Federal

The Federal Council has appointed Dr. Fritz Hegg, at present Swiss Minister at Tel-Aviv, to the post of

Minister in Hungary.

Minister Hegg was born in Berne in 1903, and is a citizen of Münchenbuchsee (Ct. Berne). He studied law at the Universities of Berne, Munich and Florence, and entered the service of the Confederation in 1931. Dr. Hegg has successively occupied posts at Besançon, Montreal, Toronto, Oslo and Stockholm.

In 1946 he was appointed Chargé d'Affaires and later on Minister at Helsinki. After a short stay at the Federal Political Department (Swiss Foreign Office) he was appointed in 1954 Minister at Tel Aviv.

Monsieur Felix Schnyder, since 1954 1st Counsellor of Legation at the Swiss Legation in Washington, has been appointed Minister in Tel Aviv.

Minister Schnyder was born in Burgdorf and is a citizen of Kriens (Ct. Lucerne). He studied law at the University of Berne and afterwards occupied

various posts in commercial concerns.

In 1940 he entered the service of the Federal Political Department and successively occupied posts in Moscow, Berlin and Washington. On his promotion to Counsellor of Legation in 1949 he was nominated head of the "Swiss Delegation" in Berlin. Since 1954 Minister Schnyder has functioned as 1st collaborator to the Minister in Washington.

The Federal Council has nominated Monsieur Pierre Dupont, Counsellor of Legation, to the post of Swiss Minister to Venezuela and Panama with residence at Caracas.

Minister Dupont was born at Geneva in 1912. He studied law and qualified as a barrister. In 1939 he entered the service of the Federal Political Department and was sent to the Legation in Paris as Attaché. Five years later (1944) he was transferred to Brussels. In 1948 he became a member of the Swiss Delegation

at the "Organisation for European Economic Co-operation" (O.E.E.C.). In 1953 Monsieur Dupont was recalled to Berne where he was put in charge of the Finance Section at the Federal Political Department.

The American Ambassador in Berne, Miss F. Willis, has been transferred to Oslo. She will be succeeded by Mr. Henry J. Taylor. The new Ambassador was born in 1902 at Chicago, and is at present head of the Chemical Bank and Trust Company of New York; formerly a journalist and radio commentator he is not a career diplomat.

Monsieur Luis Gonzales Barros, Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary of the Republic of Columbia, has presented his credentials to Dr. H. Streuli, President of the Swiss Confederation, and M. Max Petitpierre, Swiss Foreign Minister, at the Palais Fédéral in Berne.

The Swiss Federal Railways carried 17.3 million passengers in February 1957, or 300,000 more than during the same period in 1956. Receipts: 21.8 million francs (February 1956: 21.5 million francs).

Goods traffic is returned as 1.95 million tons, which exceeds last year's figures by 410,000 tons. Receipts: 38.8 million francs (February 1956: 34.5 million francs).

Whilst one of the gangsters covered the two clerks with a revolver the other grabbed notes, mostly foreign, amounting to between 30,000 and 40,000 Swiss francs. One of the bank clerks was able to put the alarm into action, whereupon the two intruders decamped and were driven away in a waiting car. They were later arrested on French territory. [A.T.S.]


DEATHS.

The following deaths are reported from Switzerland:

Karl Geiser, a well-known sculptor, in Zurich at the age of 59.

Professor Karl Henschen in Basle aged 79. The deceased was for 22 years chief surgeon at the "Bürgerspital", Basle, and a lecturer at the University of this town. He retired in 1948.

Karl Appert-Gasser, a member of the District Court Schwyz, and the "Kantonsrat", in Schwyz, at the age of 60.



Georges Cuttat, a former Prefect of the Moutier district, in Moutier, aged 72.

Dr. Gugo Dürrenmatt, in Berne at the age of 81. The deceased studied law at the Universities of Lausanne, Munich, Berne and Paris, after which he established himself as a lawyer at Herzogenbuchsee. From 1912 to 1930 he was a member of the Grand Council of the canton of Berne. In 1927 Dr. Dürrenmatt was elected a member of the Government of the canton of Berne, from which post he retired in 1947.

Albert Hueni, for the last 26 years in a leading position at the "Bauernsekretariat", at the age of 53.

Paul Ruch, from 1927 to 1953 District Commander (Kreiskommandant) of Bienne, in Bienne, aged 70.

Dr. Hellmut Schnitter, from 1918 to 1954 a member of the editorial staff of the "National-zeitung" Basle, in Basle at the age of 66.

Dr. Alfred Clausen, a former cantonal judge and from 1947 to 1955 a member of the States Council, in Brigue, aged 80. [A.T.S.]
