This year's Xmas Banquet and Ball of the Anglo-Swiss Society was again a great success.

About 300 members and guests were received, at the Dorchester Hotel, by the Rt. Hon. Sir Arthur Salter and Lady Salter, the Swiss Minister and Madame de Torrenté.

The President of the Society, the Rt. Hon. Philip Noel Baker, P.C., M.P., was unable to preside, being away from this country at the time, and Sir Arthur Salter, a Patron of the Society, therefore, took the Chair.

The English members predominated, which is hardly surprising when one realises how many functions of all kinds have taken place in the Swiss Colony during the last three months.

Although I had attended, previous to the festive season, various affairs, which were in one way or another, connected with Xmas, it was not until the evening of the 17th of December, that for the first time in 1951, I beheld a Xmas tree, and came across Father Christmas.

What happy memories a Xmas tree always recalls, even to the older generation? it creates invariably a "Stimmung" all of its own, and right from the start there was a congenial atmosphere of mirth and gaiety prevalent, which increased in intensity as the evening wore on.

The top table, where the invited guests were seated, was charmingly decorated with flowers and large silver candle-sticks carrying red candles which shed a becoming glow all over the ball-room. A huge Union Jack and the Swiss Flag formed an impressive background.

An added attraction, from the decorative point of view, was the placing of the cantonal flags on the various tables. Whilst on previous occasions I had, as it should be, sheltered under the Bernese flag, this

time I sought refuge under the banner of the canton Appenzell, A.Rh., as a compliment to a good friend of mine present, who some four years ago introduced me, during a holiday, to this lovely corner of our homeland.

A Xmas dinner without Turkey, and Xmas pudding is unthinkable, and these good things were forthcoming and much enjoyed.

The entrance of the traditional pudding was quite an impressive affair, the lights were dimmed and in were carried, on silver salvers, innumerable Xmas puddings well and truly "alight" throwing out blue sizzling flames.

Whilst last year, there were no speeches apart from the loyal toasts, this year various addresses were given by different speakers.

After the toasts to H.M. the King and the President of the Swiss Confederation, the "Swiss Cake" of huge dimensions made its solemn entry, accompanied by Father Xmas, and Mr. Gandon's Accordionists who played appropriate music whilst it was wheeled around, cut, and afterwards distributed to the company.

Sir David Kelly, at one time British Minister in Berne and later on H.M. Ambassador in Moscow, gave the toast: "Anglo-Swiss Friendship", to which the Swiss Minister, Monsieur Henry de Torrenté replied, other speakers were the Chairman, Sir Arthur Salter and Sir Harry Britain, who all referred to the friendly feelings and close relations between the two countries



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expressing the wish that the mutual connections might, if possible, become still closer.

The dance music was provided for by Arthur Salisbury and his Dance orchestra and by A. Gandon and his accordionists, dressed in Swiss costume; both bands were excellent and especially our accordionists, who made things lively by playing a few "Ländler" and quick waltzes.

Dancing went on with remarkable perseverance until midnight, when this most successful festival came to a close with the singing of Auld Lang Syne.

Lieutenant-Colonel St. Townend, the Director of the Society is to be heartily congratulated on the very efficient arrangements, everything went like clockwork and without a dull moment.

A really fine and enjoyable evening.

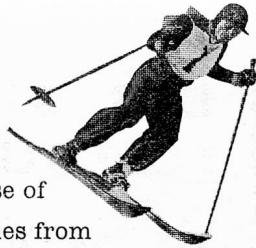
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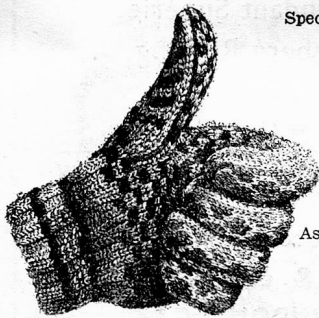
