YORKSHIRE GIRL'S HISTORIC TRECK FILM CHOSEN FOR WORLD TELEVISION FESTIVAL

Swiss TV's story of a century-old Alpine adventure has English cast

A party of English tourists puffing their way across the Alps in travelling costumes of a century ago . . . that is the theme of the Swiss contribution to the Festival of World Television, which opens in London later this month.

The programme, called "Miss Jemima Entdeckt die Schweiz" (Miss Jemima Discovers Switzerland), tells the story of the first-ever conducted tour of Switzerland, organised by an up-and-coming excursionist named Thomas Cook just a hundred years ago.

It is an authentic reconstruction of what Alpine travelling was like in the middle of the 19th century.

The Swiss camera and sound teams went everywhere with the party — climbing a mountainside on horseback, jolting along a railway on an open carriage and smothered in smoke and soot from an ancient locomotive, dragging their equipment over 20-foot-high drifts of snow that blocked the 7,000-ft Gemmi Pass, and sailing high over the Swiss capital of Berne in a wicker basket attached to an erratic gas-filled balloon.

They shared all the hardships and discomforts that the "Victorian" travellers had to face. But they also shared in the tumultuous receptions which greeted the party at various points along the route, with villages festooned with thousands of union jacks and entire populations turning out to welcome them.

They ended the tour with some remarkable film recreating the true flavour of an event that was to start the fashion of conducted tours and lead to a revolution in European holiday habits.

The programme has already been seen on Swiss television and critics there have praised the performance of Janet Edwards of London who played the title role of Miss Jemima — Jemima Morrell, the Yorkshire girl who left behind the only account of that historic tour of 1863.

The parts of other members of the party were all taken by English artists.

The Festival of World Television, organised to present a selection of the best TV programmes from all parts of the world, opens on 26th November.

The Swiss entry, chosen by a selection committee which included representatives of the BBC and ITV, will be shown on Tuesday, 3rd December.
