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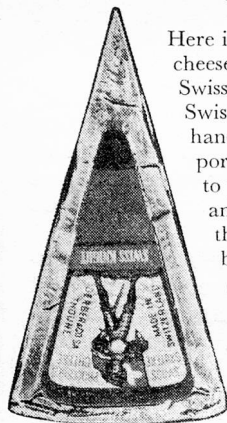
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Round about Christmas-time, many a Swiss-managed concern invites the members of its staff to a party.
