Solothurn women to oppose emancipation

Women in the canton of Solothurn, who don't have the right to vote, have formed an association *against* emancipation.

The movement, the Association of Women Opponents to the Women's Vote, is all in favour of women taking their place beside men in certain spheres of community work.

But the vote for women, the association declares, is wrong. And as an example, they point to the French-speaking cantons where women do have the right to vote but where only a few women are interested in voting — and more men are becoming uninterested.

Green Pea Consomme, fine summer dish
