### **NEWS AT RANDOM**

Federal

The Federal Council has promoted Monsieur Paul Clottu, to the rank of He was from 1947-1952

Social Counsellor at the Swiss Legation in London, and in August, 1952, was transferred to the Political Department in Berne where he occupies the post of Head of the Administrative Department.

We are tendering Monsieur Clottu our heartiest congratulations on attaining the rank of Minister. During his séjour in London he made many friends, who at the time greatly regretted his departure.

Minister Clottu, who was born in 1897 hails from the canton of Neuchâtel. He studied political science at the Universities of Neuchâtel, Berne and Geneva. He is a licensié ès sciences politiques of the first named University.

In 1920, he became a member of the International Labour Office in Geneva, and after twenty years of collaboration with this office, and a short time at the Central Agency for Prisoners of War at the International Red Cross Committee, entered the Swiss Civil Service as one of the heads in charge of the allowances scheme for soldiers and their families.

This was followed with the appointment in 1945, as deputy chief of the division of the "Office fédéral de l'industrie, des arts et métiers et du travail ". dealing with the protection of workers. Whilst at the Foreign Office in Berne, Monsieur Clottu attended several International conferences, as a delegate of the Federal Council.

Dr. A. R. Lindt, who was Press Counsellor at the Swiss Legation in London from 1946-1953, has also been promoted to the rank of Minister. Whilst in the Metropolis, he was very popular, especially with Journalists of both countries, and his promotion, on which we are tendering him heartiest congratulations, has been received with great satisfaction. Dr. Lindt occupies at present the office of President of the UNICEF (United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund) with Headquarters in New

York. He was born in 1905 in Berne, and studied at the Universities of Berne and Geneva.

The Belgian Ambassador, Vicomte de Lantsheere, Doyen of the Diplomatic Corps in Berne, is vacating

Vicomte de Lantsheere was appointed in June, 1945, Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary to the Swiss Confederation, and in June, 1953, he was promoted to the rank of Ambassador.

The Netherlands Government has appointed, Mr. J. R. Belmont, Director of the Bâloise-Transport, as Consul-General in Basle, in succession to the late Mr. H. Burkhardt.

The Swiss Federal Railways have carried 16.72 million passengers in May, 1955, or 510,000 more than in May, 1954. Receipts: 26.75 million francs (May, 1954: 25.94 million francs).

Goods traffic has increased by 215,000 tons, and is returned as 1.97 million tons. Receipts: 38.15 million francs (May, 1954: 35.32 million francs).

The Upper House (States Council) of the Swiss Parliament accepted a motion to abolish an article of the Swiss Constitution that forbids Jesuits to work in churches or schools Switzerland. There was no dissent in the 44 member house.



On the 1st of July, 1955, the population of the town of Lausanne numbered 115,469. [A.T.S.]



A new Swiss highway code, the draft of which was published recently, provides that no vehicle, including bicycles, may be used without third party insurance. There is also provision for limited compensation by the Government for damage caused by unknown drivers or cyclists.

Trade negotiations between France and Switzerland, which have been going on for the past two months, have been broken off in complete deadlock.

The Swiss Federal Council has issued a statement saying that the latest French proposals were so far from Swiss ideas that further negotiations were impossible. Any future talks must, for the time being, be carried out through diplomatic channels.

Raymond Lambert, the famous Swiss climber, is due in Katmandu next month to head an eight-man Franco-Swiss team in an attempt on the 24,299-foot Ganesh Himal peak.

The centenary of the first ascent of Monte Rosa, the highest peak in Switzerland, by the brothers Smith and their party was celebrated at Zermatt, when Mr. L. S. Amery and Sir Arnold Lunn drew attention to the part played by British climbers in the conquest of the Alpine peaks. In honour of the occasion a dozen Italian guides crossed the snowbound Théodule Pass, and Herr Hermann Buhl, the Austrian who two years ago reached the summit of Nanga Parbat alone, came to Zermatt from Macugnaga by scaling the famous rock wall of Monte Rosa.

The United States Navy has withdrawn security clearance from Dr. Fritz Zwicky, a Swiss expert in rocket and jet propulsion, who was awarded the medal of freedom in 1949 by former President Truman.

The navy said that the clearance was withdrawn because he had not declared his intention to become an American citizen, but it would reconsider the question if he changed his mind.

The decision means that Dr. Zwicky will be excluded from research projects which he originated.

Dr. Zwicky said in Pasadena, California, he had not sought United States citizenship because he felt that, as a Swiss, he could travel about the world with fewer restrictions and thereby fight Communism.

Dr. Zwicky was awarded the freedom medal for his work in jet propulsion.

For the "gourmet", the gastronomic specialities of the country—"raclettes valaisannes" for example — and visits to wine-cellars in the vineyards of Vaud, will complete the pleasure of discovering for oneself the artistic treasures of the country. Motor Coaches on Swiss Alpine Roads.

In order to prevent possible disappointments for Motor Coach Operators and their clients, attention is hereby drawn to the regulations concerning admission of coaches to certain passes:

The width of motor-coaches may not, as a rule, exceed 2.20m.  $(7'2\frac{1}{2}'')$  and,in the case of coaches with low pressure tyres (balloon tyres) 2.25m. (7'5'').

As an exception, foreign motor-coaches up to a width of 2.50m. (8'2") are permitted on the following roads:

- 1) Coire Lenzerheide Julier Maloja Castasegna, Silvaplana - Zuoz or Pontresina.
- 2) Coire Reichenau Thusis (but not beyond).
- 3) Bellinzona Airolo Gotthardhospiz (but not beyond), Bellinzona Olivone.
- 4) Amsteg Wassen Susten Innertkirchen Meiringen and Wassen Goeschenen (but not beyond).
- 5) Brigue Simplon Gondo.
- 6) Brigue Gletsch (but not beyond).
- 7) Martigny Grand St. Bernard.
- 8) Lucerne Brunig Interlaken.

The Swiss highway authorities have drawn up these regulations in the interest of safety and the smooth flow of traffic on Alpine roads. They invite the co-operation of all motor-coach operators.

The peaceful use of Atomic Energy. The International Conference on the Peaceful use of Atomic Energy will be held in Geneva from August 8th to 20th; 84 countries have announced their intention to take part and various national trade exhibitions will be organized on this occasion. The scientific and technical exhibits, which are mainly of interest to the scientific delegations, will be on view in the United Nations Palace, where space however will be somewhat restricted. The different national exhibitions intended to initiate the general public into some of the mysteries of the atom, and the trade exhibits brought to Geneva by industrial firms working with atomic energy, are expected to be housed in the Exhibition Palace, which has a total floor space of some 130,000 square feet.

An important exhibition in Lausanne. summer, from June 24th to September 26th, the Cantonal Museum of Fine Arts at Lausanne will be presenting a very important exhibition, which will in a way be a continuation of the exhibition "Rhythms and Colours" held in 1952. Its title "Movement in Contemporary Art" indicates its aim: to show the attitude adopted by certain young artists to the phenomenon of movement and speed which is such a feature of life to-day. The first to be concerned with this problem, about the year 1911, were mainly the Futurists, and the exhibition will open with works by Severini, Balla, Carra, Russolo, Boccioni, etc. Then will come the artists who carried on the movement in France: Delaunay, Jacques Villon, Marcel Duchamp, Leger, Dufy and Picasso. The next group will be composed of four artists whose fame is still

growing, Kandinsky, Klee, Miro and Wols. Last will come some twenty artists from Paris and five from Switzerland — all painters of the avant-garde.

The exhibition will consist of a hundred or so paintings and about ten works of sculpture. It is expected to be of great interest, as it will be the first time that an exhibition has been held with "movement" as its theme.
