J. H. UNGRICHT. †

We deeply regret to announce the passing away on February 19th, in his 84th year, of Mr. J. H. Ungricht, of 28, Bramber Road, Worthing.

The deceased was born at Dietikon (Zurich) and came to this country at the age of 19. For a great number of years he held a position with the firm of A. Strauss & Co., Metal Merchants, then at 16, Rood Lane, E.C.3. After his retirement in 1923, he went to live at Worthing. He was married to an English lady, who died more than 20 years ago.

Mr. Ungricht was at one time very active in the London Colony. He joined the Swiss Mercantile Society in 1903, of which Society he became President in 1910. In 1953 he was presented with the Veteran's plaque (for 50 years' membership) of the "Schweiz. Kaufmännischer Verein".

Owing to advancing years and increasing deafness he was but seldom seen in the Colony of later years. Some few months ago he had to undergo a serious operation from which he never really recovered.

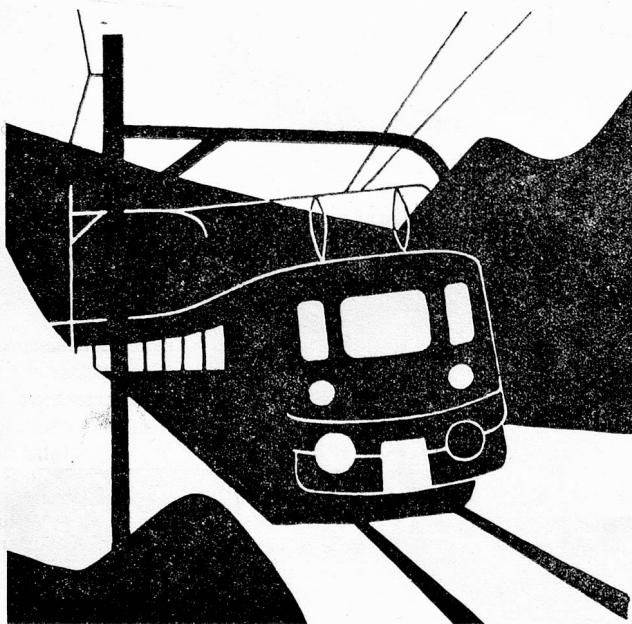
The departed was of a retiring and generous nature, and those who have known him will always remember him with affection.
