On this occasion his subject was "La Légende des Siècles de Victor Hugo" delivered in French, with his usual lucid delivery and crystal clarity. After a few introductory remarks and banter with the Chairman, our President Mr. Berner, he recited during the course of his lecture, extracts from various poems: "La conscience", "Le Régiment du Baron Madruse", "Après la Bataille", "Le Crapaud", and lastly and very movingly, "Les Pauvres Gens. As a recurring theme througout the lecture he quoted these astounting lines:

"La Suisse, dans l'histoire, aura le dernier mot, Puisqu'elle est deux fois grande, étant pauvre et là-haut."
