NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

After the National Council approved by 142 votes against 3 the Government decree providing

Switzerland to become a member of the European Free Trade Association, the Upper Chamber or States Council gave its unanimous approval. Thus the Federal Council has the necessary powers for ratifying the Stockholm Treaty.

Customs receipts for the month of February 1960 amount to 93.8 million francs; of this amount the Confederation (Bund) receives 63.1 million francs, or 15.6 million francs more than in February 1959.

The Queen has approved the appointment of Sir William Montagu-Pollock, British Ambassador in Berne, to be Ambassador at Copenhagen. The Queen has also approved the appointment of Mr. P. D. Grey, Ambassador at Prague, to be Ambassador in Berne.

Dr. h.c. A. J. Ryniker, Director of the "Schweiz. Seeschiffahrtamtes", has tendered his resignation, which has been accepted with thanks for the services he has rendered.

Dr. Ryniker was born in 1875 in Lauterbrunnen, and is a citizen of Habsburg. He obtained in 1898 the diploma of "Schiffbauingenieur" in Berlin. From 1925 to 1940 Dr. Ryniker was a lecturer (Privatdozent) at the Federal Institute of Technology (ETH) Zurich. From 1941 to 1960 he was Director of the "Schweiz. Seeschiffahrtamtes". In 1945 the Federal Institute of Technology, Zurich, honoured him with the degree of doctor honoris causa.

The Superior Court of Zurich has sentenced Emil Toggenburger, a former President of the commune of Marthalen, to three and a half years' imprisonment for embezzling an amount of 195,000.— francs whilst manager of the branch office Marthalen of the Cantonal Bank Zurich. [A.T.S.]

The show-window of the jewellery firm of Kofmehl, in the Bahnhofstrasse Zurich, was smashed by a heavy instrument and rings and bracelets to the value of 20,000.— francs were stolen. [A.T.S.]

A postman of Bigenthal (Ct. Berne) reported to the police that he was attacked in the Wydimatt Forest above Bigenthal, and robbed of a large amount of cash. During his interrogation by a magistrate he confessed that no such attack occurred, and the missing money was recovered in full. The postman has been placed under arrest. [A.T.S.]

The accounts of the canton of Fribourg for 1959 close with a deficit of 397,570.— francs. [A.T.S.]

An auxiliary building of the sawmill "Jules Sallin" in Villaz-St. Pierre near Romont was destroyed by fire. The damage is estimated to exceed 100,000.— francs.

Dem.) 23,075 votes; Dr. Carl Peter (Cath.) 21,947 votes; Max Wullschleger (Socialist) 22,217 votes; Dr. Ed. Wyss (Socialist) 21,964 votes; Fr. Brechbühl (Socialist) 20,940 votes.

The strength of the various parties in the newly elected Grand Council of the canton of Basle-Town, numbering 130 seats, is as follows: Radicals 25 (21), Communists 8 (16), Liberal Democrats 21 (19), Evangelicals 5 (—), Socialists 39 (41), "Landesring" 9 (—), Cath. Pop. Party 20 (19), Independent Socialists 3 (—). [A.T.S.]

On 11th March a jewellers' establishment in the centre of Basle was entered and goods to the value of 100,000.— francs were stolen. With the close collaboration of the Basle and Vaudois police four foreigners were recently arrested. Some of the stolen property was found in their possession. [A.T.S.]

The West-German Ambassador in Bern, Dr. Ernst-Günther Mohr, paid a courtesy visit to the Government of the canton of Ticino. He was received at the Government building in Bellinzona by Dr. Franco Zorzi, President of the Cantonal Government. The distinguished visitor was entertained to a luncheon at Minusio by Dr. Zorzi. 
ANNIVERSARIES.

The late Luise Gysler of Küsnacht (Zurich) has left the sum of 10,000.— francs to the Grisons League for Cancer Research.

Mr. Johannes Müller, who died in Zollikon, near Zurich, has left an amount of 100,000.— francs to his native commune of Oberengstringen for the erection of a home for old people. [A.T.S.]

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS.

Two persons were killed and four seriously injured when a motor-car, on overtaking at excessive speed, struck another car. Both vehicles left the road and overturned. Those killed were Vicar Kaeppeli (28), of Ebikon, and Miss H. K. Pernicone (59), of Merlischachen.

A motor-car, driven at an excessive speed, crashed into a stone wall at the village of Zuzgen (Ct. Aargau). Two of the occupants were killed and another was taken to hospital with serious injuries. Those killed were Herbert Richter (29), of Säckingen, and H. Rütschlin (22), of Badisch-Rheinfelden.

A motorist, Marcel Oberson (16), of Romont, was driving his father's car without his father's consent when, on taking a corner, the car left the road and overturned, between Corseray and Torny (Ct. Fribourg). The driver and his passenger, Gerard Terrapon (21), received fatal injuries.

Mr. Oskar Graenacher (49), of Oberhofen (Fricktal), riding a motor-cycle, crashed into a tele-

phone pole near Mettau and was killed. He is the father of ten children.

A motor-car driven by Mr. Erwin Grimm (44), etcher, of Bümpliz, collided with an engine at a level-crossing between Bönigen and Interlaken. Mr. Grimm received serious injuries, and his wife, who was a passenger, was killed.

A twenty-year-old motor-cyclist, Bernhard Nigg, of Valens (St. Gall), collided with a motor-car on the road between Sargans and Bad Ragaz. He was killed.

Fifteen persons were injured, two seriously, when a lorry carrying a number of workmen collided with another lorry — in thick fog — on the road between Romanshorn and Kreuzlingen.

Xavier de Kalbermatten (75), of Visp, was killed outright when he was run over by a lorry. [A.T.S.]



The entertainment "Sion à la lumière de ses étoiles", "Sion in the light of its stars", which proved so popular last year, is to have another run of several months in the capital of the Valais, starting on 17th April. Seated on the rocky eminence between the Valeria Church and the ruins of Tourbillon Castle, visitors from far and wide were able to relive the eventful history of the town and see its monuments picked out by floodlight. It may be confidently expected that the show will prove as big a draw this year as last.

The time-honoured Landsgemeinde or plenary assembly of the people has retained its full authority in certain rural cantons, where cantonal elections and votes are not the sober and impersonal business they have become in the towns, but remain an impressive ceremony enacted by all the male voters gathered together to elect officials and pass legislation. Visitors come from far and near to witness these Sunday assemblies, which fall this year on 24th April (Sunday after Easter) in Trogen, Appenzell, Sarnen and Stans, and on 1st May at Glarus. On Thursday, 7th April, the people of Glarus celebrated their historic "Näfels Procession" in commemoration of the Battle of Näfels in 1388.

Zurich has always shown greater interest in its spring festival, the Six o'clock Chimes, than in the Shrovetide Carnival. Falling this year on 24th and

25th April, the celebrations take the form of a colourful children's parade on the Sunday, followed on the Monday by the grand pageant of the guilds, including many groups in historical costume, which winds up by the lake, where the "Böögg" or effigy of winter is burnt amidst general rejoicings. In the evening the various guilds go visiting each other and the narrow streets of the old town are alive with comings and goings and the romantic gleam of lanterns.
