Federal

Monsieur Clemente Rezzonico, Swiss Minister in New Delhi, has also been accredited to Colombo (Ceylon), but

will reside in New Delhi.

Dr. Hans Keller, Counsellor of Legation, in the capacity of Chargé d'Affaires ad interim, will be in

charge of the Legation in Colombo.

The new Chargé d'Affaires hails from Hagenbach (Ct. Berne); he entered the diplomatic service in 1943, and successively held posts at the Swiss

Legations in Prague, Moscow and Ankara.

The Federal Council has appointed a Swiss delegation to take part at the UNESCO conference, which will be held at New Delhi from November 5th to December 5th, 1956. It comprises the following members: Pierre Bourgeois, Director of the Federal Library, Bernard Barbey, permanent delegate of UNESCO, Ernest Boerlin, National Councillor, Mlle. Anne-Marie Du Bois, of the University of Geneva, Pietro Pellegrini, Vice-President of the Grand Council of the canton of Ticino, Professor C. Regamey of the Universities of Fribourg and Lausanne, E. Riehner, Vice-President of the Pro Helvetie foundation.

An agreement has been initiated between Switzerland and Norway aimed at eliminating double income taxation, capital taxation and death duties.

The agreement will be signed in Oslo in the near future, and then submitted to the Swiss and Norwegian Parliaments for ratification.

By 130 votes to 30, the Swiss Parliament has decided in favour of a speed limit of 50 km. (31 m.p.h.) in towns, villages and built up areas. A proposal for a speed limit in the open country has been deferred until the December session.

The Swiss Federal railways carried during August, 1956, 16.9 million passengers, or 300,000 fewer

than in August, 1955. Receipts: 31.4 million francs. (August, 1955: 31.9 million francs).

Goods traffic is returned as 2.24 million tons, or 256,000 tons more than in the same period in 1955. Receipts: 42 million francs. (August, 1955: 41.4 million francs.)

The President of the Swiss Confederation, Dr. Markus Feldmann, and Monsieur Max Petitpierre have received the following diplomats at the Palais Fédéral in Berne when they presented their credentials: Monsieur Willem Christiaan Naude, Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary of the Union of South Africa, and Monsieur Abdel Shafi el Lablan, Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary of the Republic of Egypt.

The American Ambassador in Berne, Miss Frances Willis has paid a visit to a number of watch manufacturing concerns at Grenchen and Pieterlen. She was accompanied by States-Councillor de Coulon, General Manager of "Ebauche" S.A., and Paul Renggli, President of "Asuag".



DEATHS.

The following deaths are reported from Switzerland:

Dr. Arthur Rohn, an expert in the building of bridges and dams, and a former rector of the Federal Institute of Technology (ETH) Zurich, in Zurich, at the age of 79.

He was born at Geneva, and after attending the technical secondary school at his native town went to the Federal Institute of Technology at Zurich where he took the diploma of building engineer. Having had some years of practical experience with the bridge building division of the Jura-Simplon Railway and with a foundry at Sterkrade, in the Rhineland, he was appointed professor of building statics and bridge building at Federal Institute of Technology, Zurich. He was able to visit engineering projects in south Russia, the United States and Canada, and in 1919 in recognition of his technical knowledge and his talents as a teacher he was appointed dean of the department of civil engineering at Zurich, becoming rector of the college in 1923. He was the author of numerous theoretical and practical treatises on his subject, and he designed and superintended the construction of bridges himself, including some



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bridges of complicated structure. He also introduced and patented innovations in machinery for hoisting ships. He was one of the engineers who went to Ireland to study the Shannon power scheme and give advice on the proposed construction.

Dr. med. Georges Patry, for many years a member of the International Red Cross Committee. He was at one time in charge of the army medical corps of the 1st division with the rank of Colonel, in Celigny, aged

Marcel de Carlini, for a long period collaborator at "Radio Geneva", and author, in Geneva, at the age of 55.

Mrs. Amanda Troendle-Engel, drawing mistress, in Solothurn, aged 95.

Emil Duenner, Journalist and collaborator for over 50 years of various Liberal papers, in St. Gall, at the age of 80.

Jos. Sauter-Klee, Publisher, in Basle, aged 66. Albert Koller, since 1947 editor of the "Appenzeller Volksfreund" and formerly "Ratsschreiber" of the canton Appenzell I.Rh., in Appenzell, at the age of 53.

Rudolf Haegni, Zurich dialect author, in Zurich, aged 68.

Josef Holdener, for 43 years a teacher at the secondary school of Arth, in Arth at the age of 69.

Dr. Josef Lenzlinger, a former States Prosecutor of the canton of St. Gall, in St. Gall, aged 68.

Mme. Jeanne-Adrienne Perrochet-Junod, painter and sculptor, in La Chaux-de-Fonds, at the age of 78.

Isaac Revillod, formerly rector of the Gymnasium, Montreux, in Montreux, aged 86. [A.T.S.]



VARIOUS.

Swiss insurance companies have decided to levy a supplementary war risk premium of 0.25 per cent. as from September 24. As a result, the new premiums against war risks will, until further notice, amount to 0.35 per cent. for Egypt, as well as for ships destined for Indonesia, Hongkong, Thailand, and other countries via the Suez Canal.

The new premiums for that part of China extending north from Canton up to and including Manchuria, Port Arthur, and Dairen, via the Suez, will amount to 0.45 per cent. For all other transport via the Suez Canal the premium will be 0.2875 per cent.

An 1,800 ft. tower, nearly twice as high as the Eiffel Tower in Paris, is to be built for the 1964 Swiss National Exhibition at Lausanne.

Switzerland displayed the surprise item at the 43rd Paris Motor Show which opened its doors early this month, namely a plastic four seater saloon called the "Soletta", powered by a 748c.c. flat twin engine underneath the back seat. It has a maximum speed of 66 m.p.h. and does 60 miles to the gallon. Designer is Willy Salzmann.

A model railway lay-out, claimed to be the biggest in the world, is attracting thousands of people to a little house specially built near Zurich Zoo.

The lay-out is a miniature of the whole region of the Bernese Alps, including the Berne-Lotschberg-Simplon tunnel, and nearly 500 yards of track over which 15 trains can circulate at once.

Among the 42 famous summits represented is the mighty Jungfrau, with the mountain railway climbing its flank. The model also includes many of the aerial cableways of the region and steamships on the Lake of Brienz.

Some 20 miles of wiring lead to a central control panel for the lay-out, which measures some 25 yards by 15. Various sky effects also can be obtained electrically on a backcloth.

In conjunction with their Associate Company, Acrow Venezuela S.A. in Caracas, Acrow Engineers (Export) Limited have secured the contract for the steel formwork for the Dam, Power Station and ancillary works on the Caroni River between Caracas and Maracaibo.

The contract was placed as a dollar export from this country by the well-known French contracting firm Campenon Bernhard S.A. of Paris, who are carrying out this project through their Venezuelan associates.

Albert Ferber, who has just returned from a 3½ months tour in South America, where he had a brilliant success, needs hardly any introduction as by his excellent playing at many Wigmore Hall recitals he has made a name for himself in the music sphere of this country.
