NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

The Swiss Parliament (Lower House) recently approved a Government proposal to reorganize the country's

defence forces. Voting was 105 for and 5 against, with most of the Socialists and Independent members

abstaining.

The Government's reorganisation plan, which will extend over four years, called for the establishment of three mechanized divisions, stronger Air Force ground defences, and an increase in the number of fighter aircraft. A decision to purchase a new interceptor aircraft to re-equip the Air Force is expected in the near future, with the choice still unknown between a number of foreign types which have been evaluated.

To meet part of the cost of the plan, the Government had proposed reducing the infantry strength by 13 battalions and abolishing the cavalry. An opposition amendment, however, defeated the proposal to reduce the infantry and succeeded in the retention of 18 out of the current 25 cavalry squadrons.

At the session some members criticized M. Chaudet, the Defence Minister, on his proposal to buy eleven second-hand Centurion tanks from South Africa because of that country's racial policies. When put to the vote the purchase proposal was upheld by 94 to 44

The Federal Chambers, at their recent session, have authorised the Federal Council to prolong a loan, which was granted in 1956 to the World Bank, for a further six years. After part repayments, the loan stands at present at 167 million francs and bears interest at 4 per cent.

Prince Rainier and Princess Grace of Monaco paid an official visit to the Swiss Confederation, from Tuesday to Thursday, 8th to 10th November 1960. They were welcomed at the Berne station by Monsieur Max Petitpierre, President of the Swiss Confederation, who was accompanied by Madame Petitpierre. The distinguished visitors, on arriving at the Palais Fédéral, were introduced to the members of the Federal Council. In the evening they were the guests of the Swiss Government at a State banquet. On Wednesday, Prince Rainier and Princess Grace were taken on an excursion to Neuchâtel, where they were officially received by members of the cantonal government at the castle of Neuchâtel. The following day they opened an exhibition at the Casino in Berne dealing with the principality of Monaco, and a luncheon offered by the Federal Council at the "Lohn" followed. In the evening, a dinner was given to the members of the Federal Council by Prince Rainier and Princess Grace, after which the national orchestra of Monaco gave a concert at the Casino. On the Friday morning the visitors took leave of Monsieur Petitpierre and Madame Petitpierre.

Cantonal

The 99th delegates' meeting of the Swiss Alpine Club was recently held at Winterthur. One hundred and

sixty-six delegates, representing eighty-five sections, attended the meeting, which was presided over by Dr. Georg Calonder, Central President. It was decided that the Centenary Celebrations — lasting three days — will be held at Interlaken in 1961. The Swiss Alpine Club has a membership of nearly 42,000.

He was presented with a gold commemoration medal. Amongst the many congratulatory telegrams received was one from Pope Johannes XXIII. [A.T.S.]

Mme. Emma Herzog-Früh, of Flawil, has celebrated her 101st birthday. [A.T.S.]

The dial-plate factory "Flückiger & Cie" in St. Imier, employing over 450 workhands, has celebrated its 100th jubilee. [A.T.S.]

The members of the Government of the canton of Fribourg paid a return visit to the Solothurn government. (In October 1959 the Solothurn government was the guest of the cantonal government of Fribourg.) After an official reception at the government house the guests visited various monuments in the town, after which they drove to Dornach, where a luncheon was served. Subsequently they visited the cloister "Mariastein". The visit ended with a joint dinner at the "Bad Attisholz". [A.T.S.]

A train of the Solothurn-Niederbipp Railway crashed into a lorry at a level-crossing in Niederbipp. The driver of the vehicle escaped injuries. The damage caused to the train and the lorry was considerable.
