After the tea Mr. De Maria welcomed the official guests, and thanked members and friends for their encouragement and support. He was followed on the platform by Mr. Lepori, who spoke in Italian to his London compatriots. He appreciated the opportunity of being once again among them. As he had been "ordered" by the Entertainments Committee to speak for at least a quarter of an hour, he excused himself for broaching an official subject which was nevertheless of vital interest to all, namely the Citizenship Law which the Federal Chambers at home had recently adopted. This Law brought changes in the status of children of foreign born Swiss, and of Swiss women who marry foreign nationals. Hearty applause thanked Dr. Lepori for having dealt with such a dry matter in a most entertaining manner.

Dancing thereupon resumed to the toe-teasing tunes of Harry Vardon's Band, whilst MC Virgilio Berti directed the award of prizes for the "spot" dances.

The organisers are to be congratulated on a most enjoyable evening.
