Federal

The Federal Council has appointed Dr. Max König, at present Swiss Ambassador in Pakistan, to the post of Minister

Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary to the Republics of Guatemala, Costa Rica, Honduras, Nicaragua, and Salvador, with residence in Guatemala

Dr. König was born in 1911 and is a citizen of Bettenwil (Ct. Aargau). He studied Political Science at the University of Berne, and in 1938 entered the service of the Political Department (Swiss Foreign Office). He held successively posts at Berlin, Baden-Baden, Paris, and Teheran. In 1948 Dr. König returned to Berne to take over the appointment as Head of the Office for European Economic Co-ordination, and in 1955 he became assistant to the chief of the section for International Organisations. In 1956 he received the title of Minister and was sent to Cairo, where he was in charge of Foreign Interests. A year later followed his appointment as Ambassador to Pakistan.

On the occasion of the death of General Guisan, Monsieur M. Petitpierre, President of the Swiss Confederation, and M. P. Chaudet, Head of the Federal Military Department, paid a visit to Madame Guisan to express their sympathy in her bereavement.

The President of the Confederation and Chief of the Federal Military Department have received a large number of messages of condolence, amongst them those from General de Gaulle and President Eisenhower.

The Swiss Federal Railways have carried 17.5 million passengers in the month of February 1960, or 300,000 fewer than in February 1959. Receipts: 25.8 million francs.

Goods traffic is returned as 2.15 million tons, or 460,000 tons more than during the same period in 1959. Receipts: 43.8 million francs (February 1959: 36.3 million francs).

The Grand Council of the canton of Basle-Town has voted a credit of 75.5 million francs towards the costs for the extension of the Basle-Mülhausen airport.

On 4th April the University of Basle could look back on 500 years of its existence. This event will be duly celebrated during 29th June to 2nd July 1960.

The Federal Singing Competition will take place this year at Geneva from 17th to 28th June. More than eight thousand singers are expected to take part in this competition. Various guest choirs from France, Germany, Holland, and Austria will be in attendance. [A.T.S.]

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The Mayor of Geneva, Mr. L. Billy, has presented the gold medal, "Genève reconnaissante", to the following: Willy Aeschlimann, since 1924 publisher of the "Almanach du vieux Genève", Louis Blondes, cantonal archæologist, and Marcel Sues, radio commentator. 






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Switzerland



VARIOUS.

At the end of 1958 the number of Swiss without dual nationality living abroad and registered at Swiss Embassies, Legations and Consulates numbered 160,291, and the number with dual nationality was 95,317; altogether 255,608 registered "Ausland-schweizer".

Switzerland exported in February 1960 2,996,800 watches to the value of 85.5 million francs. [A.T.S.]

LETTER FROM SWITZERLAND. The economic situation in 1959.

For western Europe, the main feature of the past year was once again economic integration. As everyone knows, in 1956 Western Germany, Belgium, France, Italy, Luxembourg and the Netherlands signed the Rome Agreement marking the start of the European Economic Community (E.E.C.). The other eleven members of the Organisation for European Economic Co-operation (O.E.E.C.) sought to conclude an agreement with E.E.C. with a view to creating a free-trade area covering all the countries in question; unfortunately, the negotiations met with no success. The E.E.C. actually came into effect on 1st January 1959.

Switzerland and economic integration

These events created an altogether new situation for the western European countries outside E.E.C. Switzerland — which had always becked the efforts of the Organisation for European Economic Co-operation towards greater freedom of trade — remained convinced of the necessity of negotiating with E.E.C. once again. From the start, this country sought a solution in keeping with European aspirations, but one which would not oblige it to abandon its principles of neutrality and political and economic independence. Like Austria, Denmark, Great Britain, Norway, Portugal and Sweden, it envisaged this solution in the form of the creation of a free-trade area as the basis of future agreement with the six members of E.E.C.

Trade is enjoying a great boom throughout western Europe. The immediate aim of the Seven is to maintain this boom and to safeguard European economic co-operation, the driving force behind this economic expansion. Overseas countries, and in particular those in the process of development, can only benefit from such a situation. On the firm basis of O.E.E.C., negotiations between the seven countries concerned rapidly met with success. A pact was signed in Stockholm on 4th January. Subject to ratification by these countries' governments, it will enter into force on 1st July next.

Big increase in foreign trade

Another important feature of the year 1959 was the gradual overall recovery of Switzerland's foreign trade, after the falling-off recorded the previous year, and even as late as last spring. Imports rose 13%, to reach the amount of 8,300 million Swiss frs. This upward trend was due, among other things, to the stock building carried out in anticipation of the new Swiss customs tariff due to come into force on 1st January 1960, as well as to the evolution of prices on world markets. The increased demand for Swiss manufactured products led to a rise in exports of almost 10%, so that the total amounted to 7,300 million Swiss francs. From the point of view of volume, imports increased 8% and exports 26%. With regard to both
