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NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

Monsieur Gaston Jaccard, formerly Swiss Ambassador to Belgium, has been appointed to head a section of the Swiss Embassy representing United States interests in Cuba, following the diplomatic break between Washington and Havana.

The Federal Council has appointed M. Jacques Mollet, Counsellor of Legation, and Consul-General at Damascus, to the post of head of the Swiss delegation to the Neutral Nations Commission for the Repatriation of Prisoners of War in Korea, in succession to M. Rudolf Hartmann.

Monsieur J. Dudley Lawrence has presented his credentials as Ambassador of the Republic of Liberia to Monsieur F. T. Wahlen, President of the Swiss Confederation, and to Monsieur Max Petitpierre, head of the Political Department, at the Palais Fédéral in Berne.

The Federal Council has addressed a congratulatory message to Mr. John Kennedy, on his taking over the American Presidency.

Cantonal

A sixteen-year-old student, on leaving his railway carriage before the train had stopped at the station of Schwyz, fell between two carriages and was killed. He was Peter Ceberg, of Richenbach nr. Schwyz. [A.T.S.]

Dr. Walter Raissig, Central Secretary of the "Hauseigentümer Verband", is entering the National Council, in succession to the late Mr. F. Buechi. The new National Councillor was born in 1910 and hails from Bolligen (Ct. Berne). He is residing in Langnau a. Albis. [A.T.S.]

The Zurich Government has acquired large grounds for the erection of new Barracks in the Reppisch Valley between Birmensdorf and Urdorf at a cost of 7,500,000.— francs. [A.T.S.]

At the end of 1961 the population of the town of Zurich numbered 439,979. [A.T.S.]

A fire which broke out at the non-alcoholic restaurant "Side-Hus" in the Seidengasse Zurich caused damage estimated to amount to 30,000.— francs. [A.T.S.]

Dr.med. Hans Ulrich Buff, chief surgeon at the "Bürgerspital" Solothurn, has been elected Professor of Medicine at the University of Zurich, and Director of the surgical clinic of the cantonal hospital Zurich. [A.T.S.]

Frau Susanna Haegni-Pletscher, of Stäfa (Zurich), has celebrated her 101st birthday; she is the mother of seven children. [A.T.S.]

A burglar entered the office of the Victoria Hospital in Berne; he forced open the safe and decamped with its contents to the value of 30,000.— francs. [A.T.S.]

Professor Walter Baumgartner, chief surgeon at the hospital in Interlaken, and his son, Martin, lost their lives in an avalanche disaster at the Wistaethorn, between Lenk and Zweisimmen. Two other sons of Professor Baumgartner were seriously injured and were taken to the Interlaken hospital. [A.T.S.]

Fräulein Magdalena Seiler has celebrated her 103rd birthday, at the district hospital in Interlaken. [A.T.S.]

M. Robert Mermoud, notary, has been elected Mayor of the town of Grandson. He belongs to the Radical Party. [A.T.S.]

Mr. Hans Schneider (67) has celebrated his 40th jubilee in the service of the Government of the canton of Berne. He has occupied the post of chancellor since 1928. [A.T.S.]

In the canton of Lucerne, 1,874 traffic accidents occurred during the year 1960. 1,510 persons were injured, 162 fatally. [A.T.S.]

Mr. Max Obrecht (66) and Mr. Otto Stampfli (64) have announced their decision to retire from the Government of the canton of Solothurn.

Mr. Obrecht is a member of the Conservative Party. He was elected a member of the cantonal government in 1931. Obrecht occupied the post of "Landammann" six times.

Mr. Otto Stampfli (Radical) entered the cantonal government in 1936. He held the post of "Landammann" five times. [A.T.S.]

During the year 1960, 272 road accidents have been reported in the territory of the town of Schaffhausen. 155 persons received injuries and 7 persons were killed. [A.T.S.]

Mr. Georg Frei, of Hemberg (Toggenburg), has celebrated his 102nd birthday. He is the father of 12 children (seven sons and five daughters). [A.T.S.]

Mr. Hanspeter Bertschin (20), of Zurich, lost his life on the bobsleigh run at St. Moritz, when his bobsleigh overturned at great speed. [A.T.S.]

During the year 1960, 950 traffic accidents occurred in the canton of Thurgau. 910 persons were injured and 45 succumbed to their injuries. [A.T.S.]

The Diavolezza air-lift, after only four years' activity, recently carried its millionth passenger. [A.T.S.]

On 1st January 1961 the population of the town of Lausanne numbered 126,906, or 3,578 more than on 1st January 1960. (11,546 citizens of Lausanne, 52,195 citizens of Vaudois communes, 44,929 citizens belonging to other cantons, and 18,236 foreigners.) [A.T.S.]

The "Comité directeur de l'exposition nationale Suisse de 1964" has nominated Mr. Frederic Paux (47) to the post of general secretary of the exhibition. M. Michel Rochaix (48), Director of the "Potasses, S.A." Berne, has been elected agricultural commissioner, and Mr. Franz Amrhein (33) will be in charge of the constructions of the exhibition. [A.T.S.]

During the twelve months of 1960, 430,000 kilogrammes of fish were caught in the lake of Neuchâtel. This is 100,000 kgs. fewer than the year before. [A.T.S.]

A shop window of a jewellery establishment in the L'Ile quarter of Geneva was smashed, and goods valued at 100,000.—francs were stolen. [A.T.S.]

Pierre Bidal, teacher of mathematics at the "Ecole polytechnique" of the University of Lausanne, at Château d'Oex, aged 46.

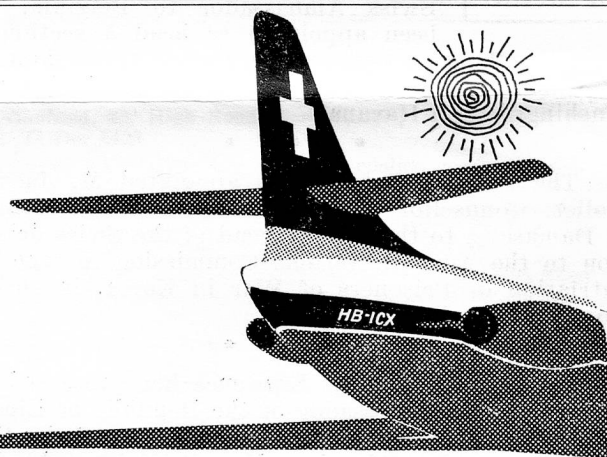
Traugott Buechi, from 1951 until his death a member of the National Council, in Zurich, at the age of 54.

BLAISE CENDRARS WILL ASTOUND US NO MORE

Blaise Cendrars, 73, novelist, poet, movie scenario writer and world traveller, died in Paris after a long illness.

The restless life of M. Cendrars, known as the "intellectual vagabond", could well be summed up by the title of one of his best-known works, "Bourlinguer", which means to knock about the world.

He was awarded recently the literary Grand Prix of the City of Paris for his collected works.

Born Frédéric Sausser-Hall at La Chaux-de-Fonds, Switzerland, he left his Scots mother and his Swiss father when he was 15 for the first of many trips around the world.

Before volunteering in the French Foreign Legion in 1914, M. Cendrars travelled in China, Russia, Britain and the United States. He supported himself by working as a farm hand, a beekeeper, a dish-washer and a music-hall entertainer.

M. Cendrars lost his right arm in the war in 1915. From 1917 until 1924 he specialized in movie work. Paris and New York were his headquarters between the two wars, and he travelled extensively in North and South America and Asia.

He was a friend and contemporary of such poets as Max Jacob, Jean Cocteau and Guillaume Apollinaire and of such artists as Fernand Léger, Chagall and Soutine. He was also a friend of American writer Henry Miller.

M. Cendrars's work was influenced by jazz, cubism and the movies, and he evolved a style which bordered on both poetry and newspaper reporting.

The first of his 30-odd works, "The Legend of Novgorod", was published in Moscow in 1909. His other works included "Gold", "Transsiberian Prose", "Easter in New York", "The ABC of Cinema", "Kodak", "Bourlinguer", and "Too Much, Too Much".

In World War II he served in the British Army in France as a captain until the collapse in June, 1940.

A Commander of the Legion of Honor, M. Cendrars is survived by his wife, a son and a daughter.

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
