54% of the electorate went to the poll.

The Swiss Federal Assembly, or joint meeting of the two Chambers of Parliament have elected Federal-Councillor, Dr. Philip Etter, President of the Confederation. Dr. Etter was born on December 21st, 1891, at Menzingen (Ct. Zug), he received his schooling at the "Kantonsschule" in Zug, and the "Stiftsschule" in Einsiedeln.

He studied law at the University of Zurich, and in 1917 established himself as a lawyer at Zug. Dr. Etter took a great interest in the politics of his native canton, and sat from 1917-1922 in the "Kantonsrat", and became later on (1927) a member of the cantonal government.

In the year 1930, he entered Parliament (States Council) where he soon made a name for himself as a shrewd Parliamentarian. Four years later (1934) he became a member of the Federal Government in succession to Federal Councillor Musy, who had vacated his office.

Dr. Etter occupied the Presidential chair in 1939, 1942 and 1947. In the army he held the rank of major (Infantry); he belongs to the catholic-conservative party, and is the first representative of the canton of Zug to become a member of the Federal Government.

Federal-Councillor, Rodolphe Rubattel has been elected Vice-President of the Confederation for 1953. He was born on the 4th of December, 1896, at Villarzel, in the Broye valley. On completion of his school education he studied law at the Universities of Lausanne, Paris and Vienna, and holds the degree of doctor of law of the University of Lausanne. He then took up journalism as a profession, and in turn was Editor of the "Feuille d'Avis de Montreux," "Tribune de Lausanne", "Feuille d'Avis de Lausanne", and "La Revue".

In 1939, he entered the Grand Council of the canton of Vaud as a liberal, and eleven year later (1944) he
