On New Year's Day, Monsieur K. Kobelt, President of the Swiss Confederation, received at the Federal Palais in Berne, the representatives of the cantonal and municipal authorities of Berne, and members of the Diplomatic Corps, representing fifty accredited missions.

The Federal Council has decided to open a Legation in Djakarta (Indonesia), and has appointed Monsieur René Naville, Counsellor of Legation, as Chargé d'Affaires.

Monsieur Naville was born in 1905 in Cologny (Geneva). He studied law at the Universities of Geneva, Basle, London and Berlin. He entered the diplomatic service in 1931, and two years later he was sent to Paris as Attaché and later on was promoted to the rank of Secretary of Legation. From 1941-1945 he was in charge of the Swiss Consulate in Paris. In 1945, M. Naville was made a Counsellor of Legation and sent to Venezuela as Chargé d'Affaires, where he remained until his return to Berne in 1949.

The South African Minister of Finance, Mr. N. C. Havenga, whilst passing through Switzerland, paid a courtesy visit to Dr. Kobelt, President of the Swiss Confederation. A dinner, offered by the Federal Council, was given at the "Wattenwyl House" in honour of the distinguished guest.

Counsellor of Legation, Dr. Egbert von Graffenried, has been appointed 2nd deputy to the Chief for "Politische Angelegenheiten" at the Federal Political Department in Berne. (Dr. von Graffenried was, for a number of years at the Swiss Legation in London, first as Commercial Attaché and later on as 1st Counsellor of Legation.)

Major Hans Raeber (born 1909 in Lucerne), a member of the Instructors Corps (Artillery), has been appointed Military and Air Attaché to the Swiss Legations in Stockholm, Oslo and Copenhagen with seat at Stockholm, in succession to Colonel of division Probst.

Mr. Albert Jakob Schlatter (born 1891 in Zurich), has been appointed "Eidg. Oberforstinspektor" in succession to the late Dr. Emil Hess.

The Swiss Federal Railways carried 17.03 million passengers in November 1951, 1.41 million more than in November, 1950. The receipts are returned as 19.14 million francs (Nov. 1950: 17.56 million francs).

Goods traffic has increased by 236,000 tons, reaching a total of two million tons carried; the receipts of which are given as 34.54 million francs, which is 3.48 million francs more than in November, 1950.

Dr. Arnold Ith, for the last 23 years "Verkehrsdirektor" of the town of Zurich, has vacated his post, he is succeeded by Dr. Werner Kämpfen. [A.T.S.]

The late Mlle. Frieda Vogt (Zurich), has left an amount of 50,000.—frs. to the home for old people in the commune of Kirchberg (Ct. Zurich).

Dr. Ernst Fritsche, physician-in-chief of the "Kantonale Krankenstalt" in Glarus, has retired from his post; he was, for the last 40 years connected with this institution. [A.T.S.]

Mr. Josef Schmid-Lütschg, architect, and since 1941, mayor of the town of Glarus, is relinquishing his post for reasons of age. He is 78 years old. [A.T.S.]

Mlle. Marguerite Janson of Leubringen has been awarded the Literary Prize of the town of Bienne, as a token of appreciation for her work as a novelist. [A.T.S.]

Dr. E. Lüscher, Professor of Otology at the University of Basle, has been nominated an honorary member of the Royal Society of Medicine in London. [A.T.S.]

The "Bündner Tagblatt" published at Chur, official organ of the Conservative Popular Party, has celebrated its 100th Jubilee. [A.T.S.]

Mr. Fritz Schoder, Librarian of the town of Zofingen, has been nominated Honorary citizen of that town. [A.T.S.]

The late Dr. Gustav Kuchler, lawyer, who recently died at Muri (Ct. Aargau), has left various legacies to different charitable institutions, amounting to 43,000.—frs. [A.T.S.]


Robert Maron, a notary in Montreux, and from 1923-1945, President of the commune of Planches-Montreux, in Le Locle, aged 66.

Dr. Karl Miescher (60), Director of the CIBA and head of the Pharmaceutical Department; he enjoys an international reputation as a scientist. In 1946, the University of Basle honoured him with the degree of *doctor honoris causa*.

Emil Junker (60), Director of the "Kohlenunion Geldner, A.G.", an authority in the coal industry.

Dr. Franz Stämpfli (70), from 1916-1948 "Bundesanwalt". In 1941, he was honoured by the University of Berne with degree of *doctor honoris causa*.

Despite more stringent prosecution and imposing heavier fines and even imprisonment in some cases, traffic accidents are still on the increase as the following figures show:— *Ct. By 113 votes to 4, the Swiss National Council has decided on a three years' experimental plan for television.

The experimental station will be constructed at Zurich, at an estimated cost of Frs. 4,000,000 (£325,000).

The cost will be met by public loans, and contributions from various sources, including the Swiss Confederation.

The première of the opera, "La Botte Rouge," was recently given at the Stockholm Opera. Afterwards a dinner was given at the Swiss Legation in honour of the Swiss composer, Sutermeister.

A group of Swiss banks has concluded an agreement with Mr. Havenga, the South African Finance Minister, for a loan to South Africa of 300 million Swiss francs (about £24,500,000) at 4 per cent., repayable in 18 years. It is expected that the loan will be issued two months after the approval of the agreement by the South African Government. Bondholders will have the choice of being paid either in Swiss francs or in South African currency.

The doubling of the Zurich-Sargans-Buchs main line is proceeding rapidly. The Reichenburg-Ziegelbrücke and Unterterzen-Flums sections were doubled in 1950. The second track has been completed on the 1½-mile Schübelbach-Buttikon-Reichenburg section, on which double-track working began on December 18. In the 36 miles between Zurich and Ziegelbrücke, only 4½ miles are still single, between Lachen (25 miles from Zurich) and Schübelbach-Buttikon. This section is to be doubled within the next two years.
