how much they were enjoying themselves. To ensure, that nobody oversteps the mark, there is a Master of Ceremony, in the person of "George" who good humouredly does the announcing and "marshalling" and over all the benevolent eyes of Mr. and Mrs. Bachofen watch to see that everything is conducted in an orderly manner.

In the entrance hall a buffet is installed where sandwiches, cakes, tea and coffee are served at reasonable prices.

Yes, indeed, it is a great job they are doing, and they fully deserve every support the Colony can give them, by their sacrifices they give to many of our youngsters untold pleasure, and what is most important, they keep them away from the dangers of getting into wrong company.

I wish the Swiss Youth Club every success it so richly deserves.
