Ernst, General Manager of the Swiss National Tourist Office and the Swiss Federal Railways, gave a very interesting and competent *exposé* of the various travel services to Switzerland by sea, rail, road and air.

Mr. A. Kunz, Publicity Manager of the Swiss National Tourist Office, gave information regarding the extensive propaganda undertaken by his organisation.

The offices of the Swiss Federal Railways, Swiss National Tourist Office and Swissair in London are accomplishing a tremendous task, and by their combined efforts have been successful in attracting the British public to visiting our country in ever-increasing numbers. In their endeavours they have been also much assisted by the many Tourist Agencies.

After the Press Conference the Swiss Journalists were entertained to an excellent luncheon in the Rainbow Room, where they were able to listen to the "Musique du Folly" and to the two pretty yodellers.

There they had also the pleasure of being introduced to the catering manager of the Store, Mr. W. Allenspach, a compatriot of ours, who, I am told by a regular visitor, manages to fill this vast Restaurant to capacity every day during the week — surely a splendid testimonial to his capabilities.

The afternoon ended with a visit to the very fine roof garden.
