized*. A sale of such property is in present circumstances practically impossible; it yields, moreover, only a modest revenue, which is not even sufficient to cover maintenance costs. The Swiss authorities are, therefore, endeavouring to find a solution with the Rumanian Government for the disposal of this property.

Swiss nationals in the United Kingdom, *who have not yet informed* the Swiss authorities of their ground properties in Rumania, are, therefore, invited to send, by the 30th October, 1951, to the Swiss Legation in London, 18, Montagu Place, W.1, any details that may help to specify these properties, in particular:

1. Name, address, date of birth, nationality (state if dual national and, in the case of Swiss nationality having been acquired, state when acquired and previous nationality).

All this information must be certified.

2. Location and kind of ground properties; state of the buildings; acquisition documents and date of purchase; annual income from rents, etc.; purchase price; sale price in 1939 and 1944, with attached certificate of Land Register; legalized purchasing contract; inheritance certificate; if possible number of the judicial registration; insurance policy; rates certificates; rents receipts; etc.

This Communiqué applies also to the nationals of the Principality of Liechtenstein residents in Great Britain.
