Federal

The Federal Council has asked Monsieur Henry de Torrenté, Swiss Ambassador in Washington, to re-

present the Confederation for another year, although at the end of the current year he will reach the official age limit set for retirement of Swiss Government officials. Monsieur de Torrenté has responded to this request, and consented to remain at his post in Washington for another twelve months — until the end of 1959. (Monsieur de Torrenté was Swiss Minister in London from May 1948 to June 1955.)

The Federal Council has retired Minister Charles Humbert, for health reasons, expressing its thanks for the services he has rendered.

Monsieur E. Rodriguez, President of the Senate of the Philippines, has paid a courtesy visit to the Swiss Government. He was entertained to luncheon at the "Wattenwil Haus", where several members of the Federal Council were present.

Customs receipts for the month of August 1958 amounted to 84.1 million francs, of which the Confederation receives 56.5 million francs, or 2 million francs more than in August 1957.

During the first eight months of the current year customs receipts totalled 467.7 million francs, which is 3.1 million francs less than during the same period in 1957.

The Swiss Federal Railways have carried 18.1 million passengers during August 1958, or 200,000 fewer than in August 1957. Receipts: 34.9 million francs (August 1957: 35.5 million francs).

Goods traffic is returned as 1.98 million tons, or 250,000 tons less than in August 1957. Receipts: 41 million francs (August 1957: 42.7 million francs).

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS.

Three persons lost their lives when two motorcycles were involved in a head-on collision near Oberturnen (Ct. Glarus). The victims were: Walter Schelling (43), of Zurich, Robert Javel (40), of Bas-Vully (Fribourg), and J. K. Hammerschmidt (22), of Kreuznach (Germany).

A motor-car crashed into a wall in Kronbühl-Wittenbach (St. Gall). The driver, Josef Buehler (48), master painter, of St. Gall, and his sister, Mrs. Maria Schoenberger-Buehler, also of St. Gall, were killed.

A motor-cyclist, Ernst Spoerri (31), of Rothenbrunnen, collided with a lorry near Ausserferrera. He and his passenger, Julius Spoerri (68), father of the driver, were killed. [A.T.S.]

VARIOUS.

Researches undertaken early this year, after it was announced that traces of uranium had been found in the mountains of Valais, have made it clear that there are two layers containing uranium in the rocks which extend over the Great St. Bernard group. One layer is at Iserables, the other at Sarreyer. scientists who have examined the deposits are now studying the layers with a view to ascertaining whether it would be profitable to start major works in these mountains — at a height of about 3,500 ft. — and to extract the uranium.

Visitors to the Swiss glacier village and resort of Grindelwald in the Bernese Oberland can now get close up to the towering "forehead" of the imposing Grindelwald glacier by way of a newly constructed easy footpath. Part of the old trail leads through the gorge of the so-called "Lower Glacier" over a footbridge which was first built in 1875 and torn away many times by avalanches, rock slides and floods. The new path has been partly hewn in the solid rock and is described as "perfectly safe". Taking in the gorge on a length of several hundred yards, it affords,

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through arched openings, dramatic views of ice-age reminiscences such as glacier mills and other glacial rock formations.

Prince Karim, the young Aga Khan, has purchased a plot of land in the vicinity of Gstaad, the famous winter and summer resort in the Bernese Oberland, for the building of a holiday chalet. An architect from Berne is said to have designed the country home, on which construction is to start soon. The Aga has been among the illustrious holiday-makers at Gstaad for many years.

One of Thun's most ancient hotels, the 55-bed Schlosshotel Freienhof, situated right in the centre of the town and only a few minutes from the railway-station and the steamer landing-stage, has been completely reconstructed and is now open again. Every room has bath or shower, and the comfortable lounges overlook the picturesque River Aare.

The municipal authorities of Fischenthal in the romantic Toess Valley of the Zurich Oberland have recently turned over to the public their new community-owned Gasthof zur Blume, a typical Swiss country inn featuring not only guest rooms and two restaurants but also a combined ballroom and theatre for the villagers. The inn had been known for centuries as a favourite stop-over for pilgrims to the famous Marian shrine of Einsiedeln in Central Switzerland.

The Swiss Government recently recommended a speedy start on construction work on the planned Geneva-Lausanne highway, which was described as an "urgent necessity". Based on the new federal regulations on the improvement of the Swiss motorroad network, which were approved through plebiscite on 6th July last, the building of the 40-mile-long fourlane motor-way alongside Lake Geneva is to start early next year, and must be completed by 1964, in time for the Swiss National Exhibition at Lausanne. It is estimated that between 10,000 and 20,000 passenger cars daily will use the new highway.

The University of Geneva, with its affiliated departments such as the famous Interpreters' School and several economic institutes, is probably one of the world's most "cosmopolitan" universities, since some 60 per cent of its enrolled students are citizens of foreign countries. According to a recent survey, 4,348 students from abroad were studying at Switzerland's various universities during the summer term of last year.

A recent decision of the Swiss Federal Council now authorises coaches from abroad with a maximum width of 8 feet 2 inches to use the newly rebuilt and very picturesque Alpine road Martigny - Forclaz Pass - Le Chatelard, which connects the Lake Geneva and Valais regions with the French tourist centre of Chamonix.

Traffic noise is outlawed in the lovely little valleys of Val Roseg and Val dal Fain in the neighbourhood of the glamorous Swiss resort of Pontresina, Grisons. A general ban on motor traffic in these valleys was imposed recently.

The first "Mot-Hotel" — a combination of the traditional hotel type and a modern motel — was inaugurated recently at Sachseln, Central Switzerland. The "Touring Club of Switzerland", one of Switzerland's two leading motorists' assocations, had the historic, 500-year-old "Kreuz" Inn completely modernised and supplemented by four up-to-date motel units. The "Kreuz" mot-hotel is Touring-Club's first try-out in this field; more Swiss mot-hotels are planned for Ragaz Spa, Eastern Switzerland, and Vira, Ticino.

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
