AUGUST MUELLER †.

It is with deep regret that we announce the passing away of Mr. August Mueller which occurred on Saturday, the 17th inst., after a heart attack.

Mr. Mueller was born in St. Gall in 1891 and was at one time apprenticed to a leading firm of Ironmongers in Zurich. He decided later to seek his fortune in London, and in May 1912, within a few months of his arrival, he joined the well-known firm of International Sugar Brokers and Produce Merchants, Messrs. C. Czarnikow Limited in whose service, interrupted only by a brief period in the Swiss Army during the First World War, he remained throughout his life.

Mr. Mueller was a gifted accountant and after rapid promotion, his undoubtedly ability and unfailing loyalty found recognition in his appointment as Secretary of the Company in April 1922, which position he still held at the time of his death.

In spite of his heavy professional duties our departed friend took an active part in the life of the Swiss Colony; he was for many years a member of the Swiss Male Choir and the Swiss Mercantile Society, and at one time was also actively connected with the Swiss Church.

He was a man of high integrity, of a sympathetic nature, always ready to help any deserving cause, and his untimely death is greatly deplored by all those who knew him.

The large attendance at his funeral was a proof of the respect in which he was held and of his popularity.

We extend to his widow and daughter our deepest sympathy in their bereavement.
