Customs receipts for the month of February, 1952, totalled 42.4 million francs, which is 5.5 million francs less than in February, 1951.

The damages which Swiss nationals have sustained during the riots in Cairo are estimated to amount to about 3 million francs. The greatest damage was done to the Groppi concerns (as mentioned previously) whose Restaurants were totally destroyed. The deceased was born on July, 25th, 1878, in Zurich, the son of Robert Schwarzenbach, the wellknown Silk industrialist. After his schooling in Switzerland he went to a Public School in England and afterwards continued his studies at the University of Cambridge, where he took his degree as a Bachelor

After an apprenticeship at Lyons he entered, on the death of his father (1904), at the age of 26, the firm at Thalwil, where, with his two brothers, he carried on the parental business with great success.

In the army he reached the rank of Brigadier-Colonel (Cavalry). Colonel Schwarzenbach was one of the pioneers of the "Zivilluftfahrt" in Switzerland and sat on the Board of "Swissair".

Dr. Rudolf Steiger, since 1938, a member of the Cantonal Court of St. Gall, in Rorschach, aged 55.

Louis de Vallière, Engineer in Lausanne, at the age of 84. The Chauderon-Monbenon bridge at Lausanne, the railway lines Aigle-Sépey-Diablerets and Nyon-Saint Cergue-Morez were built from his plans. In the army, he reached the rank of Colonel of artillery,

The Philippines and Switzerland have signed an agreement allowing Philippine airlines to land at Geneva and Zurich.

Sir John Barbirolli, conductor of the Hallé Orchestra, will conduct the first symphony concert which opens the famous International Music Festival at Lucerne on August 9th.


An advance party of five Swiss Alpinists left Geneva by air on the 13th inst. for Bombay on the first stage of their attempt to climb 29,000ft. Mount Everest. The leader, Dr. Wyss Dunant, and six others have left on March-20th.

They will go on to Nepal to organise 120 porters for the climb which is due to start in April.

Swissair is reported to be considering the operation of a direct service linking Zurich and Montreal. DC-6Bs would be used.

The A. S. W. Rosenbach collection of Shakespeare folios and quartos, said to be unrivalled in quality and rarity, has been sold to Dr. Martin Bodmer, of Geneva, for a price considerably more than \$1m. (about £360,000). Dr. Bodmer, who is a banker and vize-president of the International Red Cross, is reported to have the finest collection in Europe.

There are 73 items in the sale. Among them were four folios, including the Holford-Rosenbach first folio, the most superb copy in existence; the first issue of the first edition of *Troilus and Cressida*; and all the individual plays issued before the first folio was



printed except *Richard III*, of which there is no copy in private hands.

The first folio, like the other three folios, is in its original binding, and, according to the Rosenbach Company, is "untouched, unwashed, and perfect."

The last remaining exhibits that made up the Polish museum, which was housed in the 14th-century Rapperswil Castle, near Zurich, have been returned to Warsaw, The majestic, three-towered castle, now empty, is to be used by the International Institute for Castle Research.

For sportsmen throughout the world the beginning of 1952 is marked by an intense preparation for the forthcoming summer Olympic Games, which are to be held at Helsinki in July. Swiss gymnasts, among the best in the world, are expected to carry off many of the prizes, and for a while now a number of them have been undergoing intensive training.

The selection of the Swiss gymnasts to go to Helsinki will take place after the final of the Swiss championships at Lausanne on March 30th. Because of this, the championships, which are being held in the new hall of the Swiss Fair (Comptoir Suisse), will take on an even greater importance. Taking part will be Switzerland's 20 best gymnasts, of whim several are world champions.

The outstanding powers of such men as Josef Stalder, Frey, Tschabold, Gunthard, Gebendinger and Thalmann, who capture the admiration of laymen and specialists alike, assure spectators of an event of great interest. The contest promises to be lively, with many promising competitors struggling for first place, while the 20 referred to will do all their best to be chosen for the team of ten to go into training before carrying their country's colours to Finland.

This year's "Tour de Suisse" (the all-Switzerland cycling race) will take place from June 14th to 21st — midway between similar races in Italy and France. It will consist of eight stages, and there will be no rest day. It is believed that the route will not be so difficult as in the last few years, but it will include a time trial. Although the final itinerary has not yet been announced it is known there will be stages in Eastern Switzerland, North-Western Switzerland, the Jura region, the Cantons of Vaud and the

Lower Valais, the Bernese Oberland, Central Switzerland, the Tessin and the Grisons.

Inaugurated last year and placed under the patronage of Pablo Casals, this year's Zermatt Musical Festival opens in mid-August and is to last three weeks. The famous violincellist will himself take a Bach interpretation course for stringed instruments. Other courses will be: violin (under Mr. Sandor Végh), violincello (Mr. Paul Grümmer) Lieder (Mr. Gerhard Hüsch), chamber music (Messrs. Grümmer and Végh). The detailed programme, which is to be issued shortly, includes a number of public concerts to be given by internationally-known artists.

According to the Swiss Horse-racing Federation, the following races will be held in Switzerland this year: May 17th-25th at Lucerne (International Races); May 18th at Zurich (second date still to be fixed); June 2nd at Frauenfeld (Thurgau); June 7th-8th and 15th at Morges (near Lausanne); June 14th-15th at Berne; June 28th-29th at Thun (National Races); July 5th-6th at Bâle; August 10th at Saignelégier (Bernese Jura); August 30th-31st at Yverdon; September 7th at St. Gall; September 28th and October 5th at Arosa.

Thousands of yodlers, clad in gay native costumes, will take part in a rustic pageant, when the 9th Swiss national yodlers' festival convenes at St. Gall on July 11th to 13th.

The programme for the three-day festival includes processions of yodlers and costume groups on Saturday and Sunday, July 12th and 13th. The pageant will depict local folk customs in the various parts of Switzerland throughout the year.

The festival is expected to attract some ten thousand spectators. Visitors from abroad will be able to combine their enjoyment of costume pageants, yodeling, Alpine horn blowing and flag throwing with a visit to St. Gall's permanent attraction, its abbey, one of the most famous in Europe with its rich collection of early manuscripts and printed books.

St. Gall, the highest city of its size in Europe (2196ft.) is 53 miles north-east of Zurich on the direct route connecting Zurich with Lake Constance and Southern Germany. It was named after the Irish monk, Gallus, who established a Benedictine abbey on the site of the city in the seventh century. St. Gall is now world famous for its textiles, including cotton, muslin, embroidery and lace.

The King of the Belgians, accompanied by the Princess Joséphine-Charlotte and his two younger brothers has arraved at Gstaad on March 3rd. The royal party includes Professor Samuel Wursten, the King's former tutor and ski instructor.
