CITY SWISS CLUB CHRISTMAS DINNER at the Dorchester.

The candles on the Christmas tree have burned out, the singing of carols has ceased, all the rich Christmas "cheer" has been digested, the bells have rung in the New Year, and there remain only memories.

Amongst these is the Christmas dinner of the City Swiss Club, which took place on Tuesday, December 13th, at the Dorchester.

Mr. Gysin then acquainted the meeting with the news, that Mr. R. Pfenninger, Manager of the London Office of the Swiss Bank Corporation, and a former President of the Club, has been nominated one of the General Managers at the Head Office in Basle, and is succeeded by Mr. H. Knoll, hitherto Deputy Manager, also a member of the City Swiss Club. As both gentlemen were present, the President, on behalf of the members, extended to them heartiest congratulations on their promotions (Applause).

Mr. Pfenninger expressed his appreciation for the cordial way in which the President's announcement was greeted, wishing the Club a bright and prosperous future.


