# CITY SWISS CLUB CHRISTMAS DINNER. at the Dorchester Hotel.

The traditional Xmas Dinner of the City Swiss Club took place on Tuesday, December 15th at the Dorchester Hotel, Park Lane, W.1. Mr. R. Pfenninger was in the Chair, and there were about 80 members and guests present.

Although there was no Xmas tree, nor any mistletoe — no Ladies being present —, there was a very happy and genial atmosphere reigning in the Orchid Rooms. Christmas, the feast of good cheer was close at hand, and the Meeting was, so to say the Hors d'Oeuvre of the festive Season.

After cocktails having been served in one of the ante-rooms, the company adjourned to the dining room, which was, as usual, generously decorated with lovely flowers.

behind, several of the company did likewise, although some had no idea how to do it, and their agonising performance sounded more like the shricking of a banshee. Still the spirit was willing.

For my special benefit, a good friend of mine, hailing from "Jura Bernois" — in that part of the canton Berne where there is a separatist movement, which is more noisy than dangerous — together with some of his friends from the same *endroit* started to sing their new "National Anthem", no doubt expecting that I should right away burst into tears.
