Sir,
On February 19, 1803 at Les Tuilleries in Paris, Napoleon Bonaparte handed to the Swiss Deputies his Act of Mediation, which abruptly ended the Helvetic Republic, One and Indivisible, restored sovereignty to the former Thirteen Cantons, and gave sovereign powers to further Six Cantons, namely Aargau, Grisons, St. Gall, Thurgau, Ticino and Vaud.

Such historic act which re-confirmed Switzerland's unique character of unity in diversity is being celebrated at home next year in the Cantons concerned.

As some of the six "new" Cantons are strongly represented in the London colony, I hope that the anniversary will not give rise to a spate of celebrations in a year which will be notable, here in England, for functions connected with Her Majesty's coronation.

It would be most fitting on the other hand if all the "ressortissants" from these Cantons joined forces and organized a joint 150th Anniversary of their Cantonal Independance at once decorous and stirring.

The centenary of the same event was celebrated at Monico's 50 years ago at a memorable function over which Minister Gaston Carlin presided; the Unione Ticinese were then the promoters. Will the "Vaudois", or perhaps the "Grisonais" give the lead this time?

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JUBILEE OF Mme. SOPHIE WYSS.

To celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of her baptism into English musical life Mme.
